Synonyms of "Unremarkable" as an adjective (8 Words)

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| dull | Not clear and resonant; sounding as if striking with or against something relatively soft. <i>Next morning dawned dull.</i> |
| everyday | Happening or used every day; daily. <i>Everyday clothes.</i> |
| monotonous | Dull, tedious, and repetitious; lacking in variety and interest. <i>Nothing is so monotonous as the sea.</i> |
| mundane | Lacking interest or excitement; dull. <i>His mundane humdrum existence.</i> |

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| quotidian | Found in the ordinary course of events. <i>His story is an achingly human one mired in quotidian details.</i> |
| routine | Performed as part of a regular procedure rather than for a special reason. <i>It was a routine day.</i> |
| tedious | So lacking in interest as to cause mental weariness. <i>A tedious journey.</i> |
| workaday | Not special, unusual, or interesting; ordinary. <i>The workaday world of timecards and performance reviews.</i> |

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| acceptation | A particular sense or the generally recognized meaning common acceptation of a word or phrase. |
| banal | Repeated too often; overfamiliar through overuse. <i>Songs with banal repeated words.</i> |
| banality | The fact or condition of being banal; unoriginality. <i>There is an essential banality to the story he tells.</i> |
| boring | Not interesting; tedious. <i>A boring evening with uninteresting people.</i> |
| bromide | A reproduction or piece of typesetting on bromide paper. <i>Feel good bromides create the illusion of problem solving.</i> |
| cliche | A trite or obvious remark. |
| common | Commonly encountered. <i>Produced the common cloths used by the poorer population.</i> |
| commonplace | A notable passage in a work copied into a commonplace book. <i>Bombing has become almost a commonplace of public life there.</i> |
| dull | Make or become dull or less intense. <i>Albert s eyes dulled a little.</i> |
| featureless | Lacking distinctive attributes or aspects. <i>The featureless landscape of the steppe.</i> |

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| <u>general</u> | A high rank of officer in the army and in the US air force above lieutenant general and below field marshal general of the army or general of the air force. <i>A general description of the merchandise.</i> |
| hackneyed | (of a phrase or idea) having been overused; unoriginal and trite. <i>Hackneyed old sayings.</i> |
| median | Denoting the middle term or mean of the middle two terms of a series arranged in order of magnitude For example the median number of the series 55 62 76 85 93 is 76. <i>The median income for the year was 15 000.</i> |
| mediocre | Of only average quality; not very good. <i>The caliber of the students has gone from mediocre to above average.</i> |
| mediocrity | A person of second-rate ability or value. <i>The team suddenly came good after years of mediocrity.</i> |
| <u>mundane</u> | Found in the ordinary course of events. <i>Not a fairy palace yet a mundane wonder of unimagined kind.</i> |
| nondescript | A nondescript person or thing. <i>She lived in a nondescript suburban apartment block.</i> |
| normal | Conforming with or constituting a norm or standard or level or type or social norm not abnormal. <i>Of normal intelligence.</i> |
| ordinary | Not exceptional in any way especially in quality or ability or size or degree. <i>Ordinary decency.</i> |
| plain | Express complaints discontent displeasure or unhappiness. <i>My mother complains all day.</i> |
| <u>platitude</u> | A remark or statement, especially one with a moral content, that has been used too often to be interesting or thoughtful. <i>She began uttering liberal platitudes.</i> |
| <u>prevalent</u> | Predominant; powerful. <i>The social ills prevalent in society today.</i> |
| quotidian | Found in the ordinary course of events. <i>The car sped noisily off through the quotidian traffic.</i> |
| routine | Organize according to a routine. <i>It was a routine day.</i> |
| <u>smooth</u> | Smoothly agreeable and courteous with a degree of sophistication. <i>Cook gently until the sauce is smooth.</i> |

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| <u>typical</u> | Conforming to a type. <i>You really are a typical journalist.</i> |
| uncharacteristically | In uncharacteristic manner. <i>She seemed uncharacteristically quiet.</i> |
| unexceptional | Not special in any way. <i>An unexceptional movie.</i> |
| <u>usual</u> | The drink one habitually prefers. <i>The child s usual bedtime.</i> |
| <u>worldly</u> | Characteristic of or devoted to the temporal world as opposed to the spiritual world. <i>The benefits of his worldly wisdom.</i> |
