### Definitions of "Untapped" as an adjective

- *Not subjected to tapping.*

### Synonyms of "Untapped" as an adjective (4 Words)

<b><u>dormant</u></b>	(of a disease) causing no symptoms but not cured and liable to recur. <i>The disease may remain <b>dormant</b> and undetected until transmitted to other fish.</i>
<b>inactive</b>	Lacking activity; lying idle or unused. <i>The <b>inactive</b> X chromosome.</i>
<b>quiescent</b>	In a state or period of inactivity or dormancy. <i>The <b>quiescent</b> melancholy of the town.</i>
<b><u>unused</u></b>	Not familiar with or accustomed to. <i><b>Unused</b> to spicy food she took a long mouthful of water.</i>

<b>hypostasis</b>	The single person of Christ, as contrasted with his dual human and divine nature.
<b>indigenous</b>	Originating where it is found. <i>Coriander is <b>indigenous</b> to southern Europe.</i>
<b>inhabitant</b>	A person or animal that lives in or occupies a place.
<b>inherited</b>	Occurring among members of a family usually by heredity. <i>An <b>inherited</b> disease.</i>
<b>innate</b>	Being talented through inherited qualities. <i>Her <b>innate</b> capacity for organization.</i>
<b>interaction</b>	Communication or direct involvement with someone or something. <i>He built tools to analyse user <b>interactions</b> on social networks.</i>

<b>interactive</b>	Capable of acting on or influencing each other. <i>Fully sighted children in <b>interactive</b> play with others with defective vision.</i>
<b>nascent</b>	Being born or beginning. <i>The <b>nascent</b> chicks.</i>
<b>natal</b>	A port city in northeastern Brazil. <i>He was living in the south many miles from his <b>natal</b> city.</i>
<b>native</b>	Used in names of animals or plants resembling others familiar elsewhere e.g native bee. <i><b>Native</b> Americans.</i>
<b>natural</b>	Relating to earthly human or physical nature as distinct from the spiritual or supernatural realm. <i>Our <b>natural</b> environment.</i>
<b>nature</b>	The basic or inherent features, character, or qualities of something. <i>The true <b>nature</b> of jealousy.</i>
<b>outdoors</b>	Outside a building. <i>He wanted to get <b>outdoors</b> a little.</i>
<b>pollinate</b>	Convey pollen to or deposit pollen on (a stigma, ovule, flower, or plant) and so allow fertilization. <i>There are not enough bees to <b>pollinate</b> their crops.</i>
<b>pollination</b>	Transfer of pollen from the anther to the stigma of a plant. <i>Crop <b>pollination</b> is essential to fruit production.</i>
<b>pollinator</b>	An insect that carries pollen from one flower to another. <i>Bees are effective <b>pollinators</b> of fruit and vegetables.</i>
<b>resource</b>	Provide with resources. <i>A man of <b>resource</b>.</i>
<b>root</b>	Take root and begin to grow. <i>The <b>root</b> form of the word.</i>
<b>scene</b>	The pieces of scenery used in a play or opera. <i>He made a <b>scene</b>.</i>
<b>source</b>	Obtain from a particular source. <i>Each type of coffee is <b>sourced</b> from one country.</i>
<b>tribal</b>	Members of tribal communities especially in South Asia. <i>People don't want political parties stuck in rigid <b>tribal</b> boundaries.</i>
<b>wavelet</b>	A small wave of water; a ripple.
<b>wilderness</b>	A bewildering profusion. <i>A <b>wilderness</b> of masts in the harbor.</i>
