<b>unequaled</b>	Radically distinctive and without equal. <i>A range of facilities <b>unequaled</b> in London.</i>
<b>unexceeded</b>	Not capable of being improved on.
<b>unexcelled</b>	Not capable of being improved on. <i>His <b>unexcelled</b> capacity for hard work.</i>
<b><u>unmatched</u></b>	Eminent beyond or above comparison. <i>Infamy <b>unmatched</b> in the Western world.</i>
<b><u>unparalleled</u></b>	Radically distinctive and without equal. <i>The sudden rise in unemployment is <b>unparalleled</b> in the post war period.</i>
<b>unrivalled</b>	Better than everyone or everything of the same type. <i>The paper s coverage of foreign news is <b>unrivalled</b>.</i>
<b>unsurpassable</b>	Not capable of being improved on. <i>Zurich s pastries and confectioneries are <b>unsurpassable</b>.</i>
<b>without equal</b>	Having the requisite qualities or resources to meet a task.

<b>apex</b>	Turn (a corner) very close to the edge of the track. <i>He understands when to <b>apex</b> a corner.</i>

<b>crest</b>	Lie at the top of. <i>The swell begins to curl and <b>crest</b>.</i>
<b>elevated</b>	Of high moral or intellectual value elevated in nature or style Oliver Franks. <i>These parish gentry were conscious of their <b>elevated</b> status.</i>
<b>elevation</b>	The highest level or degree attainable; the highest stage of development. <i>There was snow at the higher <b>elevations</b>.</i>
<b>exalted</b>	Of a noble, elevated, or lofty nature. <i>I felt <b>exalted</b> and newly alive.</i>
<b>excellent</b>	Extremely good; outstanding. <i>Their results are <b>excellent</b>.</i>
<b>forefront</b>	The part in the front or nearest the viewer. <i>The idea of motion was always to the <b>forefront</b> of his mind and central to his philosophy.</i>
<b>foremost</b>	Situated closest to the bow. <i>The <b>foremost</b> compartment of the ship.</i>
<b>heyday</b>	The period of greatest prosperity or productivity. <i>The paper has lost millions of readers since its <b>heyday</b> in 1964.</i>
<b>lofty</b>	Of imposing height; especially standing out above others. <i>An extraordinary mixture of harsh reality and <b>lofty</b> ideals.</i>
<b>maximum</b>	A maximum permitted custodial sentence for an offence. <i>An offence which carries a <b>maximum</b> of 14 years.</i>
<b>meridian</b>	Relating to or situated at a meridian. <i>At the end of February Jupiter transits the <b>meridian</b> due south at 6 15 a m.</i>
<b>peak</b>	The top or extreme point of something (usually a mountain or hill). <i>A slight increase in velocity provides a second <b>peak</b> on the general velocity curve.</i>

<b><u>pinnacle</u></b>	Raise on or as if on a pinnacle. <i>He had reached the <b>pinnacle</b> of his career.</i>
<b><u>plateau</u></b>	A state of little or no change following a period of activity or progress. <i>The industry's problems have <b>plateaued</b> out.</i>
<b><u>proliferation</u></b>	Growth by the rapid multiplication of parts. <i>The <b>proliferation</b> of nuclear weapons.</i>
<b>raised</b>	Embellished with a raised pattern created by pressure or embroidery. <i>The lord and his family ate on a <b>raised</b> platform at one end of the hall.</i>
<b><u>summit</u></b>	Reach the summit of a mountain. <i>A <b>summit</b> meeting.</i>
<b>superior</b>	Of high or superior quality or performance. <i>Overcome by a <b>superior</b> opponent.</i>
<b>superlative</b>	A superlative adjective or adverb. <i>The critics lavished <b>superlatives</b> on it.</i>
<b>supreme</b>	A dish served in a supreme sauce. <i>He was nerving himself for a <b>supreme</b> effort.</i>
<b>top</b>	Be at the top of or constitute the top or highest point. <i>Her debut album <b>topped</b> the charts for five weeks.</i>
<b>towering</b>	Of great intensity. <i><b>Towering</b> icebergs.</i>
<b><u>upper</u></b>	Higher in position or status. <i>The <b>upper</b> atmosphere.</i>
<b><u>zenith</u></b>	The point above the observer that is directly opposite the nadir on the imaginary sphere against which celestial bodies appear to be projected. <i>The sun was well past the <b>zenith</b>.</i>
