boundless	Seemingly boundless in amount number degree or especially extent. Enthusiasts who devote <b>boundless</b> energy to their hobby.
out of control	No longer fashionable.
out of hand	Outer or outlying.
quenchless	Impossible to quench. An unspeakable <b>quenchless</b> joy.
<u>unbounded</u>	Having or appearing to have no limits. The possibilities are <b>unbounded</b> .



<u>unbridled</u>	Not restrained or controlled. <b>Unbridled</b> lust.
<u>unchecked</u>	Not restrained or controlled. An <b>unchecked</b> temper.
unconfined	Not confined. Sows should be <b>unconfined</b> at farrowing.
unconstrained	Free from constraint. <i>He was <b>unconstrained</b> by any of the sanctions of polite society.</i>
<u>uncontrollable</u>	Incapable of being controlled. <b>Uncontrollable</b> pain.
<u>uncontrolled</u>	Not being under control; out of control. The greatest <b>uncontrolled</b> health problem is AIDS.
undisciplined	Lacking in discipline or control. <i>Undisciplined</i> soldiers.
unfettered	Unrestrained or uninhibited. <b>Unfettered</b> artistic genius.
unhampered	Not held in check or subject to control. This would give black people the opportunity to live <b>unhampered</b> by racism.
<u>unimpeded</u>	Not obstructed or hindered. An <b>unimpeded</b> view across the headland.
<u>uninhibited</u>	Expressing one's feelings or thoughts unselfconsciously and without restraint. <i>Uninhibited</i> exuberance.
unlimited	Without reservation or exception. To start with a theory of <b>unlimited</b> freedom is to end up with <b>unlimited</b> despotism.
unrestricted	Not subject to or subjected to restriction. <b>Unrestricted</b> verbs are usually stronger than those qualified by adverbs.
unshackled	Not bound by shackles and chains. <i>He had handcuffs on his wrists but his feet were <b>unshackled</b>.</i>
unsuppressed	Given vent to. <b>Unsuppressed</b> feelings.
untrammelled	Not confined or limited- Russell Lord- Farley Mowat. A mind <b>untrammelled</b> by convention.

appetite	A feeling of craving something- Granville Hicks. An <b>appetite</b> for life.
<u>aspire</u>	Direct one's hopes or ambitions towards achieving something. Other people will <b>aspire</b> to be like you.
<u>covet</u>	Yearn to possess (something, especially something belonging to another. I <b>covet</b> one of their smart bags.
<u>crave</u>	Feel a powerful desire for (something. Will <b>crave</b> d for family life.
<u>craving</u>	An intense desire for some particular thing. A <b>craving</b> for chocolate.
desire	Express a desire for. There had been a time years ago when he had <b>desire</b> d her.
<u>famine</u>	Extreme scarcity of food. The cotton <b>famine</b> of the 1860s.
famish	Die of food deprivation. Many <b>famish</b> ed in the countryside during the drought.
glutton	A person who is devoted to eating and drinking to excess. <i>He s a <b>glutton</b> for adventure.</i>
gluttonous	Given to excess in consumption of especially food or drink. Over fed women and their <b>gluttonous</b> husbands.
gourmand	A person who is devoted to eating and drinking to excess.
greedy	Having or showing an intense and selfish desire for wealth or power. <i>Greedy</i> for fame.
hanker	Desire strongly or persistently. She <b>hanker</b> ed to go back.
hankering	A yearning for something or to do something. A <b>hankering</b> for family life.
<u>hunger</u>	Feel or suffer hunger. When he had fasted forty days and forty nights he afterwards <b>hunger</b> ed.



hungry	(usually followed by `for') extremely desirous. A world full of <b>hungry</b> people.
<u>insatiable</u>	Of a person having an insatiable appetite or desire for something especially sex. An <b>insatiable</b> demand for old buildings to restore.
lupine	Any plant of the genus Lupinus; bearing erect spikes of usually purplish-blue flowers.
rapacious	Aggressively greedy or grasping. A <b>rapacious</b> appetite.
<u>ravenous</u>	Extremely hungry. <i>Ravenous</i> as wolves.
repletion	Eating until excessively full.
satiety	The state of being satisfactorily full and unable to take on more. A molecule that seems to regulate <b>satiety</b> .
slake	Combine (quicklime) with water to produce calcium hydroxide. <i>Slake</i> the lime within a day or two of purchase.
<u>starve</u>	Feel very hungry. The arts are being <b>starve</b> d of funds.
tantalize	Excite the senses or desires of (someone. <i>She still <b>tantalize</b>d him.</i>
thirst	Have a strong desire for something. Tens of thousands died of <b>thirst</b> and starvation.
<u>voracious</u>	Devouring or craving food in great quantities. Paying taxes to <b>voracious</b> governments.
want	Feel or have a desire for want strongly. Your former neighbor is <b>want</b> ed by the FBI.
<u>yearn</u>	Be filled with compassion or warm feeling. No fellow spirit <b>yearn</b> ed towards her.
yearning	Involving or expressing yearning. A <b>yearning</b> hope.
