- *Without a basis in reason or fact.*
- *Lacking justification or authorization.*

### Synonyms of "Unwarranted" as an adjective (34 Words)

**baseless** (of a column) not having a base between the shaft and pedestal.  
***Baseless*** gossip.

Out of proportion.

**disproportionate** People on lower incomes spend a ***disproportionate*** amount of their income on fuel.

<b>excessive</b>	Beyond normal limits. <i>He was drinking <b>excessive</b> amounts of brandy.</i>
<b>gratuitous</b>	Unnecessary and unwarranted. <i>A <b>gratuitous</b> insult.</i>
<b>groundless</b>	Not based on any good reason. <i>Your fears are quite <b>groundless</b>.</i>
<b>idle</b>	Lacking a sense of restraint or responsibility. <i>I knew Ellen did not make <b>idle</b> threats.</i>
<b>ill-advised</b>	Without careful prior deliberation or counsel.
<b>immoderate</b>	Beyond reasonable limits. <i><b>Immoderate</b> drinking.</i>
<u><b>improper</b></u>	Not in accordance with accepted standards, especially of morality or honesty. <i><b>Improper</b> banking practices.</i>
<b>inappropriate</b>	Not suitable for a particular occasion etc. <i>Completely <b>inappropriate</b> behavior.</i>
<b>indefensible</b>	Incapable of being justified or explained. <i>This behaviour is morally <b>indefensible</b>.</i>
<b>inexcusable</b>	Not excusable. <i>Matt's behaviour was <b>inexcusable</b>.</i>
<u><b>inordinate</b></u>	Unusually or disproportionately large; excessive. <i>A book of <b>inordinate</b> length.</i>
<b>insupportable</b>	Incapable of being justified or explained. <i>He had arrived at a wholly <b>insupportable</b> conclusion.</i>
<b>unaccredited</b>	Lacking official approval. <i>A mail order degree from an <b>unaccredited</b> correspondence school.</i>
<b>unapproved</b>	Not officially accepted or sanctioned. <i>They deposit waste on <b>unapproved</b> sites.</i>
<u><b>unauthorized</b></u>	Not having official permission or approval. <i>An <b>unauthorized</b> strike.</i>
<u><b>unbecoming</b></u>	(especially of clothing or a colour) not flattering. <i>An <b>unbecoming</b> striped sundress.</i>
<b>uncertified</b>	Not officially recognized as having a certain status or meeting certain standards. <i><b>Uncertified</b> accountants.</i>
<u><b>undue</b></u>	Not yet payable. <i>Accused of using <b>undue</b> force.</i>

<b>unforgivable</b>	So bad as to be unable to be forgiven or excused. <i>Losing your temper with him was <b>unforgivable</b>.</i>
<b><u>unfounded</u></b>	Having no foundation or basis in fact. <i>Her fear that she had cancer was <b>unfounded</b>.</i>
<b><u>unjust</u></b>	Not fair; marked by injustice or partiality or deception. <i>Resistance to <b>unjust</b> laws.</i>
<b><u>unjustifiable</u></b>	Not able to be shown to be right or reasonable. <i>An <b>unjustifiable</b> restriction on their freedom.</i>
<b><u>unjustified</u></b>	Not shown to be right or reasonable. <i><b>Unjustified</b> price increases.</i>
<b>unlicensed</b>	(of premises) not having a licence for the sale of alcohol. <i><b>Unlicensed</b> weapons.</i>
<b>unnecessary</b>	Not necessary. <i>Good construction is essential to avoid <b>unnecessary</b> waste.</i>
<b>unpardonable</b>	(of a fault or offence) too severe to be pardoned; unforgivable. <i>An <b>unpardonable</b> sin.</i>
<b><u>unreasonable</u></b>	Beyond the limits of acceptability or fairness. <i><b>Unreasonable</b> demands.</i>
<b>unsanctioned</b>	Without explicit official permission. <i><b>Unsanctioned</b> use of company cars.</i>
<b>unseemly</b>	Not in keeping with accepted standards of what is right or proper in polite society. <i><b>Unseemly</b> to use profanity.</i>
<b><u>unsuitable</u></b>	Not worthy of being chosen (especially as a spouse). <i>A solvent <b>unsuitable</b> for use on wood surfaces.</i>
<b>unwarrantable</b>	Incapable of being justified or explained. <i>An <b>unwarrantable</b> intrusion into personal matters.</i>
<b>wild</b>	Produced from wild animals or plants without cultivation. <i>A <b>wild</b> stretch of land.</i>

