Associations of "Unsettling" (30 Words)

attenuate	Become weaker, in strength, value, or magnitude. <i>Her intolerance was attenuated by an unexpected liberalism.</i>
balance	Bring into balance or equilibrium. <i>The cost of obtaining such information needs to be balanced against its benefits.</i>
counteract	Oppose or check by a counteraction. <i>This will counteract the foolish actions of my colleagues.</i>
counterbalance	Contrast with equal weight or force. <i>The trolley used a counterbalance and leverage action to reduce the effort of lifting loads.</i>
counterweight	Constitute a counterweight or counterbalance to. <i>The scales have a series of counterweights that slide along a calibrated beam.</i>
dampen	Suppress or constrain so as to lessen in intensity. <i>Slider switches on the mixers can dampen the drums.</i>
deaden	Lessen the momentum or velocity of. <i>Laughter might deaden us to the moral issue.</i>
debilitate	Make weak. <i>He was severely debilitated by a stomach upset.</i>
diatonic	Of a melody or harmony constructed from a diatonic scale.
dilute	Lessen the strength or flavor of a solution or mixture. <i>A dilute solution of potassium permanganate.</i>
dispassionate	Not influenced by strong emotion, and so able to be rational and impartial. <i>A journalist should be a dispassionate reporter of fact.</i>
embarrass	Cause to be embarrassed cause to feel self conscious. <i>The state of the rivers will embarrass the enemy.</i>

enervate	Lacking in energy or vitality. <i>The enervate slightness of his frail form.</i>
enfeeble	Make weak or feeble. <i>The breakdown in law and order enfeebled the government's authority.</i>
equilibrium	Equality of distribution. <i>The task is the maintenance of social equilibrium.</i>
equipoise	Balance of forces or interests. <i>Capital flows act as an equipoise to international imbalances in savings.</i>
equity	Stocks and shares that carry no fixed interest. <i>People who have built up a significant amount of equity in their homes.</i>
even	Become even or more even. <i>Even amounts of butter and sugar.</i>
fatigued	Drained of energy or effectiveness; extremely tired; completely exhausted.
faze	Disturb or disconcert (someone). <i>She was not fazed by his show of anger.</i>
impartiality	Equal treatment of all rivals or disputants; fairness. <i>Entries had to be submitted under a pseudonym to ensure impartiality in the judging process.</i>
intimidate	To compel or deter by or as if by threats. <i>Her boss intimidates her.</i>
neutrality	The condition of being chemically or electrically neutral. <i>During the war Switzerland maintained its neutrality.</i>
offset	Produce by offset printing. <i>These wheels have an offset of four inches.</i>
steadiness	The quality of being regular, even, and continuous in development, frequency, or intensity. <i>We got a glimpse of the steadiness and maturity we need to steer through this crisis.</i>
symmetry	Balance among the parts of something. <i>The overall symmetry makes the poem pleasant to the ear.</i>
tonal	Having tonality i.e. tones and chords organized in relation to one tone such as a keynote or tonic. <i>The poem's tonal lapses.</i>
undermine	Lessen the effectiveness, power, or ability of, especially gradually or insidiously. <i>The demolition engineers did eventually undermine two of the tower's six sides.</i>

weaken

Become weaker.
*The fever **weakened** his body.*
