inimitable	Defying imitation; matchless. <i>An inimitable style.</i>

matchless	Eminent beyond or above comparison. <i>The Parthenon has a matchless beauty.</i>
nonpareil	Eminent beyond or above comparison. <i>The team s nonpareil center fielder.</i>
peerless	Eminent beyond or above comparison. <i>A peerless scholar.</i>
second to none	A part or voice or instrument or orchestra section lower in pitch than or subordinate to the first.
surpassing	Exceeding or surpassing usual limits especially in excellence. <i>A picture of surpassing beauty.</i>
unequaled	Radically distinctive and without equal. <i>A range of facilities unequaled in London.</i>
unexceeded	Not capable of being improved on.
unexcelled	Not capable of being improved on. <i>His unexcelled capacity for hard work.</i>
<u>unmatched</u>	Eminent beyond or above comparison. <i>Infamy unmatched in the Western world.</i>
<u>unparalleled</u>	Radically distinctive and without equal. <i>The sudden rise in unemployment is unparalleled in the post war period.</i>
unrivalled	Better than everyone or everything of the same type. <i>The paper s coverage of foreign news is unrivalled.</i>
unsurpassable	Not capable of being improved on. <i>Zurich s pastries and confectioneries are unsurpassable.</i>
without equal	Having the requisite qualities or resources to meet a task.

<u>acme</u>	The highest point (of something). <i>His landscapes were deemed the acme of beauty.</i>

amplification	The process of increasing the volume of sound, especially using an amplifier. <i>Sequences were obtained from multiple amplifications from individual samples.</i>
apex	Turn (a corner) very close to the edge of the track. <i>He understands when to apex a corner.</i>
apotheosis	The highest point in the development of something; a culmination or climax. <i>Death spared Pompey the task of having to account for the apotheosis of Caesar.</i>
best	To the highest degree; most (used with verbs suggesting a desirable action or state or a successful outcome). <i>The best dressed man in Britain.</i>
crest	Lie at the top of. <i>The swell begins to curl and crest.</i>
elevated	Of high moral or intellectual value elevated in nature or style Oliver Franks. <i>These parish gentry were conscious of their elevated status.</i>
elevation	The highest level or degree attainable; the highest stage of development. <i>There was snow at the higher elevations.</i>
exalted	Of a noble, elevated, or lofty nature. <i>I felt exalted and newly alive.</i>
excellent	Extremely good; outstanding. <i>Their results are excellent.</i>
forefront	The part in the front or nearest the viewer. <i>The idea of motion was always to the forefront of his mind and central to his philosophy.</i>
foremost	Situated closest to the bow. <i>The foremost compartment of the ship.</i>
heyday	The period of greatest prosperity or productivity. <i>The paper has lost millions of readers since its heyday in 1964.</i>
lofty	Of imposing height; especially standing out above others. <i>An extraordinary mixture of harsh reality and lofty ideals.</i>
maximum	A maximum permitted custodial sentence for an offence. <i>An offence which carries a maximum of 14 years.</i>
meridian	Relating to or situated at a meridian. <i>At the end of February Jupiter transits the meridian due south at 6 15 a m.</i>
peak	The top or extreme point of something (usually a mountain or hill). <i>A slight increase in velocity provides a second peak on the general velocity curve.</i>

<u>pinnacle</u>	Raise on or as if on a pinnacle. <i>He had reached the pinnacle of his career.</i>
<u>plateau</u>	A state of little or no change following a period of activity or progress. <i>The industry's problems have plateaued out.</i>
<u>proliferation</u>	Growth by the rapid multiplication of parts. <i>The proliferation of nuclear weapons.</i>
raised	Embellished with a raised pattern created by pressure or embroidery. <i>The lord and his family ate on a raised platform at one end of the hall.</i>
<u>summit</u>	Reach the summit of a mountain. <i>A summit meeting.</i>
superior	Of high or superior quality or performance. <i>Overcome by a superior opponent.</i>
superlative	A superlative adjective or adverb. <i>The critics lavished superlatives on it.</i>
supreme	A dish served in a supreme sauce. <i>He was nerving himself for a supreme effort.</i>
top	Be at the top of or constitute the top or highest point. <i>Her debut album topped the charts for five weeks.</i>
towering	Of great intensity. <i>Towering icebergs.</i>
<u>upper</u>	Higher in position or status. <i>The upper atmosphere.</i>
<u>zenith</u>	The point above the observer that is directly opposite the nadir on the imaginary sphere against which celestial bodies appear to be projected. <i>The sun was well past the zenith.</i>
