### Definitions of "Unselfish" as an adjective

- *Disregarding your own advantages and welfare over those of others.*

<b>altruistic</b>	Showing a disinterested and selfless concern for the well-being of others; unselfish. <i>It was an entirely <b>altruistic</b> act.</i>
<b>disinterested</b>	Not influenced by considerations of personal advantage. <i>A banker is under an obligation to give <b>disinterested</b> advice.</i>
<b>self-denying</b>	Willing to deprive yourself.
<b>self-sacrificing</b>	Willing to deprive yourself.
<b><a href="#">selfless</a></b>	Showing unselfish concern for the welfare of others. <i>An act of <b>selfless</b> devotion.</i>

## Associations of "Unselfish" (30 Words)

<b>alms</b>	(in historical contexts) money or food given to poor people. <i>The riders stopped to distribute <b>alms</b>.</i>
<b>altruistic</b>	Showing a disinterested and selfless concern for the well-being of others; unselfish. <i>It was an entirely <b>altruistic</b> act.</i>
<b>benefactor</b>	A person who helps people or institutions (especially with financial help). <i>A low interest loan from a <b>benefactor</b> allowed them to build a floor for the exhibition hall.</i>
<b>benefic</b>	Exerting a favorable or beneficent influence. <i>A <b>benefic</b> star.</i>
<b>beneficent</b>	Resulting in good. <i>A <b>beneficent</b> democracy.</i>
<b>benevolent</b>	Well meaning and kindly. <i>A <b>benevolent</b> smile.</i>
<b>benignity</b>	A kind act. <i>His air of <b>benignity</b>.</i>
<b>charitable</b>	Apt to judge others leniently or favourably. <i>Those who were less <b>charitable</b> called for his resignation.</i>
<b><u>considerate</u></b>	Showing concern for the rights and feelings of others. <i>Be <b>considerate</b> over your handwriting.</i>
<b>disinterested</b>	Unaffected by self-interest. <i>A banker is under an obligation to give <b>disinterested</b> advice.</i>
<b>donor</b>	Someone who gives blood or tissue or an organ to be used in another person (the host). <i>One third of patients die before a suitable <b>donor</b> is found.</i>
<b>eleemosynary</b>	Generous in assistance to the poor. <i><b>Eleemosynary</b> relief.</i>
<b><u>generosity</u></b>	The trait of being willing to give your money or time. <i>Diners certainly cannot complain about the <b>generosity</b> of portions.</i>
<b>generous</b>	(of a thing) larger or more plentiful than is usual or necessary. <i>A <b>generous</b> donation.</i>

<b>gentle</b>	Make or become gentle. <i>A <b>gentle</b> slope.</i>
<b>giver</b>	Person who makes a gift of property. <i>A <b>giver</b> of advice.</i>
<b>goodwill</b>	A disposition to kindness and compassion. <i>The scheme is dependent on <b>goodwill</b> between the two sides.</i>
<b>gracious</b>	A polite epithet used of royalty or their acts. <i>A <b>gracious</b> hostess.</i>
<b>humane</b>	(of a branch of learning) intended to have a civilizing effect on people. <i>Regulations ensuring the <b>humane</b> treatment of animals.</i>
<b>kind</b>	Having or showing a tender and considerate and helpful nature; used especially of persons and their behavior. <i>More data of this <b>kind</b> would be valuable.</i>
<b>kindly</b>	Please (used in a polite request or demand, often ironically). <i>Would you <b>kindly</b> explain what you re talking about.</i>
<b>magnanimous</b>	Generous and understanding and tolerant. <i>She should be <b>magnanimous</b> in victory.</i>
<b>merciful</b>	Showing or giving mercy. <i>A <b>merciful</b> god.</i>
<b>mercy</b>	Compassion or forgiveness shown towards someone whom it is within one's power to punish or harm. <i>The boy was screaming and begging for <b>mercy</b>.</i>
<b>philanthropic</b>	(of a person or organization) seeking to promote the welfare of others; generous and benevolent. <i>They receive financial support from <b>philanthropic</b> bodies.</i>
<b>reflective</b>	Providing a reflection; capable of reflecting light or other radiation. <i>The <b>reflective</b> type.</i>
<b>selfless</b>	Showing unselfish concern for the welfare of others. <i>An act of <b>selfless</b> devotion.</i>
<b>thoughtful</b>	Taking heed giving close and thoughtful attention. <i>A deeply <b>thoughtful</b> essay.</i>
<b>tolerant</b>	Tolerant and forgiving under provocation. <i>We must be <b>tolerant</b> of others.</i>
<b>unstinting</b>	Very generous. <i>He was <b>unstinting</b> in his praise.</i>
