Synonyms of "Untapped" as an adjective (4 Words)

<u>dormant</u>	(of a disease) causing no symptoms but not cured and liable to recur. <i>The disease may remain dormant and undetected until transmitted to other fish.</i>
inactive	Lacking activity; lying idle or unused. <i>The inactive X chromosome.</i>
quiescent	In a state or period of inactivity or dormancy. <i>The quiescent melancholy of the town.</i>
<u>unused</u>	Not familiar with or accustomed to. <i>Unused to spicy food she took a long mouthful of water.</i>

hypostasis	The single person of Christ, as contrasted with his dual human and divine nature.
indigenous	Originating where it is found. <i>Coriander is indigenous to southern Europe.</i>
inhabitant	A person or animal that lives in or occupies a place.
inherited	Occurring among members of a family usually by heredity. <i>An inherited disease.</i>
innate	Being talented through inherited qualities. <i>Her innate capacity for organization.</i>
interaction	Communication or direct involvement with someone or something. <i>He built tools to analyse user interactions on social networks.</i>

interactive	Capable of acting on or influencing each other. <i>Fully sighted children in interactive play with others with defective vision.</i>
nascent	Being born or beginning. <i>The nascent chicks.</i>
natal	A port city in northeastern Brazil. <i>He was living in the south many miles from his natal city.</i>
native	Used in names of animals or plants resembling others familiar elsewhere e.g native bee. <i>Native Americans.</i>
natural	Relating to earthly human or physical nature as distinct from the spiritual or supernatural realm. <i>Our natural environment.</i>
nature	The basic or inherent features, character, or qualities of something. <i>The true nature of jealousy.</i>
outdoors	Outside a building. <i>He wanted to get outdoors a little.</i>
pollinate	Convey pollen to or deposit pollen on (a stigma, ovule, flower, or plant) and so allow fertilization. <i>There are not enough bees to pollinate their crops.</i>
pollination	Transfer of pollen from the anther to the stigma of a plant. <i>Crop pollination is essential to fruit production.</i>
pollinator	An insect that carries pollen from one flower to another. <i>Bees are effective pollinators of fruit and vegetables.</i>
resource	Provide with resources. <i>A man of resource.</i>
root	Take root and begin to grow. <i>The root form of the word.</i>
scene	The pieces of scenery used in a play or opera. <i>He made a scene.</i>
source	Obtain from a particular source. <i>Each type of coffee is sourced from one country.</i>
tribal	Members of tribal communities especially in South Asia. <i>People don't want political parties stuck in rigid tribal boundaries.</i>
wavelet	A small wave of water; a ripple.
wilderness	A bewildering profusion. <i>A wilderness of masts in the harbor.</i>
