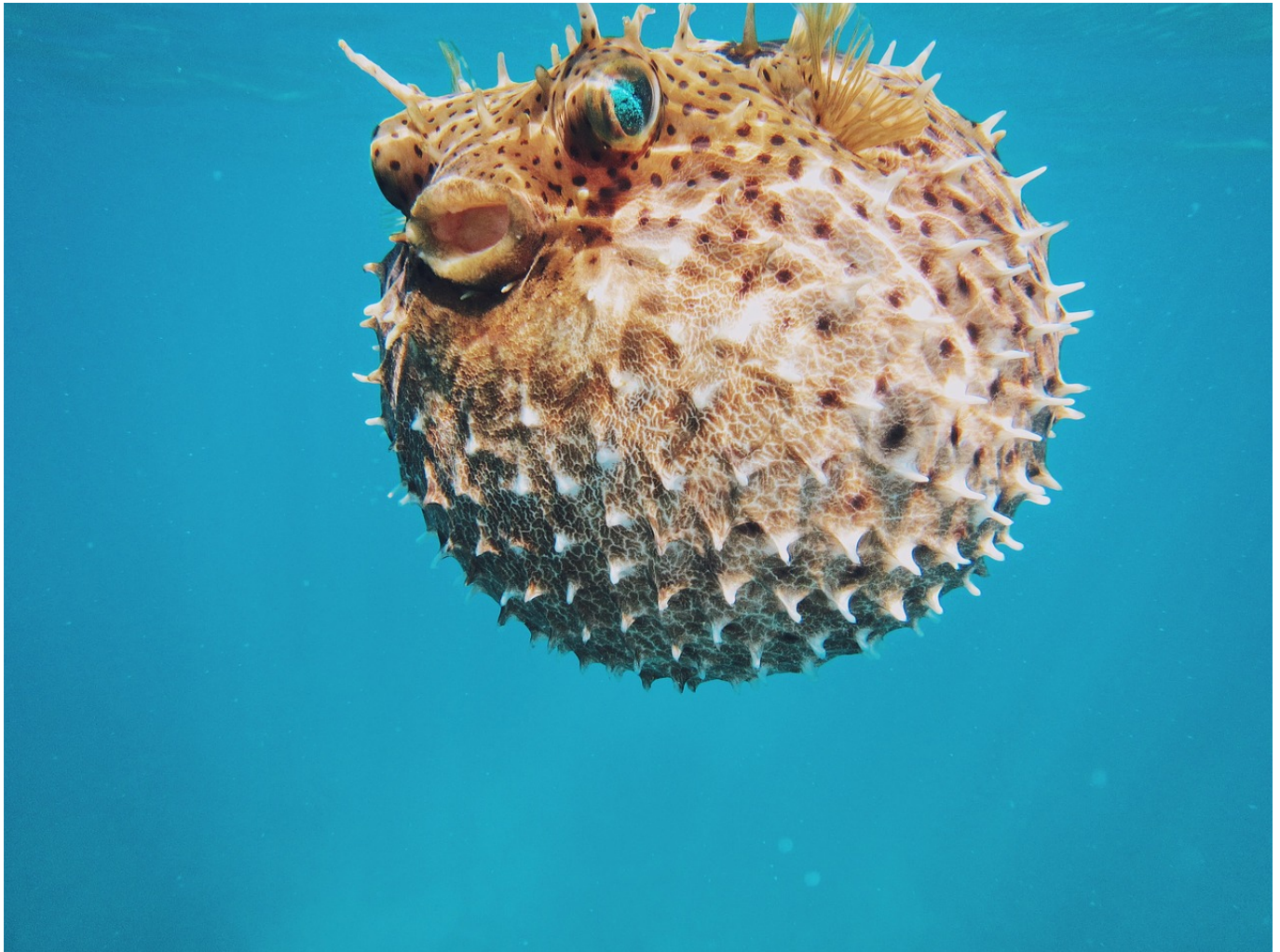

### Definitions of "Urchin" as a noun

- *Poor and often mischievous city child.*



## Synonyms of "Urchin" as a noun (8 Words)

- imp** One who is playfully mischievous.  
*A cheeky young **imp**.*
- minx** An impudent, cunning, or boldly flirtatious girl or young woman.  
*You saucy little **minx**.*
- mischief-maker** Someone who deliberately stirs up trouble.
- monkey** A person who is dominated or controlled by another with reference to the monkey traditionally kept by an organ grinder.  
*Where have you been you little **monkey**.*
- prankster** A person fond of playing pranks.
- puck** A vulcanized rubber disk 3 inches in diameter that is used instead of a ball in ice hockey.

