- *Not sound financially.*
- *(of a person) not holding acceptable views.*

- *Not in good condition; damaged or decayed.*

<b><u>broken</u></b>	Out of working order busted is an informal substitute for broken. <i>A <b>broken</b> tooth.</i>
<b>broken-down</b>	Not in working order.
<b>casuistic</b>	Of or relating to the use of ethical principles to resolve moral problems. <i>Overly subtle <b>casuistic</b> reasoning.</i>
<b>crazed</b>	(of porcelain) characterized by a network of fine cracks in the glaze. <i><b>Crazed</b> china should not be used for serving food as the tiny cracks can harbour bacteria.</i>
<b>crumbling</b>	Breaking or falling apart into small fragments, especially as part of a process of deterioration. <i>He was trying to escape financial problems and a <b>crumbling</b> marriage.</i>
<b>damaged</b>	Harmed or injured or spoiled. <i>Her <b>damaged</b> reputation.</i>
<b>dangerous</b>	Causing fear or anxiety by threatening great harm. <i>A <b>dangerous</b> operation.</i>
<b>decaying</b>	Declining in quality, power, or vigour. <i>Old <b>decaying</b> buildings.</i>
<b><u>defective</u></b>	Having a defect. <i>Complaints over <b>defective</b> goods.</i>
<b>demented</b>	Suffering from dementia. <i>She was <b>demented</b> with worry.</i>
<b><u>deranged</u></b>	Mad; insane. <i>A <b>deranged</b> gunman.</i>
<b><u>diseased</u></b>	Abnormal and corrupt. <i><b>Diseased</b> trees.</i>
<b>disordered</b>	Suffering from an illness or condition that disrupts normal physical or mental functions. <i>The small <b>disordered</b> room.</i>
<b>distracted</b>	Having the attention diverted especially because of anxiety. <i>Charlotte seemed too <b>distracted</b> to give him much attention.</i>

<b>disturbed</b>	Afflicted with or marked by anxious uneasiness or trouble or grief. <b><i>Disturbed</i></b> sleep.
<b><u>dubious</u></b>	Not convinced. <i>Timeshare has been brought into disrepute by <b>dubious</b> sales methods.</i>
<b><u>erroneous</u></b>	Wrong; incorrect. <i>Employers sometimes make <b>erroneous</b> assumptions.</i>
<b>fallacious</b>	Based on an incorrect or misleading notion or information. <b><i>Fallacious</i></b> testimony.
<b>fallible</b>	Wanting in moral strength, courage, or will; having the attributes of man as opposed to e.g. divine beings. <i>Experts can be <b>fallible</b>.</i>
<b>false</b>	Used in names of plants animals and gems that superficially resemble the thing properly so called e.g false oat. <b><i>False</i></b> eyelashes.
<b><u>faulty</u></b>	Having a defect. <i>He submitted a <b>faulty</b> report.</i>
<b><u>flawed</u></b>	Having a blemish or flaw. <i>A <b>flawed</b> hero.</i>
<b>flimsy</b>	(of clothing) very light and thin. <i>A <b>flimsy</b> table.</i>
<b>hollow</b>	As if echoing in a hollow space. <i>A <b>hollow</b> wall.</i>
<b>illogical</b>	Lacking orderly continuity. <i>An <b>illogical</b> fear of the supernatural.</i>
<b><u>insane</u></b>	In a state of mind which prevents normal perception, behaviour, or social interaction; seriously mentally ill. <i>He had gone <b>insane</b>.</i>
<b>insubstantial</b>	Lacking in nutritive value. <b><i>Insubstantial</i></b> evidence.
<b><u>irrational</u></b>	Of a number quantity or expression not expressible as a ratio of two integers and having an infinite and non recurring expansion when expressed as a decimal Examples of irrational numbers are the number and the square root of 2. <b><i>Irrational</i></b> fears.
<b>jerry-built</b>	Of inferior workmanship and materials.
<b><u>questionable</u></b>	Able to be refuted. <i>A <b>questionable</b> reputation.</i>

<b>ramshackle</b>	In deplorable condition. <i>A <b>ramshackle</b> old pier.</i>
<b>rickety</b>	Inclined to shake as from weakness or defect. <i>We went carefully up the <b>rickety</b> stairs.</i>
<b><u>rotten</u></b>	Very bad. <i>He s had <b>rotten</b> luck this year.</i>
<b><u>shaky</u></b>	Vibrating slightly and irregularly; as e.g. with fear or cold or like the leaves of an aspen in a breeze. <i>A <b>shaky</b> marriage.</i>
<b>sophistic</b>	Of or pertaining to sophists.
<b>specious</b>	Based on pretense; deceptively pleasing. <i>A <b>specious</b> argument.</i>
<b>spurious</b>	(of a line of reasoning) apparently but not actually valid. <i><b>Spurious</b> inferences.</i>
<b><u>suspect</u></b>	Not as expected. <i>Her motives were <b>suspect</b>.</i>
<b><u>tenuous</u></b>	Very slender or fine; insubstantial. <i>A <b>tenuous</b> fluid.</i>
<b>tottery</b>	Unsteady in gait as from infirmity or old age. <i>A <b>tottery</b> old man.</i>
<b><u>troubled</u></b>	Characterized by or indicative of distress or affliction or danger or need. <i>A <b>troubled</b> expression.</i>
<b>unbalanced</b>	(of a person) emotionally or mentally disturbed. <i>This may give an <b>unbalanced</b> impression of the competition.</i>
<b><u>unfit</u></b>	Below the required standards for a purpose. <i>Certified as <b>unfit</b> for army service.</i>
<b><u>unfounded</u></b>	Without a basis in reason or fact. <i><b>Unfounded</b> suspicions.</i>
<b>ungrounded</b>	Not electrically earthed. <i>An <b>ungrounded</b> screen can act as an antenna.</i>
<b>unhinged</b>	Affected with madness or insanity. <i>The violent acts of <b>unhinged</b> minds.</i>
<b>unreliable</b>	Lacking a sense of responsibility. <i><b>Unreliable</b> information.</i>
<b>unsafe</b>	Involving or causing danger or risk; liable to hurt or harm. <i>Drinking water in some areas may be <b>unsafe</b>.</i>

