- *(of a situation or event) too unlikely or undesirable to be considered a possibility.*
- *Incapable of being conceived or considered.*



Synonyms of "Unthinkable" as an adjective (15 Words)

absurd	Wildly unreasonable, illogical, or inappropriate. <i>The absurd excuse that the dog ate his homework.</i>
illogical	Lacking sense or clear, sound reasoning. <i>An illogical fear of the supernatural.</i>
implausible	Highly imaginative but unlikely. <i>This is a blatantly implausible claim.</i>
<u>impossible</u>	Very difficult to deal with. <i>It was almost impossible to keep up with him.</i>
<u>inconceivable</u>	Not capable of being imagined or grasped mentally; unbelievable. <i>They behaved with inconceivable cruelty.</i>
incredible	Beyond belief or understanding. <i>An almost incredible tale of triumph and tragedy.</i>

<u>ludicrous</u>	Broadly or extravagantly humorous; resembling farce. <i>Ludicrous green hair.</i>
out of the question	Directed outward or serving to direct something outward.
<u>outrageous</u>	Greatly exceeding bounds of reason or moderation. <i>Her outrageous leotards and sexy routines.</i>
preposterous	Incongruous; inviting ridicule. <i>A preposterous suggestion.</i>
<u>shocking</u>	Giving offense to moral sensibilities and injurious to reputation. <i>The most shocking book of its time.</i>
<u>unbelievable</u>	Not able to be believed; unlikely to be true. <i>Unbelievable or not it happened.</i>
<u>unconscionable</u>	Unreasonably excessive. <i>An unconscionable liar.</i>
unimaginable	Totally unlikely. <i>Lives of almost unimaginable deprivation.</i>
<u>unreasonable</u>	Beyond normal limits. <i>She knew she was being unreasonable but she resented his domesticity.</i>

Usage Examples of "Unthinkable" as an adjective

- *The unthinkable happened—I spoke up.*
- *It was unthinkable that John could be dead.*

Associations of "Unthinkable" (30 Words)

<u>amaze</u>	Surprise (someone) greatly; fill with astonishment. <i>He has been amazed by the quality of the employees at the bank.</i>
astonish	Surprise or impress (someone) greatly. <i>It astonished her that he was so anxious.</i>
<u>astonishing</u>	So surprisingly impressive as to stun or overwhelm. <i>Such an enormous response was astonishing.</i>
astound	Affect with wonder. <i>Her bluntness astounded him.</i>
<u>astounding</u>	So surprisingly impressive as to stun or overwhelm. <i>The summit offers astounding views.</i>

fabulous	Extraordinary, especially extraordinarily large. <i>The fabulous endurance of a marathon runner.</i>
implausible	(of an argument or statement) not seeming reasonable or probable; failing to convince. <i>Gave the teacher an implausible excuse.</i>
<u>impossible</u>	Used of persons or their behavior. <i>What an arrogant impossible fool.</i>
impracticable	(of a course of action) impossible in practice to do or carry out. <i>It was impracticable to widen the road here.</i>
improbable	Too improbable to admit of belief. <i>An improbable event.</i>
<u>inconceivable</u>	Totally unlikely. <i>They behaved with inconceivable cruelty.</i>
incredible	Beyond belief or understanding. <i>The book's plot is simply incredible.</i>
insufferable	Too extreme to bear. <i>Insufferable insolence.</i>
intolerable	Incapable of being put up with. <i>The intolerable pressures of his work.</i>
<u>marvelous</u>	Being or having the character of a miracle. <i>A marvelous collection of rare books.</i>
<u>miraculous</u>	Of the nature of a miracle or having the power to work miracles. <i>A miraculous cure.</i>
miraculously	In a miraculous manner. <i>The two drivers miraculously escaped with only minor injuries.</i>
profound	Profound quality. <i>Profound social changes.</i>
redoubtable	(of a person) formidable, especially as an opponent. <i>A tougher and more redoubtable adversary than the heel clicking jackbooted fanatic.</i>
<u>staggering</u>	So surprisingly impressive as to stun or overwhelm. <i>The staggering bills for maintenance and repair.</i>
<u>surprising</u>	Causing surprise or wonder or amazement. <i>She earned a surprising amount of money.</i>
unacceptable	Not satisfactory or allowable. <i>A word unacceptable in polite society.</i>

<u>unbearable</u>	Incapable of being put up with. <i>The heat was getting unbearable.</i>
<u>unbelievable</u>	Having a probability too low to inspire belief. <i>Unbelievable or not it happened.</i>
unbelievably	Used to introduce a statement that is hard to believe. <i>The show went unbelievably well.</i>
<u>unconvincing</u>	Failing to make someone believe that something is true or valid. <i>A slightly bizarre and unconvincing fusion of musical forces.</i>
unendurable	Incapable of being put up with. <i>Cries of unendurable suffering.</i>
unimaginable	Totally unlikely. <i>Lives of almost unimaginable deprivation.</i>
<u>unlikely</u>	Not likely to be true or to occur or to have occurred. <i>A butcher is unlikely to preach vegetarianism.</i>
wonderful	Extraordinarily good or great; used especially as intensifiers. <i>They all think she s wonderful.</i>
