boundless	Seemingly boundless in amount number degree or especially extent. <i>Enthusiasts who devote boundless energy to their hobby.</i>
out of control	No longer fashionable.
out of hand	Outer or outlying.
quenchless	Impossible to quench. <i>An unspeakable quenchless joy.</i>
<u>unbounded</u>	Having or appearing to have no limits. <i>The possibilities are unbounded.</i>

<u>unbridled</u>	Not restrained or controlled. <i>Unbridled lust.</i>
<u>unchecked</u>	Not restrained or controlled. <i>An unchecked temper.</i>
unconfined	Not confined. <i>Sows should be unconfined at farrowing.</i>
unconstrained	Free from constraint. <i>He was unconstrained by any of the sanctions of polite society.</i>
<u>uncontrollable</u>	Incapable of being controlled. <i>Uncontrollable pain.</i>
<u>uncontrolled</u>	Not being under control; out of control. <i>The greatest uncontrolled health problem is AIDS.</i>
undisciplined	Lacking in discipline or control. <i>Undisciplined soldiers.</i>
unfettered	Unrestrained or uninhibited. <i>Unfettered artistic genius.</i>
unhampered	Not held in check or subject to control. <i>This would give black people the opportunity to live unhampered by racism.</i>
<u>unimpeded</u>	Not obstructed or hindered. <i>An unimpeded view across the headland.</i>
<u>uninhibited</u>	Expressing one's feelings or thoughts unselfconsciously and without restraint. <i>Uninhibited exuberance.</i>
unlimited	Without reservation or exception. <i>To start with a theory of unlimited freedom is to end up with unlimited despotism.</i>
unrestricted	Not subject to or subjected to restriction. <i>Unrestricted verbs are usually stronger than those qualified by adverbs.</i>
unshackled	Not bound by shackles and chains. <i>He had handcuffs on his wrists but his feet were unshackled.</i>
unsuppressed	Given vent to. <i>Unsuppressed feelings.</i>
untrammelled	Not confined or limited- Russell Lord- Farley Mowat. <i>A mind untrammelled by convention.</i>

appetite	A feeling of craving something- Granville Hicks. <i>An appetite for life.</i>
aspire	Direct one's hopes or ambitions towards achieving something. <i>Other people will aspire to be like you.</i>
covet	Yearn to possess (something, especially something belonging to another). <i>I covet one of their smart bags.</i>
crave	Feel a powerful desire for (something). <i>Will craved for family life.</i>
craving	An intense desire for some particular thing. <i>A craving for chocolate.</i>
desire	Express a desire for. <i>There had been a time years ago when he had desired her.</i>
famine	Extreme scarcity of food. <i>The cotton famine of the 1860s.</i>
famish	Die of food deprivation. <i>Many famished in the countryside during the drought.</i>
glutton	A person who is devoted to eating and drinking to excess. <i>He s a glutton for adventure.</i>
gluttonous	Given to excess in consumption of especially food or drink. <i>Over fed women and their gluttonous husbands.</i>
gourmand	A person who is devoted to eating and drinking to excess.
greedy	Having or showing an intense and selfish desire for wealth or power. <i>Greedy for fame.</i>
hanker	Desire strongly or persistently. <i>She hankered to go back.</i>
hankering	A yearning for something or to do something. <i>A hankering for family life.</i>
hunger	Feel or suffer hunger. <i>When he had fasted forty days and forty nights he afterwards hungered.</i>

hungry	(usually followed by `for') extremely desirous. <i>A world full of hungry people.</i>
insatiable	Of a person having an insatiable appetite or desire for something especially sex. <i>An insatiable demand for old buildings to restore.</i>
lupine	Any plant of the genus <i>Lupinus</i> ; bearing erect spikes of usually purplish-blue flowers.
rapacious	Aggressively greedy or grasping. <i>A rapacious appetite.</i>
ravenous	Extremely hungry. <i>Ravenous as wolves.</i>
repletion	Eating until excessively full.
satiety	The state of being satisfactorily full and unable to take on more. <i>A molecule that seems to regulate satiety.</i>
slake	Combine (quicklime) with water to produce calcium hydroxide. <i>Slake the lime within a day or two of purchase.</i>
starve	Feel very hungry. <i>The arts are being starved of funds.</i>
tantalize	Excite the senses or desires of (someone). <i>She still tantalized him.</i>
thirst	Have a strong desire for something. <i>Tens of thousands died of thirst and starvation.</i>
voracious	Devouring or craving food in great quantities. <i>Paying taxes to voracious governments.</i>
want	Feel or have a desire for want strongly. <i>Your former neighbor is wanted by the FBI.</i>
yearn	Be filled with compassion or warm feeling. <i>No fellow spirit yearned towards her.</i>
yearning	Involving or expressing yearning. <i>A yearning hope.</i>