<b><u>unstable</u></b>	Prone to psychiatric problems or sudden changes of mood. <i>The tower proved to be <b>unstable</b> in the high wind.</i>
<b>unsubstantiated</b>	Not supported or proven by evidence. <i><b>Unsubstantiated</b> claims.</i>
<b>unsupported</b>	Not given financial or other assistance. <i>Removal of the central post left the roof <b>unsupported</b>.</i>
<b><u>untenable</u></b>	Incapable of being defended or justified. <i>This argument is clearly <b>untenable</b>.</i>
<b><u>weak</u></b>	Relating to or denoting the weakest of the known kinds of force between particles which acts only at distances less than about 10 cm is very much weaker than the electromagnetic and the strong interactions and conserves neither strangeness parity nor isospin. <i>A <b>weak</b> market for oil stocks.</i>
<b>wobbly</b>	(of a line or handwriting) not straight or regular. <i>A <b>wobbly</b> soprano.</i>
<b>wrong</b>	Based on or acting or judging in error. <i>The clock showed the <b>wrong</b> time.</i>

<b>disordered</b>	Not arranged in order. <i>She went to comb her <b>disordered</b> hair.</i>
<b>disqualify</b>	Declare (someone) ineligible for an office, activity, or competition because of an offence or infringement. <i>A heart murmur disqualified him for military service.</i>
<b>fallible</b>	Wanting in moral strength, courage, or will; having the attributes of man as opposed to e.g. divine beings. <i>I m only a <b>fallible</b> human.</i>
<b>garbled</b>	Lacking orderly continuity. <i>I got a <b>garbled</b> set of directions.</i>
<b>illogical</b>	Lacking orderly continuity. <i>An <b>illogical</b> fear of the supernatural.</i>
<b><u>imperfect</u></b>	The imperfect tense. <i>Drainage here is <b>imperfect</b>.</i>
<b><u>improper</u></b>	Not conforming to legality, moral law, or social convention. <i><b>Improper</b> banking practices.</i>
<b>inappropriate</b>	Not in keeping with what is correct or proper. <i><b>Inappropriate</b> shoes for a walk on the beach.</i>
<b><u>incongruent</u></b>	Not congruent.
<b>incongruity</b>	The state of being incongruous; incompatibility. <i>The <b>incongruity</b> of his fleshy face and skinny body disturbed her.</i>
<b><u>incongruous</u></b>	Lacking in harmony or compatibility or appropriateness. <i><b>Incongruous</b> behavior.</i>
<b>indefensible</b>	Incapable of being defended or justified. <i>This behaviour is morally <b>indefensible</b>.</i>
<b>ineligible</b>	Not eligible. <i>They were <b>ineligible</b> for jury service.</i>
<b>inexcusable</b>	Without excuse or justification. <i>Matt s behaviour was <b>inexcusable</b>.</i>
<b><u>invalid</u></b>	A person made weak or disabled by illness or injury. <i><b>Invalid</b> reasoning.</i>
<b><u>irrational</u></b>	Of a number quantity or expression not expressible as a ratio of two integers and having an infinite and non recurring expansion when expressed as a decimal Examples of irrational numbers are the number and the square root of 2. <i><b>Irrational</b> fears.</i>

<b><u>irresponsible</u></b>	(of a person, attitude, or action) not showing a proper sense of responsibility. <i>It would have been <b>irresponsible</b> just to drive on.</i>
<b><u>unbecoming</u></b>	(of behaviour) not fitting or appropriate; unseemly. <i>It was <b>unbecoming</b> for a university to do anything so crass as advertising its wares.</i>
<b><u>uncertain</u></b>	Ambiguous (especially in the negative). <i>An <b>uncertain</b> recollection of events.</i>
<b><u>unfaithful</u></b>	Disloyal, treacherous, or insincere. <i>You haven't been <b>unfaithful</b> to him have you.</i>
<b><u>unfit</u></b>	Make unfit or unsuitable. <i>The increase in the number of <b>unfit</b> and overweight children is alarming.</i>
<b><u>unjustifiable</u></b>	Incapable of being justified or explained. <i>An <b>unjustifiable</b> restriction on their freedom.</i>
<b><u>unreasonable</u></b>	Beyond normal limits. <i>She knew she was being <b>unreasonable</b> but she resented his domesticity.</i>
<b>unreliable</b>	Lacking a sense of responsibility. <i>In the early 1950s computers were large and expensive and <b>unreliable</b>.</i>
<b><u>unstable</u></b>	Affording no ease or reassurance. <i>His rather <b>unstable</b> religious convictions.</i>
<b><u>unsuitable</u></b>	Not worthy of being chosen (especially as a spouse). <i>A solvent <b>unsuitable</b> for use on wood surfaces.</i>
<b><u>untenable</u></b>	(of theories etc) incapable of being defended or justified. <i>This argument is clearly <b>untenable</b>.</i>
<b>untrustworthy</b>	Not able to be relied on as honest or truthful. <i>An <b>untrustworthy</b> person.</i>
