## Synonyms of "Unreasonable" as an adjective (36 Words)

<b>absurd</b>	Arousing amusement or derision; ridiculous. <i>The <b>absurd</b> predicament of seeming to argue that virtue is highly desirable but intensely unpleasant.</i>
<b>annoying</b>	Causing irritation or annoyance. <i>Unsolicited calls are <b>annoying</b>.</i>
<b>awkward</b>	Lacking grace or skill in manner or movement or performance. <i>I felt <b>awkward</b> standing in front of the whole class.</i>
<b><u>contrary</u></b>	Perversely inclined to disagree or to do the opposite of what is expected or desired. <i>Hot and cold are <b>contrary</b> terms.</i>
<b>difficult</b>	Hard to control. <i>Nesting places on the cliffs are <b>difficult</b> of access.</i>
<b>disobliging</b>	Deliberately unhelpful; uncooperative. <i>I think you're simply being <b>disobliging</b>.</i>

<b><u>disproportionate</u></b>	Out of proportion. <i>People on lower incomes spend a <b>disproportionate</b> amount of their income on fuel.</i>
<b>exaggerated</b>	Represented as greater than is true or reasonable. <i>An <b>exaggerated</b> account of his adventures.</i>
<b>excessive</b>	Unrestrained, especially with regard to feelings. <i>He was drinking <b>excessive</b> amounts of brandy.</i>
<b>extravagant</b>	Lacking restraint in spending money or using resources. <i>It was rather <b>extravagant</b> to buy both.</i>
<b>extreme</b>	Denoting or relating to a sport performed in a hazardous environment and involving great risk. <i>Expulsion is an <b>extreme</b> sanction.</i>
<b>going too far</b>	In full operation.
<b>illogical</b>	Lacking in correct logical relation. <i>An <b>illogical</b> fear of the supernatural.</i>
<b>immoderate</b>	Not sensible or restrained; excessive. <i><b>Immoderate</b> spending.</i>
<b><u>inordinate</u></b>	Beyond normal limits. <i>The case had taken up an <b>inordinate</b> amount of time.</i>
<b><u>irrational</u></b>	Of a number quantity or expression not expressible as a ratio of two integers and having an infinite and non recurring expansion when expressed as a decimal Examples of irrational numbers are the number and the square root of 2. <i><b>Irrational</b> fears.</i>
<b><u>ludicrous</u></b>	So unreasonable as to invite derision. <i>Every night he wore a <b>ludicrous</b> outfit.</i>
<b>needless</b>	Unnecessary and unwarranted. <i>I deplore <b>needless</b> waste.</i>
<b>nonsensical</b>	Having no intelligible meaning. <i>Ask a <b>nonsensical</b> question and get a <b>nonsensical</b> answer.</i>
<b>obstructive</b>	Causing a blockage or obstruction. <i>He denied the council had been <b>obstructive</b>.</i>
<b><u>outrageous</u></b>	Grossly offensive to decency or morality; causing horror. <i>An <b>outrageous</b> act of bribery.</i>
<b>over the limit</b>	Having come or been brought to a conclusion.
<b>overblown</b>	Puffed up with vanity. <i>His most rhetorically <b>overblown</b> screenplay.</i>

<b>overripe</b>	Too ripe and beginning to turn soft. <i><b>Overripe</b> tomatoes.</i>
<b>preposterous</b>	Contrary to reason or common sense; utterly absurd or ridiculous. <i>A <b>preposterous</b> suggestion.</i>
<b>senseless</b>	Lacking sense or understanding or judgment. <i>In Vietnam I saw the <b>senseless</b> waste of human beings.</i>
<b><u>tiresome</u></b>	So lacking in interest as to cause mental weariness. <i>Weeding is a <b>tiresome</b> but essential job.</i>
<b><u>troublesome</u></b>	Difficult to deal with. <i>A <b>troublesome</b> situation.</i>
<b>unacceptable</b>	Not satisfactory or allowable. <i>The following use of access was judged <b>unacceptable</b> by a panel of linguists You can access your cash at any of 300 automatic tellers.</i>
<b>unaccommodating</b>	Not accommodating. <i>The <b>unaccommodating</b> bus driver pulled out while she was banging on the door.</i>
<b>uncooperative</b>	Intentionally unaccommodating. <i>The authorities were inclined to be <b>uncooperative</b>.</i>
<b><u>undue</u></b>	Not yet payable. <i>Desire for <b>undue</b> private profit.</i>
<b><u>unhelpful</u></b>	Not helpful. <i>Several complained that the staff were <b>unhelpful</b>.</i>
<b>unnecessary</b>	Not necessary. <i>Good construction is essential to avoid <b>unnecessary</b> waste.</i>
<b><u>unwarranted</u></b>	Without a basis in reason or fact. <i>I am sure your fears are <b>unwarranted</b>.</i>
<b><u>vexatious</u></b>	Causing or tending to cause annoyance, frustration, or worry. <i>The <b>vexatious</b> questions posed by software copyrights.</i>

