<b><u>uncontrollable</u></b>	Incapable of being controlled. <i><b>Uncontrollable</b> pain.</i>
<b><u>uncontrolled</u></b>	Not being under control; out of control. <i>The greatest <b>uncontrolled</b> health problem is AIDS.</i>
<b>undisciplined</b>	Lacking in discipline or control. <i><b>Undisciplined</b> soldiers.</i>
<b>unfettered</b>	Unrestrained or uninhibited. <i><b>Unfettered</b> artistic genius.</i>
<b>unhampered</b>	Not held in check or subject to control. <i>This would give black people the opportunity to live <b>unhampered</b> by racism.</i>
<b><u>unimpeded</u></b>	Not obstructed or hindered. <i>An <b>unimpeded</b> view across the headland.</i>
<b><u>uninhibited</u></b>	Expressing one's feelings or thoughts unselfconsciously and without restraint. <i><b>Uninhibited</b> exuberance.</i>
<b>unlimited</b>	Without reservation or exception. <i>To start with a theory of <b>unlimited</b> freedom is to end up with <b>unlimited</b> despotism.</i>
<b>unrestricted</b>	Not subject to or subjected to restriction. <i><b>Unrestricted</b> verbs are usually stronger than those qualified by adverbs.</i>
<b>unshackled</b>	Not bound by shackles and chains. <i>He had handcuffs on his wrists but his feet were <b>unshackled</b>.</i>
<b>unsuppressed</b>	Given vent to. <i><b>Unsuppressed</b> feelings.</i>
<b>untrammelled</b>	Not confined or limited- Russell Lord- Farley Mowat. <i>A mind <b>untrammelled</b> by convention.</i>

<b>appetite</b>	A feeling of craving something- Granville Hicks. <i>An <b>appetite</b> for life.</i>
<b>aspire</b>	Direct one's hopes or ambitions towards achieving something. <i>Other people will <b>aspire</b> to be like you.</i>
<b>covet</b>	Yearn to possess (something, especially something belonging to another). <i>I <b>covet</b> one of their smart bags.</i>
<b>crave</b>	Feel a powerful desire for (something). <i>Will <b>craved</b> for family life.</i>
<b>craving</b>	An intense desire for some particular thing. <i>A <b>craving</b> for chocolate.</i>
<b>desire</b>	Express a desire for. <i>There had been a time years ago when he had <b>desired</b> her.</i>
<b>famine</b>	Extreme scarcity of food. <i>The cotton <b>famine</b> of the 1860s.</i>
<b>famish</b>	Die of food deprivation. <i>Many <b>famished</b> in the countryside during the drought.</i>
<b>glutton</b>	A person who is devoted to eating and drinking to excess. <i>He s a <b>glutton</b> for adventure.</i>
<b>gluttonous</b>	Given to excess in consumption of especially food or drink. <i>Over fed women and their <b>gluttonous</b> husbands.</i>
<b>gourmand</b>	A person who is devoted to eating and drinking to excess.
<b>greedy</b>	Having or showing an intense and selfish desire for wealth or power. <i><b>Greedy</b> for fame.</i>
<b>hanker</b>	Desire strongly or persistently. <i>She <b>hankered</b> to go back.</i>
<b>hankering</b>	A yearning for something or to do something. <i>A <b>hankering</b> for family life.</i>
<b>hunger</b>	Feel or suffer hunger. <i>When he had fasted forty days and forty nights he afterwards <b>hungered</b>.</i>

<b>hungry</b>	(usually followed by `for') extremely desirous. <i>A world full of <b>hungry</b> people.</i>
<b>insatiable</b>	Of a person having an insatiable appetite or desire for something especially sex. <i>An <b>insatiable</b> demand for old buildings to restore.</i>
<b>lupine</b>	Any plant of the genus <i>Lupinus</i> ; bearing erect spikes of usually purplish-blue flowers.
<b>rapacious</b>	Aggressively greedy or grasping. <i>A <b>rapacious</b> appetite.</i>
<b>ravenous</b>	Extremely hungry. <i><b>Ravenous</b> as wolves.</i>
<b>repletion</b>	Eating until excessively full.
<b>satiety</b>	The state of being satisfactorily full and unable to take on more. <i>A molecule that seems to regulate <b>satiety</b>.</i>
<b>slake</b>	Combine (quicklime) with water to produce calcium hydroxide. <i><b>Slake</b> the lime within a day or two of purchase.</i>
<b>starve</b>	Feel very hungry. <i>The arts are being <b>starved</b> of funds.</i>
<b>tantalize</b>	Excite the senses or desires of (someone). <i>She still <b>tantalized</b> him.</i>
<b>thirst</b>	Have a strong desire for something. <i>Tens of thousands died of <b>thirst</b> and starvation.</i>
<b>voracious</b>	Devouring or craving food in great quantities. <i>Paying taxes to <b>voracious</b> governments.</i>
<b>want</b>	Feel or have a desire for want strongly. <i>Your former neighbor is <b>wanted</b> by the FBI.</i>
<b>yearn</b>	Be filled with compassion or warm feeling. <i>No fellow spirit <b>yearned</b> towards her.</i>
<b>yearning</b>	Involving or expressing yearning. <i>A <b>yearning</b> hope.</i>