## Associations of "Unwarranted" (30 Words)

<b>absurd</b>	An absurd state of affairs. <i>The allegations are patently <b>absurd</b>.</i>
<b>arbitrary</b>	Based on or subject to individual discretion or preference or sometimes impulse or caprice. <i><b>Arbitrary</b> division of the group into halves.</i>
<b>exaggerated</b>	Regarded or represented as larger, better, or worse than in reality. <i>Thick lenses <b>exaggerated</b> the size of her eyes.</i>
<b>excessive</b>	Beyond normal limits. <i><b>Excessive</b> charges.</i>
<b>excessively</b>	To a greater degree or in greater amounts than is necessary, normal, or desirable; inordinately. <i><b>Excessively</b> high taxes.</i>
<b>extravagant</b>	Unrestrained, especially with regard to feelings. <i><b>Extravagant</b> gifts like computer games.</i>
<b>groundless</b>	Without a basis in reason or fact. <i>Your fears are quite <b>groundless</b>.</i>
<b>illogical</b>	Lacking orderly continuity. <i>An <b>illogical</b> fear of the supernatural.</i>
<b>immoderate</b>	Not sensible or restrained; excessive. <i><b>Immoderate</b> drinking.</i>
<b>impracticable</b>	Not capable of being carried out or put into practice. <i>It was <b>impracticable</b> to widen the road here.</i>
<b>incoherent</b>	Not logical or internally consistent. <i>A turgid <b>incoherent</b> presentation.</i>
<b>indefensible</b>	Not justifiable by argument. <i>The towns were tactically <b>indefensible</b>.</i>
<b>indiscriminate</b>	(of a person) not using or exercising discrimination. <i>She was <b>indiscriminate</b> with her affections.</i>
<b>inexcusable</b>	Too bad to be justified or tolerated. <i>Matt's behaviour was <b>inexcusable</b>.</i>
<b>inordinate</b>	(of a person) unrestrained in feelings or behaviour. <i>The case had taken up an <b>inordinate</b> amount of time.</i>
<b>insuperable</b>	Impossible to surmount. <i><b>Insuperable</b> odds.</i>

<b>insupportable</b>	Unable to be endured; intolerable. <i>The heat was <b>insupportable</b>.</i>
<b><u>irrational</u></b>	Of a number quantity or expression not expressible as a ratio of two integers and having an infinite and non recurring expansion when expressed as a decimal Examples of irrational numbers are the number and the square root of 2. <i><b>Irrational</b> animals.</i>
<b><u>overly</u></b>	To a degree exceeding normal or proper limits. <i>She was a jealous and <b>overly</b> possessive woman.</i>
<b>preposterous</b>	Incongruous;inviting ridicule. <i>A <b>preposterous</b> attempt to turn back the pages of history.</i>
<b>random</b>	Unfamiliar or unspecified. <i>Bombs fell at <b>random</b>.</i>
<b><u>undue</u></b>	Beyond normal limits. <i><b>Undue</b> influence.</i>
<b><u>unfounded</u></b>	Without a basis in reason or fact. <i>Her fear that she had cancer was <b>unfounded</b>.</i>
<b><u>unjustifiable</u></b>	Incapable of being justified or explained. <i>An <b>unjustifiable</b> restriction on their freedom.</i>
<b><u>unjustified</u></b>	(of printed text) not justified. <i><b>Unjustified</b> price increases.</i>
<b>unpardonable</b>	Not admitting of pardon. <i>An <b>unpardonable</b> sin.</i>
<b><u>unreasonable</u></b>	Beyond normal limits. <i>She knew she was being <b>unreasonable</b> but she resented his domesticity.</i>
<b>unsupported</b>	Not given financial or other assistance. <i>The assumption was <b>unsupported</b> by evidence.</i>
<b><u>untenable</u></b>	Incapable of being defended or justified. <i>This argument is clearly <b>untenable</b>.</i>
<b><u>untrue</u></b>	Not according with the facts. <i>Off level floors and <b>untrue</b> doors and windows.</i>
