## Uprising as a Noun

### Definitions of "Uprising" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “uprising” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *An act of resistance or rebellion; a revolt.*
- *Organized opposition to authority; a conflict in which one faction tries to wrest control from another.*



## Synonyms of "Uprising" as a noun (10 Words)

- insurgence** An act of rising in active revolt.  
*He quelled the **insurgence** and became governor of the region.*
- insurgency** An active revolt or uprising.  
*Rebels are waging an armed **insurgency** to topple the monarchy.*
- insurrection** Organized opposition to authority; a conflict in which one faction tries to wrest control from another.  
*The **insurrection** was savagely put down.*
- mutiny** Open rebellion against constituted authority (especially by seamen or soldiers against their officers).  
*The crew were on the verge of **mutiny**.*
- rebellion** Refusal to accept some authority or code or convention.  
*Each generation must have its own **rebellion**.*



**revolt**

Organized opposition to authority; a conflict in which one faction tries to wrest control from another.

*A **revolt** over tax increases.*

**revolution**

(in Marxism) the class struggle which is expected to lead to political change and the triumph of communism.

*Near the solar equator the sun takes about 26 days to complete one **revolution**.*

**riot**

A joke that seems extremely funny.

***Riot** police.*

**rioting**

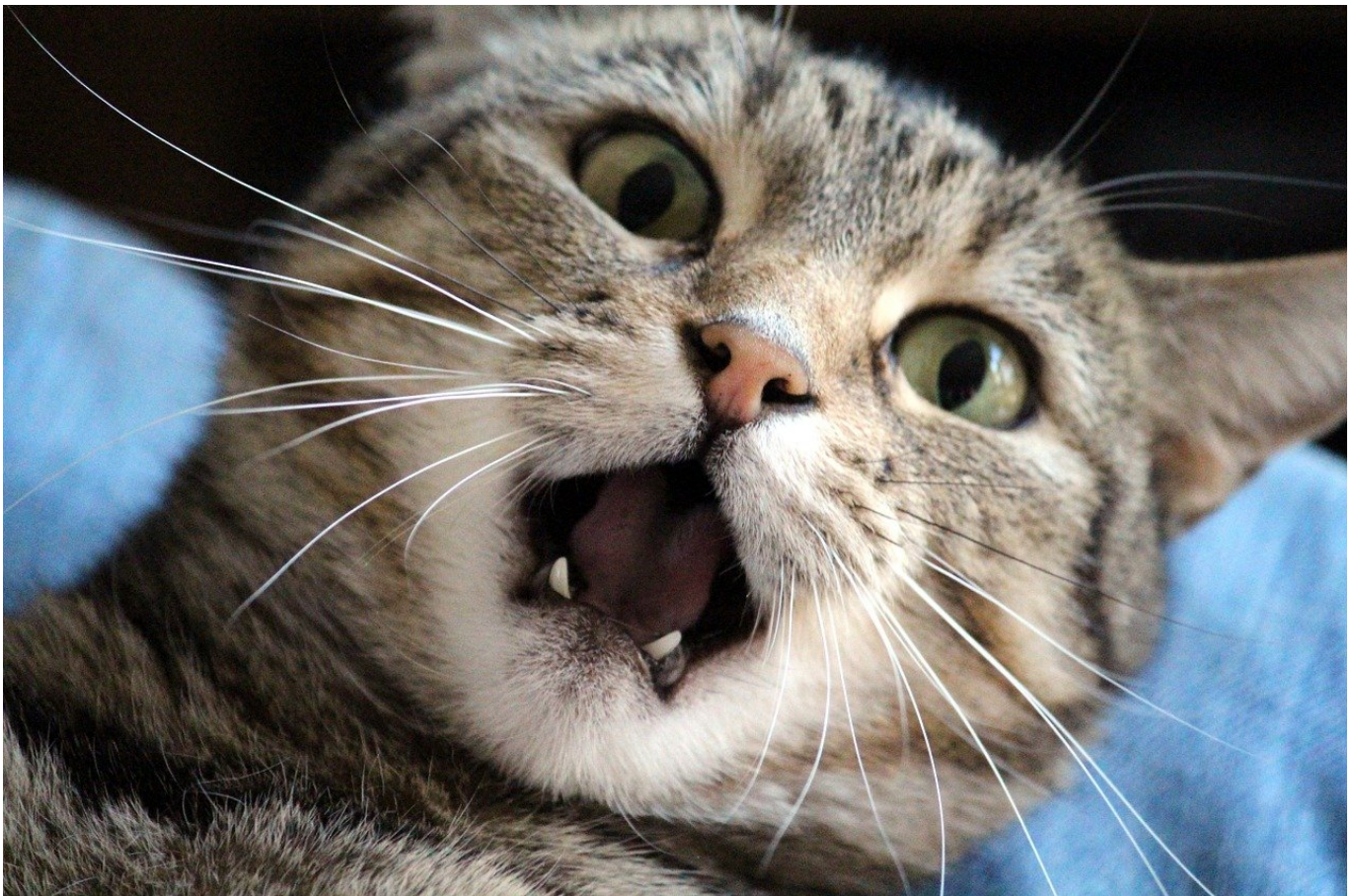
The violent disturbance of the peace by a crowd.