<b>absurd</b>	An absurd state of affairs. <i>The incidents that followed bordered on the <b>absurd</b>.</i>
<b>apostasy</b>	The act of abandoning a party for cause. <i>The execution of their leader for <b>apostasy</b> brought widespread criticism.</i>
<b><u>arbitrary</u></b>	(of power or a ruling body) unrestrained and autocratic in the use of authority. <i>An <b>arbitrary</b> choice.</i>
<b>excessive</b>	Beyond normal limits. <i><b>Excessive</b> charges.</i>
<b>excessively</b>	To a degree exceeding normal or proper limits. <i>They don't drink <b>excessively</b>.</i>

<b>garbled</b>	Lacking orderly continuity. <i>I got a <b>garbled</b> set of directions.</i>
<b>groundless</b>	Not based on any good reason. <i>Your fears are quite <b>groundless</b>.</i>
<b>illogical</b>	Lacking sense or clear, sound reasoning. <i>An <b>illogical</b> fear of the supernatural.</i>
<b><u>impossible</u></b>	(used of persons or their behavior) not acceptable or reasonable. <i>His assignment verged on the <b>impossible</b>.</i>
<b>impracticable</b>	(of a course of action) impossible in practice to do or carry out. <i>Refloating the sunken ship proved <b>impracticable</b> because of its fragility.</i>
<b><u>incoherent</u></b>	Unable to express yourself clearly or fluently. <i>A turgid <b>incoherent</b> presentation.</i>
<b><u>incongruent</u></b>	Incongruous; incompatible.
<b>indefensible</b>	Not justifiable by argument. <i>The towns were tactically <b>indefensible</b>.</i>
<b>inexcusable</b>	Not excusable. <i>Matt's behaviour was <b>inexcusable</b>.</i>
<b><u>inordinate</u></b>	Beyond normal limits. <i>The case had taken up an <b>inordinate</b> amount of time.</i>
<b>insuperable</b>	Impossible to surmount. <i><b>Insuperable</b> odds.</i>
<b>insupportable</b>	Incapable of being justified or explained. <i>He had arrived at a wholly <b>insupportable</b> conclusion.</i>
<b><u>invalid</u></b>	Force to retire, remove from active duty, as of firemen. <i>An officer <b>invalided</b> by a chest wound.</i>
<b><u>irrational</u></b>	An irrational number or quantity a surd. <i><b>Irrational</b> feelings of hostility.</i>
<b><u>ludicrous</u></b>	So foolish, unreasonable, or out of place as to be amusing. <i>Every night he wore a <b>ludicrous</b> outfit.</i>
<b><u>overly</u></b>	To a degree exceeding normal or proper limits. <i>She was a jealous and <b>overly</b> possessive woman.</i>
<b>preposterous</b>	Contrary to reason or common sense; utterly absurd or ridiculous. <i>A <b>preposterous</b> attempt to turn back the pages of history.</i>
<b><u>undue</u></b>	Beyond normal limits. <i>Desire for <b>undue</b> private profit.</i>
<b><u>unfounded</u></b>	Without a basis in reason or fact. <i>Her fear that she had cancer was <b>unfounded</b>.</i>

- unjustifiable** Incapable of being justified or explained.  
*An **unjustifiable** restriction on their freedom.*
- unjustified** (of printed text) not justified.  
***Unjustified** price increases.*
- unpardonable** Not admitting of pardon.  
*An **unpardonable** sin.*
- unsupported** Not borne out by evidence or facts.  
***Unsupported** accusations.*
- untenable** (especially of a position or view) not able to be maintained or defended against attack or objection.  
*This argument is clearly **untenable**.*
- unwarranted** Not justified or authorized.  
***Unwarranted** jealousy.*
