<b>care</b>	The work of providing treatment for or attending to someone or something. <i>He wrote the manual on car <b>care</b>.</i>
<b>conservation</b>	An occurrence of improvement by virtue of preventing loss or injury or other change. <i>The artworks in the collection need indexing and <b>conservation</b>.</i>

<b>keep</b>	The cost of the essentials for living. <i>The Society are paying for your <b>keep</b>.</i>
<b>maintenance</b>	Means of maintenance of a family or group. <i>Crucial conditions for the <b>maintenance</b> of democratic government.</i>
<b>preservation</b>	A process that saves organic substances from decay. <i>Food <b>preservation</b>.</i>
<b>repair</b>	The action of repairing something. <i>The abandoned house they bought needs <b>repairs</b>.</i>
<b>repairs</b>	The act of putting something in working order again. <i>The building was in good repair.</i>
<b>running</b>	The act of participating in an athletic competition involving running on a track. <i>Marathon <b>running</b>.</i>
<b>service</b>	A company or agency that performs a public service subject to government regulation. <i>The pitifully low wages gained from domestic <b>service</b>.</i>
<b>servicing</b>	A means of serving. <i>The bull was worth good money in <b>servicing</b> fees.</i>
<b>subsistence</b>	Denoting or relating to production at a level sufficient only for one's own use or consumption, without any surplus for trade. <i>Farming is a hard means of <b>subsistence</b>.</i>
<b>support</b>	The action of supporting something or someone or the state of being supported. <i>He was a great <b>support</b> when her father died.</i>
<b>sustainment</b>	The support or maintenance of someone or something, especially military equipment or personnel. <i>The implementation and <b>sustainment</b> of healthy changes in the school.</i>
<b>sustenance</b>	Food and drink regarded as a source of strength; nourishment. <i>They were in want of <b>sustenance</b>.</i>
<b>sustentation</b>	The act of sustaining life by food or providing a means of subsistence. <i>Provision is made for the <b>sustentation</b> of preachers.</i>
<b>upbringing</b>	The treatment and instruction received by a child from its parents throughout its childhood. <i>She had had a Christian <b>upbringing</b>.</i>
<b>welfare</b>	Financial support given to those who are unemployed or otherwise in need. <i>The protection of rights to education housing and <b>welfare</b>.</i>

<b>alive</b>	(often followed by `with') full of life and spirit. <i>Is <b>alive</b> to the moods of others.</i>
<b>bear</b>	Put up with something or somebody unpleasant. <i><b>Bear</b> news.</i>
<b>bolster</b>	Prop up with a pillow or bolster. <i>They <b>bolstered</b> the seats for a more comfortable ride.</i>
<b>care</b>	Provide care for. <i>I don't <b>care</b>.</i>
<b>existence</b>	The fact or state of living or having objective reality. <i>She kept the company alive when its very <b>existence</b> was threatened.</i>
<b>farmhouse</b>	A house attached to a farm, especially the main house in which the farmer lives. <i>A <b>farmhouse</b> kitchen.</i>
<b>hold</b>	Have or hold in one's hands or grip. <i>I feel nothing but pity for someone who <b>holds</b> such chauvinistic views.</i>
<b>keep</b>	Keep in a certain state position or activity. <i>I always <b>keep</b> batteries in the freezer.</i>
<b>life</b>	An account of the series of events making up a person's life. <i>His father decided to start a new <b>life</b> in California.</i>
<b>live</b>	Remain alive. <i>A <b>live</b> television program.</i>
<b>livelihood</b>	The financial means whereby one lives. <i>People whose <b>livelihoods</b> depend on the rainforest.</i>
<b>maintain</b>	Maintain by writing regular records. <i>The Department for Transport is responsible for <b>maintaining</b> the main roads in England.</i>
<b>maintenance</b>	Means of maintenance of a family or group. <i>Crucial conditions for the <b>maintenance</b> of democratic government.</i>
<b>meager</b>	Deficient in amount or quality or extent. <i><b>Meager</b> resources.</i>

<b><u>nourishment</u></b>	A source of materials to nourish the body. <i>Her <b>nourishment</b> of the orphans saved many lives.</i>
<b>nutriment</b>	Nourishment; sustenance. <i>He took the Bible for spiritual <b>nutriment</b>.</i>
<b><u>nutrition</u></b>	The branch of science that deals with nutrients and nutrition particularly in humans. <i>A guide to good <b>nutrition</b>.</i>
<b><u>occupation</u></b>	The action of living in or using a building or other place. <i>He missed the bell in his <b>occupation</b> with the computer game.</i>
<b>poverty</b>	The state of being extremely poor. <i>The <b>poverty</b> of her imagination.</i>
<b>stay</b>	A period of staying somewhere in particular of living somewhere temporarily as a visitor or guest. <i>The judge <b>stayed</b> the execution order.</i>
<b>subsist</b>	Provide sustenance for. <i>The peace <b>subsisted</b> between 1303 and 1324.</i>
<b><u>subsistence</u></b>	Denoting or relating to production at a level sufficient only for one's own use or consumption, without any surplus for trade. <i>The garden provided not only <b>subsistence</b> but a little cash crop.</i>
<b><u>survive</u></b>	Continue to live or exist in spite of (an accident or ordeal). <i>Against all odds the child <b>survived</b>.</i>
<b><u>sustain</u></b>	An effect or facility on a keyboard or electronic instrument whereby a note can be sustained after the key is released. <i>We <b>sustained</b> the diplomatic negotiations as long as possible.</i>
<b><u>sustainable</u></b>	Capable of being sustained. <i><b>Sustainable</b> economic growth.</i>
<b><u>sustenance</u></b>	Food and drink regarded as a source of strength; nourishment. <i>The <b>sustenance</b> of parliamentary democracy.</i>
<b>uphold</b>	Keep or maintain in unaltered condition; cause to remain or last. <i>They <b>uphold</b> a tradition of not causing distress to living creatures.</i>
<b>victuals</b>	A stock or supply of foods.
<b><u>withstand</u></b>	Remain undamaged or unaffected by; resist. <i>The structure had been designed to <b>withstand</b> winds of more than 100 mph.</i>
<b>yeoman</b>	A member of the yeomanry force.
