
# Upbringing as a Noun

- *Helping someone grow up to be an accepted member of the community.*

Helping someone grow up to be an accepted member of the community. fosterage **Fosterage** was commonplace with the support of the extended family. Encouragement; aiding the development of something. fostering The action or process of nurturing someone or something. nurture The **nurture** of children. The properties acquired as a consequence of the way you were treated as a child. raising A **raising** of the land resulting from volcanic activity. The properties acquired as a consequence of the way you were treated as a rearing child. tending The work of providing treatment for or attending to someone or something. The process of keeping something in good condition. <u>upkeep</u> *Payments for the children s upkeep.*

## Associations of "Upbringing" (30 Words)

adoption	A legal proceeding that creates a parent-child relation between persons not related by blood; the adopted child is entitled to all privileges belonging to a natural child of the adoptive parents (including the right to inherit. <i>Private adoptions are illegal in Britain.</i>
<u>austere</u>	Practicing great self-denial- William James. He was an <b>austere</b> man with a rigidly puritanical outlook.
baby	Treat someone as a baby pamper or be overprotective towards. <i>This project is his <b>baby</b></i> .



breed	Rear and train (someone) to behave in a particular way or have certain qualities. <i>He experimented on a particular</i> <b>breed</b> <i>of white rats.</i>
breeding	The production of animals or plants by inbreeding or hybridization. That s the kind of modesty you get from good <b>breeding</b> .
<u>elevation</u>	The raising of the consecrated elements for adoration at Mass. A dancer of exceptional <b>elevation</b> .
exacting	Requiring precise accuracy. The <b>exacting</b> standards laid down by the organic food industry.
feeding	The act of consuming food.
formalism	The practice of scrupulous adherence to prescribed or external forms. There is a <b>formalism</b> which expresses the idea of superposition.
<u>foster</u>	Bring up under fosterage of children. A person who would <b>foster</b> Holly was found.
housework	The work of cleaning and running a house. I was busy doing <b>housework</b> when the doorbell rang.
increasing	Music increasing in tempo and or volume. The <b>increasing</b> numbers of students.
martinet	Someone who demands exact conformity to rules and forms. A <b>martinet</b> of a staff officer.
mounting	The action of mounting something. The <b>mounting</b> of rapid fire guns.
<u>nurture</u>	Look after a child until it is an adult. <i>Nurture</i> his talents.
<u>parent</u>	Be or act as a parent to a child. Stems will root down creating a new crown near the <b>parent</b> .
raise	Raise the level or amount of something. <i>Raise</i> the roof.
raising	The event of something being raised upward. A cost <b>raising</b> increase in the basic wage rate.
rearing	Rearing on left hind leg with forelegs elevated and head usually in profile.
reproduction	A copy of a work of art, especially a print or photograph of a painting. <i>The design was changed to allow louder</i> <b>reproduction</b> .
rigid	Incapable of adapting or changing to meet circumstances. A face <b>rigid</b> with pain.
<u>rigorous</u>	Harsh and demanding. <i>Rigorous</i> application of the law.



rigour	The quality of being valid and rigorous. <i>His analysis is lacking in <b>rigour</b>.</i>
severity	Excessive sternness. She stared at me with mock <b>severity</b> .
spartan	Showing or characterized by austerity or a lack of comfort or luxury. <i>The accommodation was fairly</i> <b>spartan</b> .
strict	Characterized by strictness severity or restraint. <i>Strict standards.</i>
stringency	A state occasioned by scarcity of money and a shortage of credit.
<u>stringent</u>	Demanding strict attention to rules and procedures. <i>Stringent</i> safety measures.
training	Activity leading to skilled behavior. <i>You ll have to go into strict <b>training</b>.</i>
unbending	Reserved, formal, or strict in one's behaviour or attitudes; austere and inflexible. An <b>unbending</b> will to dominate.
