Synonyms of "Unreasonable" as an adjective (36 Words)

absurd	Arousing amusement or derision; ridiculous. <i>The absurd predicament of seeming to argue that virtue is highly desirable but intensely unpleasant.</i>
annoying	Causing irritation or annoyance. <i>Unsolicited calls are annoying.</i>
awkward	Lacking grace or skill in manner or movement or performance. <i>I felt awkward standing in front of the whole class.</i>
<u>contrary</u>	Perversely inclined to disagree or to do the opposite of what is expected or desired. <i>Hot and cold are contrary terms.</i>
difficult	Hard to control. <i>Nesting places on the cliffs are difficult of access.</i>
disobliging	Deliberately unhelpful; uncooperative. <i>I think you're simply being disobliging.</i>

<u>disproportionate</u>	Out of proportion. <i>People on lower incomes spend a disproportionate amount of their income on fuel.</i>
exaggerated	Represented as greater than is true or reasonable. <i>An exaggerated account of his adventures.</i>
excessive	Unrestrained, especially with regard to feelings. <i>He was drinking excessive amounts of brandy.</i>
extravagant	Lacking restraint in spending money or using resources. <i>It was rather extravagant to buy both.</i>
extreme	Denoting or relating to a sport performed in a hazardous environment and involving great risk. <i>Expulsion is an extreme sanction.</i>
going too far	In full operation.
illogical	Lacking in correct logical relation. <i>An illogical fear of the supernatural.</i>
immoderate	Not sensible or restrained; excessive. <i>Immoderate spending.</i>
<u>inordinate</u>	Beyond normal limits. <i>The case had taken up an inordinate amount of time.</i>
<u>irrational</u>	Of a number quantity or expression not expressible as a ratio of two integers and having an infinite and non recurring expansion when expressed as a decimal Examples of irrational numbers are the number and the square root of 2. <i>Irrational fears.</i>
<u>ludicrous</u>	So unreasonable as to invite derision. <i>Every night he wore a ludicrous outfit.</i>
needless	Unnecessary and unwarranted. <i>I deplore needless waste.</i>
nonsensical	Having no intelligible meaning. <i>Ask a nonsensical question and get a nonsensical answer.</i>
obstructive	Causing a blockage or obstruction. <i>He denied the council had been obstructive.</i>
<u>outrageous</u>	Grossly offensive to decency or morality; causing horror. <i>An outrageous act of bribery.</i>
over the limit	Having come or been brought to a conclusion.
overblown	Puffed up with vanity. <i>His most rhetorically overblown screenplay.</i>

overripe	Too ripe and beginning to turn soft. Overripe tomatoes.
preposterous	Contrary to reason or common sense; utterly absurd or ridiculous. A preposterous suggestion.
senseless	Lacking sense or understanding or judgment. In Vietnam I saw the senseless waste of human beings.
<u>tiresome</u>	So lacking in interest as to cause mental weariness. Weeding is a tiresome but essential job.
<u>troublesome</u>	Difficult to deal with. A troublesome situation.
unacceptable	Not satisfactory or allowable. The following use of access was judged unacceptable by a panel of linguists You can access your cash at any of 300 automatic tellers.
unaccommodating	Not accommodating. The unaccommodating bus driver pulled out while she was banging on the door.
uncooperative	Intentionally unaccommodating. The authorities were inclined to be uncooperative .
<u>undue</u>	Not yet payable. Desire for undue private profit.
<u>unhelpful</u>	Not helpful. Several complained that the staff were unhelpful .
unnecessary	Not necessary. Good construction is essential to avoid unnecessary waste.
<u>unwarranted</u>	Without a basis in reason or fact. I am sure your fears are unwarranted .
<u>vexatious</u>	Causing or tending to cause annoyance, frustration, or worry. The vexatious questions posed by software copyrights.

absurd	An absurd state of affairs. <i>The incidents that followed bordered on the absurd.</i>
apostasy	The act of abandoning a party for cause. <i>The execution of their leader for apostasy brought widespread criticism.</i>
<u>arbitrary</u>	(of power or a ruling body) unrestrained and autocratic in the use of authority. <i>An arbitrary choice.</i>
excessive	Beyond normal limits. <i>Excessive charges.</i>
excessively	To a degree exceeding normal or proper limits. <i>They don't drink excessively.</i>

garbled	Lacking orderly continuity. <i>I got a garbled set of directions.</i>
groundless	Not based on any good reason. <i>Your fears are quite groundless.</i>
illogical	Lacking sense or clear, sound reasoning. <i>An illogical fear of the supernatural.</i>
<u>impossible</u>	(used of persons or their behavior) not acceptable or reasonable. <i>His assignment verged on the impossible.</i>
impracticable	(of a course of action) impossible in practice to do or carry out. <i>Refloating the sunken ship proved impracticable because of its fragility.</i>
<u>incoherent</u>	Unable to express yourself clearly or fluently. <i>A turgid incoherent presentation.</i>
<u>incongruent</u>	Incongruous; incompatible.
indefensible	Not justifiable by argument. <i>The towns were tactically indefensible.</i>
inexcusable	Not excusable. <i>Matt s behaviour was inexcusable.</i>
<u>inordinate</u>	Beyond normal limits. <i>The case had taken up an inordinate amount of time.</i>
insuperable	Impossible to surmount. <i>Insuperable odds.</i>
insupportable	Incapable of being justified or explained. <i>He had arrived at a wholly insupportable conclusion.</i>
<u>invalid</u>	Force to retire, remove from active duty, as of firemen. <i>An officer invalided by a chest wound.</i>
<u>irrational</u>	An irrational number or quantity a surd. <i>Irrational feelings of hostility.</i>
<u>ludicrous</u>	So foolish, unreasonable, or out of place as to be amusing. <i>Every night he wore a ludicrous outfit.</i>
<u>overly</u>	To a degree exceeding normal or proper limits. <i>She was a jealous and overly possessive woman.</i>
preposterous	Contrary to reason or common sense; utterly absurd or ridiculous. <i>A preposterous attempt to turn back the pages of history.</i>
<u>undue</u>	Beyond normal limits. <i>Desire for undue private profit.</i>
<u>unfounded</u>	Without a basis in reason or fact. <i>Her fear that she had cancer was unfounded.</i>

- unjustifiable** Incapable of being justified or explained.
*An **unjustifiable** restriction on their freedom.*
- unjustified** (of printed text) not justified.
***Unjustified** price increases.*
- unpardonable** Not admitting of pardon.
*An **unpardonable** sin.*
- unsupported** Not borne out by evidence or facts.
***Unsupported** accusations.*
- untenable** (especially of a position or view) not able to be maintained or defended against attack or objection.
*This argument is clearly **untenable**.*
- unwarranted** Not justified or authorized.
***Unwarranted** jealousy.*
