## Associations of "Urbanization" (30 Words)

### accelerate

Increase in rate, amount, or extent.  
*He **accelerated** the car.*

### **agriculture**

The science or practice of farming, including cultivation of the soil for the growing of crops and the rearing of animals to provide food, wool, and other products.

### **automation**

The act of implementing the control of equipment with advanced technology; usually involving electronic hardware.  
*The **automation** of office tasks.*

### capitalism

An economic and political system in which a country's trade and industry are controlled by private owners for profit, rather than by the state.  
*An era of free market **capitalism**.*

### city

A town created a city by charter and usually containing a cathedral.  
*The **city** raised the tax rate.*

| <b>liberalize</b>               | Make liberal or more liberal, of laws and rules.<br><i>Several agreements to <b>liberalize</b> trade were signed.</i>   |
| <b>mechanization</b>            | The condition of having a highly technical implementation.<br><i>With the increasing <b>mechanization</b> of agriculture far fewer farmers are raising donkeys.</i> |
| <b>modernity</b>                | The quality or condition of being modern.<br><i>A shopping mall would instill a spirit of <b>modernity</b> into this village.</i>                                   |
| <b>modernization</b>            | A modernized version (as of a play).<br><i>The industry is undergoing <b>modernization</b>.</i>   |
