<b>ascend</b>	Become king or queen. <i>Carolyn's voice had <b>ascended</b> into high pitched giggles.</i>
<b>ascending</b>	Increasing in size or importance. <i>The <b>ascending</b> staircase.</i>
<b>ascent</b>	An instance of rising or moving up through the air. <i>His <b>ascent</b> to power.</i>
<a href="#">climb</a>	A mountain hill or slope that is climbed. <i>He was too full of alcohol to negotiate the <b>climb</b> safely.</i>
<a href="#">climbing</a>	The sport or activity of climbing mountains or cliffs. <i>His other great interest was <b>climbing</b> especially in the Alps.</i>
<b>descending</b>	(of sound) becoming lower in pitch. <i>The categories are listed in <b>descending</b> order of usefulness.</i>
<b>downstairs</b>	Situated downstairs. <i>The <b>downstairs</b> or downstair phone.</i>
<b>downward</b>	On or toward a surface regarded as a base. <i>He lay face <b>downward</b>.</i>
<a href="#">elevate</a>	Raise to a more important or impressive level. <i>He was <b>elevated</b> to Secretary of State.</i>
<b>elevator</b>	A muscle whose contraction raises a part of the body. <i><b>Elevators</b> of the upper lip.</i>
<b>escalator</b>	A moving staircase consisting of an endlessly circulating belt of steps driven by a motor, which conveys people between the floors of a public building.
<a href="#">falling</a>	Becoming lower or less in degree or value. <i>A <b>falling</b> market.</i>
<a href="#">height</a>	A high place or position. <i>At the <b>height</b> of her career.</i>

<b>high</b>	High school. <i>I go to junior <b>high</b>.</i>
<b>ladder</b>	With reference to tights or stockings develop or cause to develop a ladder. <i>He climbed the career <b>ladder</b>.</i>
<b>lift</b>	A wave that lifts the surface of the water or ground. <i>She staged a magnificent comeback to <b>lift</b> the British Open title.</i>
<b>low</b>	A low point level or figure. <i>Training will be given <b>low</b> priority.</i>
<b>precipitate</b>	A substance precipitated from a solution. <i>I must apologize for my staff their actions were <b>precipitate</b>.</i>
<b>raise</b>	Raise from a lower to a higher position. <i><b>Raise</b> the specter of unemployment.</i>
<b>rise</b>	Rise in rank or status. <i>It was here that the brook had its <b>rise</b>.</i>
<b>risen</b>	(of e.g. celestial bodies) above the horizon. <i>The <b>risen</b> sun.</i>
<b>rising</b>	An armed protest against authority; a revolt. <i>The <b>rising</b> fives on the verge of school.</i>
<b>scale</b>	Measure by or as if by a scale. <i>The <b>scale</b> of the model.</i>
<b>soar</b>	Fly a plane without an engine. <i>The stock market <b>soared</b> after the cease fire was announced.</i>
<b>stairs</b>	A flight of stairs or a flight of steps.
<b>stepladder</b>	A short folding ladder with flat steps and a small platform.
<b>uphill</b>	Requiring great effort; difficult. <i>An <b>uphill</b> struggle to gain worldwide recognition.</i>
<b>upstairs</b>	The part of a building above the ground floor. <i>An <b>upstairs</b> bedroom.</i>
<b>upward</b>	Moving, pointing, or leading to a higher place, point, or level. <i>An <b>upward</b> trend in sales.</i>
<b>vertically</b>	In a way that involves different levels or stages of a hierarchy or process. <i>The wheel hangs <b>vertically</b> from a wire.</i>
