Uprising as a Noun

Definitions of "Uprising" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “uprising” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *An act of resistance or rebellion; a revolt.*
- *Organized opposition to authority; a conflict in which one faction tries to wrest control from another.*



Synonyms of "Uprising" as a noun (10 Words)

- insurgence** An act of rising in active revolt.
*He quelled the **insurgence** and became governor of the region.*
- insurgency** An active revolt or uprising.
*Rebels are waging an armed **insurgency** to topple the monarchy.*
- insurrection** Organized opposition to authority; a conflict in which one faction tries to wrest control from another.
*The **insurrection** was savagely put down.*
- mutiny** Open rebellion against constituted authority (especially by seamen or soldiers against their officers).
*The crew were on the verge of **mutiny**.*
- rebellion** Refusal to accept some authority or code or convention.
*Each generation must have its own **rebellion**.*

revolt

Organized opposition to authority; a conflict in which one faction tries to wrest control from another.

*A **revolt** over tax increases.*

revolution

(in Marxism) the class struggle which is expected to lead to political change and the triumph of communism.

*Near the solar equator the sun takes about 26 days to complete one **revolution**.*

riot

A joke that seems extremely funny.

***Riot** police.*

rioting

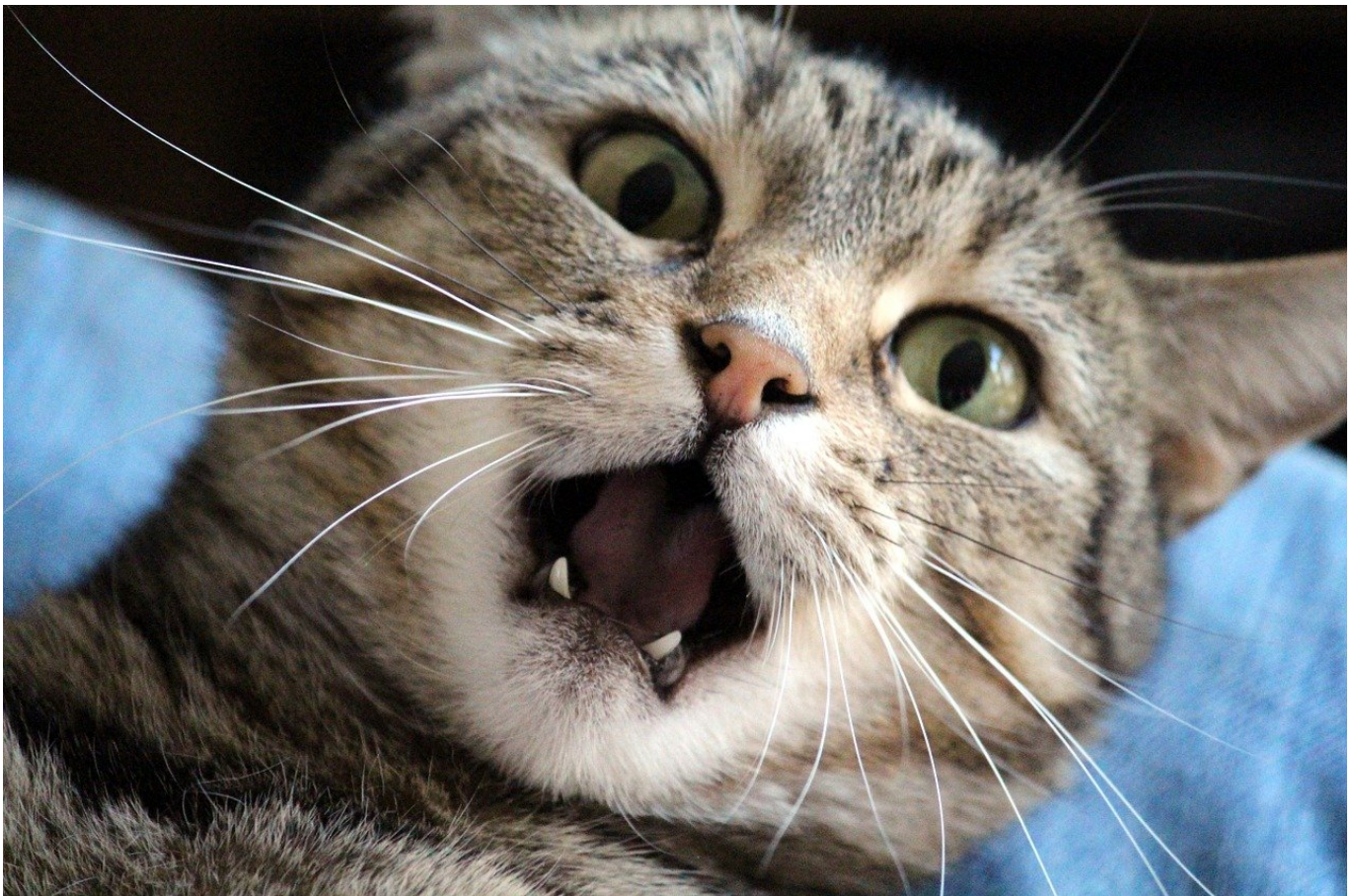
The violent disturbance of the peace by a crowd.