**rascal**            One who is playfully mischievous.  
                         *A lovable **rascal**.*

**rogue**             A dishonest or unprincipled man.  
                         *Cenzo you old **rogue**.*



## Usage Examples of "Urchin" as a noun

- *He was surrounded by a dozen street urchins in rags.*



## Associations of "Urchin" (30 Words)

<b>boorish</b>	Ill-mannered and coarse and contemptible in behavior or appearance. <i><b>Boorish</b> behaviour.</i>
<b>brat</b>	A small pork sausage. <i>Presumably this is where people dump their <b>brats</b> so they can shop in relative peace.</i>
<b>chimpanzee</b>	Intelligent somewhat arboreal ape of equatorial African forests.
<b>dastard</b>	Despicably cowardly- F.D. Roosevelt. <i>The unprovoked and <b>dastardly</b> attack by Japan on December 7th.</i>
<b>dastardly</b>	Wicked and cruel. <i>The unprovoked and <b>dastardly</b> attack by Japan on December 7th.</i>
<b>devil</b>	A very wicked or cruel person. <i>He was dangerous when the <b>devil</b> was in him.</i>
<b>dwarf</b>	A person who is of unusually or abnormally small stature because of a congenital condition a person affected by dwarfism. <i>This year s debt <b>dwarfs</b> that of last year.</i>
<b>fairy</b>	A small imaginary being of human form that has magical powers, especially a female one. <i><b>Fairy</b> gold.</i>
<b>fiend</b>	The Devil. <i>A football <b>fiend</b>.</i>
<b>frivolity</b>	Lack of seriousness; light-heartedness. <i>A night of fun and <b>frivolity</b>.</i>
<b>giant</b>	Used in names of very large animals and plants e g giant hogweed giant tortoise. <i><b>Giant</b> multinational corporations.</i>
<b>gnome</b>	A small ugly person. <i>The <b>gnomes</b> of Zurich.</i>
<b>imp</b>	Fairies that are somewhat mischievous. <i>A cheeky young <b>imp</b>.</i>
<b>knave</b>	(in cards) a jack.
<b>macaque</b>	Short-tailed monkey of rocky regions of Asia and Africa.
<b>miscreant</b>	(of a person) behaving badly or unlawfully. <i>Her <b>miscreant</b> husband.</i>

<b>monkey</b>	A person who is dominated or controlled by another with reference to the monkey traditionally kept by an organ grinder. <i>Where have you been you little <b>monkey</b>.</i>
<b>monster</b>	A large, ugly, and frightening imaginary creature. <i>He was an unfeeling treacherous <b>monster</b>.</i>
<b>orangutan</b>	Large long-armed ape of Borneo and Sumatra having arboreal habits.
<b>pygmy</b>	Used in names of animals and plants that are much smaller than more typical kinds e g pygmy shrew pygmy water lily. <i>Charles VIII of France was a <b>pygmy</b>.</i>
<b>rapscallion</b>	A mischievous person. <i>They were the <b>rapscallions</b> behind this practical joke.</i>
<b>rascal</b>	A deceitful and unreliable scoundrel. <i>You are such a <b>rascal</b>.</i>
<b>reprobate</b>	Express strong disapproval of. <i>He had to present himself as more of a lovable <b>reprobate</b> than a spirit of corruption.</i>
<b>rogue</b>	A dishonest or unprincipled man. <i>You are a <b>rogue</b> and an embezzler.</i>
<b>ruffian</b>	A violent criminal or troublemaker.
<b>scamp</b>	A person, especially a child, who is mischievous in a likeable or amusing way. <i>That man was a <b>scamp</b> a damn thief.</i>
<b><u>scoundrel</u></b>	A wicked or evil person; someone who does evil deliberately. <i>That <b>scoundrel</b> sets a bad example for the other young men.</i>
<b><u>troll</u></b>	A fisherman s lure that is used in trolling. <i>All tongues shall <b>troll</b> you.</i>
<b><u>villain</u></b>	A criminal. <i>The armed <b>villains</b> run off into the night.</i>
<b>wanderer</b>	A computer program that prowls the internet looking for publicly accessible resources that can be added to a database; the database can then be searched with a search engine. <i>He is a longtime seaman a rootless <b>wanderer</b>.</i>
