| <b>inapplicable</b>       | Not capable of being applied.<br><i>Rules <b>inapplicable</b> to day students.</i>   |
| <b>inapt</b>              | Not elegant or graceful in expression.<br><i>A more <b>inapt</b> name I cannot imagine.</i>  |
| <b>independent</b>        | Capable of standing syntactically alone as a complete sentence.<br><i>I wanted to remain <b>independent</b> in old age.</i>  |
| <b>individual</b>         | Characteristic of or meant for a single person or thing.<br><i>They went their <b>individual</b> ways.</i>   |
| <b><u>irrelevant</u></b>  | Not connected with or relevant to something.<br><i>An <b>irrelevant</b> comment.</i>   |
| <b>not germane</b>        | Relevant and appropriate.  |
| <b>not pertinent</b>      | Having precise or logical relevance to the matter at hand.   |
| <b>off the point</b>      | Not performing or scheduled for duties.  |
| <b>off the subject</b>    | In an unpalatable state.   |
| <b>peripheral</b>         | Related to the key issue but not of central importance.<br><i>Energy is far from a <b>peripheral</b> issue in the economy.</i>   |
| <b>separate</b>           | Separated according to race sex class or religion.<br><i>He regards the study of literature as quite <b>separate</b> from life.</i>  |
| <b>unallied</b>           | Not allied; having no allies.  |
| <b>unassociated</b>       | Not connected or associated.<br><i>The issue is being raised by thousands of <b>unassociated</b> individuals.</i>  |
| <b>unattached</b>         | Not associated in an exclusive sexual relationship.<br><i>She began to wonder if he was <b>unattached</b>.</i>   |
| <b><u>unconcerned</u></b> | Showing a lack of worry or interest, especially when this is surprising or callous.<br><i>The prisoner seems entirely <b>unconcerned</b> as to the outcome of the examination.</i> |
| <b>unconnected</b>        | Not joined together or to something else.<br><i>The earth wire was left <b>unconnected</b>.</i>  |
| <b>uncoupled</b>          | Having the coupling undone.<br><i>The <b>uncoupled</b> caboose rolled down the incline.</i>  |

| <b>alien</b>             | Not contained in or deriving from the essential nature of something.<br><i><b>Alien</b> beings.</i>  |

| <b>completely</b>   | To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent ('whole' is often used informally for 'wholly').<br><i>You must be <b>completely</b> mad.</i>  |
| <b>confound</b>     | Be confusing or perplexing to; cause to be unable to think clearly.<br><i>He was forever <b>confounding</b> managerialism with idealism.</i>        |
| <b>confuse</b>      | Make unclear, indistinct, or blurred.<br><i>Her remarks <b>confused</b> the debate.</i>   |
| <b>discomfit</b>    | Make (someone) feel uneasy or embarrassed.<br><i>He was not noticeably <b>discomfited</b> by her tone.</i>  |
| <b>disconcert</b>   | Cause to lose one's composure.<br><i>The abrupt change of subject <b>disconcerted</b> her.</i>  |
| <b>discordant</b>   | (of a matched pair of subjects, especially twins) not having the same trait or disease.<br><i>Views <b>discordant</b> with present day ideas.</i>   |
| <b>disorder</b>     | Bring disorder to.<br><i>The world's currency markets were in <b>disorder</b>.</i>  |
| <b>embarrass</b>    | Cause to be embarrassed; cause to feel self-conscious.<br><i>He would be <b>embarrassed</b> by estate duty.</i>                                     |
| <b>entirely</b>     | Completely (often used for emphasis).<br><i>We have an <b>entirely</b> different outlook.</i>   |
| <b>foreign</b>      | Not belonging to that in which it is contained; introduced from an outside source.<br><i>I suppose this all feels pretty <b>foreign</b> to you.</i> |
| <b>generic</b>      | Applicable to an entire class or group.<br><i>Acetaminophen is the <b>generic</b> form of the proprietary drug Tylenol.</i>                         |
| <b>irrespective</b> | Not taking (something) into account; regardless of.<br><i>Child benefit is paid <b>irrespective</b> of income levels.</i>                           |
| <b>mystify</b>      | Make obscure or mysterious.<br><i><b>Mystify</b> the story.</i>   |
| <b>outright</b>     | Without reservation or concealment.<br><i>The impact killed four horses <b>outright</b>.</i>  |
| <b>perfectly</b>    | Used for emphasis, especially in order to assert something that has been challenged or doubted.<br><i>You're <b>perfectly</b> right.</i>            |

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| <b>perplex</b>           | Make more complicated.<br><i>They were <b>perplexing</b> a subject plain in itself.</i>  |
| <b><u>solely</u></b>     | Without any others being included or involved.<br><i>He is <b>solely</b> responsible for any debts the company may incur.</i>                                      |
| <b><u>thoroughly</u></b> | Completely and absolutely good is sometimes used informally for thoroughly.<br><i>We searched the files <b>thoroughly</b>.</i>                                     |
| <b><u>totally</u></b>    | Completely; absolutely.<br><i>A <b>totally</b> new situation.</i>  |
| <b><u>unfamiliar</u></b> | Not known or recognized.<br><i>Be alert at night especially in <b>unfamiliar</b> surroundings.</i>   |
| <b>unsuited</b>          | Not right or appropriate.<br><i>He was totally <b>unsuited</b> for the job.</i>  |
