bedlam	An institution for the care of mentally ill people. <i>There was bedlam in the courtroom.</i>
brouhaha	Loud confused noise from many sources. <i>All that election brouhaha.</i>
chaos	Complete disorder and confusion. <i>Snow caused chaos in the region.</i>

<u>commotion</u>	Civil insurrection. <i>They set off firecrackers to make a lot of commotion.</i>
complaint	An illness or medical condition, especially a relatively minor one. <i>He hasn't any cause for complaint.</i>
confusion	A mental state characterized by a lack of clear and orderly thought and behavior. <i>She looked about her in confusion.</i>
disorder	A state of confusion. <i>The files are in complete disorder.</i>
<u>disturbance</u>	A psychological disorder of thought or emotion; a more neutral term than mental illness. <i>A helicopter landing can cause disturbance to residents.</i>
furor	An interest followed with exaggerated zeal. <i>The verdict raised a furor over the role of courtroom psychiatry.</i>
garboil	A state of commotion and noise and confusion.
<u>havoc</u>	Great confusion or disorder. <i>If they weren't at school they'd be wreaking havoc in the streets.</i>
howl of protest	The long plaintive cry of a hound or a wolf.
hubbub	Loud confused noise from many sources. <i>She fought through the hubbub.</i>
katzenjammer	Loud confused noise from many sources.
<u>mayhem</u>	Violent or extreme disorder; chaos. <i>Complete mayhem broke out.</i>
<u>objection</u>	A procedure whereby a party to a suit says that a particular line of questioning or a particular witness or a piece of evidence or other matter is improper and should not be continued and asks the court to rule on its impropriety. <i>His view is open to objection.</i>
outcry	A loud utterance; often in protest or opposition. <i>The public outcry over the bombing.</i>
outrage	An action or event causing outrage. <i>The massacre was one of the worst outrages in the whole of our history.</i>
pandemonium	Wild and noisy disorder or confusion; uproar. <i>There was complete pandemonium everyone just panicked.</i>
<u>protest</u>	The act of protesting a public often organized manifestation of dissent. <i>He shouted his protests at the umpire.</i>

protestation	An emphatic declaration in response to doubt or accusation. <i>The many protestations did not stay the execution.</i>
tumult	The act of making a noisy disturbance. <i>The whole neighbourhood was in a state of fear and tumult.</i>
tumultuousness	A state of commotion and noise and confusion.
<u>turbulence</u>	Unstable flow of a liquid or gas. <i>Political turbulence.</i>
<u>turmoil</u>	Violent agitation. <i>The country was in turmoil.</i>

Associations of "Uproar" (30 Words)

bedlam	Pejorative terms for an insane asylum. <i>There was bedlam in the courtroom.</i>
blare	A loud, harsh sound. <i>The horns of the taxis blared.</i>
brassy	Resembling brass in colour. <i>Audience members are tapping their feet to the brassy music of the band.</i>
brouhaha	A confused disturbance far greater than its cause merits. <i>The brouhaha over those infamous commercials.</i>
cacophony	A loud harsh or strident noise. <i>A cacophony of deafening alarm bells.</i>
<u>clamor</u>	Compel someone to do something by insistent clamoring. <i>The delegates clamored their disappointment.</i>
clatter	Fall or move with a clatter. <i>The horse spun round with a clatter of hooves.</i>
<u>commotion</u>	A state of confused and noisy disturbance. <i>A commotion of people fought for the exits.</i>
deafening	Loud enough to cause (temporary) hearing loss. <i>The music reached a deafening crescendo.</i>

<u>din</u>	The act of making a noisy disturbance. <i>The fans made an awful din.</i>
disorder	Bring disorder to. <i>Skin disorders.</i>
dissonance	The auditory experience of sound that lacks musical quality; sound that is a disagreeable auditory experience. <i>A session full of jangling dissonances.</i>
<u>disturbance</u>	Electrical or acoustic activity that can disturb communication. <i>There was too much anger and disturbance.</i>
hubbub	A busy, noisy situation. <i>A hubbub of laughter and shouting.</i>
loud	Used chiefly as a direction or description in music loud with force. <i>Loud trombones.</i>
<u>mayhem</u>	The crime of maliciously injuring or maiming someone, originally so as to render them defenceless. <i>Complete mayhem broke out.</i>
midst	The location of something surrounded by other things. <i>In the midst of the crowd.</i>
noise	Make a lot of noise. <i>Making a noise like a pig.</i>
pandemonium	A state of extreme confusion and disorder. <i>There was complete pandemonium everyone just panicked.</i>
racket	Hit a ball with a racket. <i>A squash racket.</i>
<u>raucous</u>	Unpleasantly loud and harsh. <i>A raucous party.</i>
remonstrate	Argue in protest or opposition. <i>You don't mean that she remonstrated.</i>
<u>riot</u>	Take part in a riot disturb the public peace by engaging in a riot. <i>Riot police.</i>
<u>scream</u>	An irresistibly funny person, thing, or situation. <i>He screamed abuse down the phone.</i>
shakeup	The imposition of a new organization; organizing differently (often involving extensive and drastic changes). <i>Top officials were forced out in the cabinet shakeup.</i>
toot	Make a toot. <i>A car tooted at us.</i>

tumult	Violent agitation. <i>His personal tumult ended when he began writing songs.</i>
<u>turbulence</u>	Instability in the atmosphere. <i>The industrial revolution was a period of great turbulence.</i>
<u>turmoil</u>	A violent disturbance. <i>He endured years of inner turmoil.</i>
<u>upheaval</u>	A state of violent disturbance and disorder (as in politics or social conditions generally). <i>The first upheaval produced a hill which was called Roof Mountain.</i>
