enlargement	The state of being enlarged. <i>Talks on the enlargement of the EU.</i>
expansion	A discussion that provides additional information. <i>German expansion in the 1930s.</i>
extension	The property of occupying space. <i>Drinks were served until the early hours of the morning without any extension having been granted.</i>

growth	Vegetation that has grown. <i>The only growth was some salt grass.</i>
<u>inflation</u>	Lack of elegance as a consequence of being pompous and puffed up with vanity. <i>The gross inflation of salaries.</i>
multiplication	The act of producing offspring or multiplying by such production. <i>Repeated copying leads to a multiplication of errors.</i>
rise	The property possessed by a slope or surface that rises. <i>They cheered the rise of the hot air balloon.</i>
rush	A sudden quick movement towards something, typically by a number of people. <i>The pre Christmas rush.</i>
spate	A large number or amount or extent. <i>A spate of attacks on holidaymakers.</i>
<u>surge</u>	A sudden or abrupt strong increase. <i>An upsurge of emotion.</i>
swelling	An abnormal enlargement of a part of the body, typically as a result of an accumulation of fluid. <i>Painless swellings may appear in the lower abdomen.</i>

<u>bloat</u>	Become bloated or swollen or puff up. <i>The dead man s stomach was bloated.</i>
<u>boom</u>	(of a bittern) utter its characteristic resonant cry. <i>Business is booming.</i>
dilate	Become wider. <i>His pupils were dilated.</i>

distend	Cause to expand as it by internal pressure. <i>The abdomen distended rapidly.</i>
efficiency	An action designed to achieve efficiency. <i>She did the work with great efficiency.</i>
<u>enlarge</u>	Make larger. <i>She enlarged the flower beds.</i>
<u>escalate</u>	Make or become more intense or serious. <i>The Allies escalated the bombing.</i>
expand	Expand the influence of. <i>The dough expands.</i>
expansion	A discussion that provides additional information. <i>German expansion in the 1930s.</i>
growth	The process of an individual organism growing organically; a purely biological unfolding of events involved in an organism changing gradually from a simple to a more complex level. <i>A growth of hair.</i>
increase	A change resulting in an increase. <i>They proposed an increase of 15 percent in the fare.</i>
increment	A regular increase in salary on an incremental scale. <i>All sizes from 4 30 mm in 1 mm increments.</i>
inflate	Become inflated. <i>He has inflated the money supply to allow companies to continue in their old ways.</i>
<u>inflated</u>	Distended through being filled with air or gas. <i>Inflated salaries.</i>
<u>inflation</u>	A brief exponential expansion of the universe (faster than the speed of light) postulated to have occurred shortly after the big bang. <i>In inflation everything gets more valuable except money.</i>
inflationary	Characterized by or tending to cause monetary inflation. <i>Succeeding governments tried to reduce inflationary pressures.</i>
<u>maximize</u>	Make as large or great as possible. <i>A thriller that maximizes the potential of its locations.</i>
price	Determine the price of. <i>He puts a high price on his services.</i>
productivity	The rate of production of new biomass by an individual, population, or community; the fertility or capacity of a given habitat or area. <i>Nutrient rich waters with high primary productivity.</i>

rates	A local tax on property (usually used in the plural).
rise	Rise up. <i>They cheered the rise of the hot air balloon.</i>
skyrocket	Propels bright light high in the sky, or used to propel a lifesaving line or harpoon. <i>The cost of the welfare system has skyrocketed.</i>
spate	A large number or amount or extent. <i>A spate of attacks on holidaymakers.</i>
stagflation	Persistent high inflation combined with high unemployment and stagnant demand in a country's economy.
<u>surge</u>	A sudden powerful forward or upward movement, especially by a crowd or by a natural force such as the tide. <i>He levelled the score and then surged ahead.</i>
swell	Excellent; very good. <i>Everything was just going swell.</i>
<u>upgrade</u>	Get better travel conditions. <i>Check that the upgrade is installed and performing correctly.</i>
widen	Make (clothes) larger. <i>Widen the range of applications.</i>