*The clashes followed a night of **rioting** in several parts of the city.*

**rising**

An armed protest against authority; a revolt.

*The reforms led to peasant **risings**.*

## Associations of "Uprising" (30 Words)

<b>ascent</b>	An upward slope or grade (as in a road). <i>The first <b>ascent</b> of the Matterhorn.</i>
<u><b>civil</b></u>	Relating to civil law. <i>Even if he didn't like them he should have been <b>civil</b>.</i>
<b>complain</b>	Express complaints discontent displeasure or unhappiness. <i>We all <b>complained</b> bitterly about the food.</i>
<b>demonstration</b>	An act of showing that something exists or is true by giving proof or evidence. <i>He confused the enemy with feints and <b>demonstrations</b>.</i>
<b>disloyalty</b>	The quality of being disloyal. <i>An accusation of <b>disloyalty</b> and betrayal.</i>
<u><b>disobedience</b></u>	The trait of being unwilling to obey. <i><b>Disobedience</b> to law is sometimes justified.</i>

<b><u>firebrand</u></b>	A piece of wood that has been burned or is burning. <i>A political <b>firebrand</b>.</i>
<b>improving</b>	Getting higher or more vigorous. <i>An <b>improving</b> economy.</i>
<b>ingratitude</b>	A discreditable lack of gratitude. <i>He returned his daughter's care with <b>ingratitude</b> and unkindness.</i>
<b>instigator</b>	A person who brings about or initiates something. <i>He was not the <b>instigator</b> of the incident.</i>
<b><u>insubordination</u></b>	An insubordinate act. <i>He was dismissed for <b>insubordination</b>.</i>
<b>insurgent</b>	In opposition to a civil authority or government. <i>A series of <b>insurgent</b> attacks.</i>
<b>insurrection</b>	Organized opposition to authority; a conflict in which one faction tries to wrest control from another. <i>The <b>insurrection</b> was savagely put down.</i>
<b><u>mutiny</u></b>	Engage in a mutiny against an authority. <i>A <b>mutiny</b> by those manning the weapons could trigger a global war.</i>
<b><u>overthrow</u></b>	A score made because the ball has been overthrown. <i>The Czar was <b>overthrown</b>.</i>
<b><u>protest</u></b>	The act of protesting a public often organized manifestation of dissent. <i>A <b>protest</b> over planned pit closures.</i>
<b><u>public</u></b>	Of or provided by the state rather than an independent, commercial company. <i>He is a hero in the eyes of the <b>public</b>.</i>
<b>rabble</b>	A disorderly crowd of people. <i>The British feel no compunction about ushering the gentry into the coach and packing the <b>rabble</b> off to debtor's prison.</i>
<b><u>rebel</u></b>	A person who takes part in an armed rebellion against the constituted authority especially in the hope of improving conditions. <i>Respect did not prevent children from <b>rebelling</b> against their parents.</i>
<b><u>rebellion</u></b>	Organized opposition to authority; a conflict in which one faction tries to wrest control from another. <i>Each generation must have its own <b>rebellion</b>.</i>
<b>remonstrate</b>	Argue in protest or opposition. <i>He turned angrily to <b>remonstrate</b> with Tommy.</i>
<b><u>revolt</u></b>	Feel disgust. <i>A <b>revolt</b> over tax increases.</i>

<b>revolution</b>	A drastic and far-reaching change in ways of thinking and behaving. <i>The <b>revolution</b> of the earth about the sun takes one year.</i>
<b><u>revolutionary</u></b>	Involving or causing a complete or dramatic change. <i>The <b>revolutionary</b> army.</i>
<b><u>riot</u></b>	Take part in a riot disturb the public peace by engaging in a riot. <i>The garden was a <b>riot</b> of colour.</i>
<b>rising</b>	An armed protest against authority; a revolt. <i>A <b>rising</b> market.</i>
<b>steeply</b>	By a very large or sudden amount. <i>The walls of the gorge rise <b>steeply</b> on both sides.</i>
<b><u>treason</u></b>	An act of deliberate betrayal. <i>Doubt is the ultimate <b>treason</b> against faith.</i>
<b><u>up</u></b>	Denoting a flavour variety of stable quark having relatively low mass and an electric charge of $\frac{2}{3}$ In the Standard Model protons and neutrons are composed of up and down quarks. <i>She <b>upped</b> and left him.</i>
<b>uphill</b>	Against difficulties. <i>Follow the track <b>uphill</b>.</i>
