## Associations of "Up and down" (30 Words)

ascend	(of a voice or sound) rise in pitch. She <b>ascend</b> ed from a life of poverty to one of great renown.
ascending	The act of changing location in an upward direction. The <b>ascending</b> stems of chickweed.
ascent	An upward slope or grade (as in a road. <i>His <b>ascent</b> to power.</i>
<u>climb</u>	An ascent especially of a mountain or hill by climbing. This may be the hardest rock <b>climb</b> in the world.
<u>climbing</u>	The sport or activity of climbing mountains or cliffs. <i>Climbing</i> equipment.
descending	Moving down a scale of quality. A rocky <b>descending</b> path.
downstairs	Situated downstairs. The <b>downstairs</b> loo.
downward	Towards a lower place, point, or level. New rules on sick leave affect employees of all grades from managers <b>downward</b> s.
<u>elevate</u>	Raise from a lower to a higher position. The exercise will naturally <b>elevate</b> your chest and head.
elevator	A machine consisting of an endless belt with scoops attached, used for raising grain to an upper storey for storage. In the <b>elevator</b> she pressed the button for the lobby.
escalator	A moving staircase consisting of an endlessly circulating belt of steps driven by a motor, which conveys people between the floors of a public building.
<u>falling</u>	Coming down freely under the influence of gravity. <i>Falling</i> temperature.



<u>height</u>	The distance from head to foot. <i>He s terrified of <b>height</b>s.</i>
high	Highly. People in <b>high</b> places.
ladder	With reference to tights or stockings develop or cause to develop a ladder. The first time I put them on one of the stockings <b>ladder</b> ed.
lift	Lifting device consisting of a platform or cage that is raised and lowered mechanically in a vertical shaft in order to move people from one floor to another in a building. He <b>lift</b> ed a war whoop.
low	Below average in amount extent or intensity. Practise a little <b>low</b> cunning.
<u>precipitate</u>	A substance precipitated from a solution. They were <b>precipitate</b> d into a conflict for which they were quite unprepared.
raise	Raise the level or amount of something. <i>He wants a <b>raise</b> and some perks.</i>
rise	Rise in rank or status. I gained the crest of a <b>rise</b> and saw the plain stretched out before me.
risen	(of e.g. celestial bodies) above the horizon. <i>The <b>risen</b> sun.</i>
rising	(of a sign) ascendant. The Warsaw <b>rising</b> of 1944.
scale	Measure by or as if by a scale. The <b>scale</b> of the model.
<u>soar</u>	Fly or rise high in the air. The stock market <b>soar</b> ed after the cease fire was announced.
stairs	A flight of stairs or a flight of steps.
stepladder	A short folding ladder with flat steps and a small platform.
uphill	Against difficulties. An <b>uphill</b> struggle to gain worldwide recognition.
upstairs	An upper floor. No one was allowed to see the <b>upstairs</b> .
upward	Extending or moving toward a higher place. From childhood <b>upward</b> .
vertically	In a vertical direction. The wheel hangs <b>vertically</b> from a wire.