*The clashes followed a night of **rioting** in several parts of the city.*

rising

An armed protest against authority; a revolt.

*The reforms led to peasant **risings**.*

Associations of "Uprising" (30 Words)

ascent	An upward slope or grade (as in a road). <i>The first ascent of the Matterhorn.</i>
<u>civil</u>	Relating to civil law. <i>Even if he didn't like them he should have been civil.</i>
complain	Express complaints discontent displeasure or unhappiness. <i>We all complained bitterly about the food.</i>
demonstration	An act of showing that something exists or is true by giving proof or evidence. <i>He confused the enemy with feints and demonstrations.</i>
disloyalty	The quality of being disloyal. <i>An accusation of disloyalty and betrayal.</i>
<u>disobedience</u>	The trait of being unwilling to obey. <i>Disobedience to law is sometimes justified.</i>

<u>firebrand</u>	A piece of wood that has been burned or is burning. <i>A political firebrand.</i>
improving	Getting higher or more vigorous. <i>An improving economy.</i>
ingratitude	A discreditable lack of gratitude. <i>He returned his daughter's care with ingratitude and unkindness.</i>
instigator	A person who brings about or initiates something. <i>He was not the instigator of the incident.</i>
<u>insubordination</u>	An insubordinate act. <i>He was dismissed for insubordination.</i>
insurgent	In opposition to a civil authority or government. <i>A series of insurgent attacks.</i>
insurrection	Organized opposition to authority; a conflict in which one faction tries to wrest control from another. <i>The insurrection was savagely put down.</i>
<u>mutiny</u>	Engage in a mutiny against an authority. <i>A mutiny by those manning the weapons could trigger a global war.</i>
<u>overthrow</u>	A score made because the ball has been overthrown. <i>The Czar was overthrown.</i>
<u>protest</u>	The act of protesting a public often organized manifestation of dissent. <i>A protest over planned pit closures.</i>
<u>public</u>	Of or provided by the state rather than an independent, commercial company. <i>He is a hero in the eyes of the public.</i>
rabble	A disorderly crowd of people. <i>The British feel no compunction about ushering the gentry into the coach and packing the rabble off to debtor's prison.</i>
<u>rebel</u>	A person who takes part in an armed rebellion against the constituted authority especially in the hope of improving conditions. <i>Respect did not prevent children from rebelling against their parents.</i>
<u>rebellion</u>	Organized opposition to authority; a conflict in which one faction tries to wrest control from another. <i>Each generation must have its own rebellion.</i>
remonstrate	Argue in protest or opposition. <i>He turned angrily to remonstrate with Tommy.</i>
<u>revolt</u>	Feel disgust. <i>A revolt over tax increases.</i>

revolution	A drastic and far-reaching change in ways of thinking and behaving. <i>The revolution of the earth about the sun takes one year.</i>
<u>revolutionary</u>	Involving or causing a complete or dramatic change. <i>The revolutionary army.</i>
<u>riot</u>	Take part in a riot disturb the public peace by engaging in a riot. <i>The garden was a riot of colour.</i>
rising	An armed protest against authority; a revolt. <i>A rising market.</i>
steeply	By a very large or sudden amount. <i>The walls of the gorge rise steeply on both sides.</i>
<u>treason</u>	An act of deliberate betrayal. <i>Doubt is the ultimate treason against faith.</i>
<u>up</u>	Denoting a flavour variety of stable quark having relatively low mass and an electric charge of $\frac{2}{3}$ In the Standard Model protons and neutrons are composed of up and down quarks. <i>She upped and left him.</i>
uphill	Against difficulties. <i>Follow the track uphill.</i>
