<b><u>herald</u></b>	Be a sign that (something) is about to happen. <i>The band have been <b>heralded</b> as the great hope for the nineties.</i>
<b>lead</b>	Lead extend or afford access. <i>The use of computers in the classroom <b>lead</b> to better writing.</i>
<b>lead the way</b>	Move ahead (of others) in time or space.

<b>mark the start of</b>	Mark with a scar.
<b>open the way for</b>	Become open.
<b>pave the way for</b>	Cover with a material such as stone or concrete to make suitable for vehicle traffic.
<b><u>pilot</u></b>	Be the pilot of an aircraft or ship. <i>One day workshops for part time staff were <b>piloted</b> in June.</i>
<b>ring in</b>	Sound loudly and sonorously.
<b><u>see</u></b>	Go to see for professional or business reasons. <i>Berlin does not want to be <b>seen</b> to be taking sides in the French election.</i>
<b>set the scene for</b>	Put or set (seeds, seedlings, or plants) into the ground.
<b><u>shepherd</u></b>	Tend sheep as a shepherd. <i>It was she who <b>shepherded</b> the library through the current transition.</i>
<b>show</b>	Show in or as in a picture. <i>He bet 2 on number six to <b>show</b>.</i>
<b>show in</b>	Show in or as in a picture.
<b>show someone the way</b>	Make visible or noticeable.
<b>signal</b>	Communicate silently and non verbally by signals or signs. <i>The truck <b>signalled</b> to turn left.</i>
<b>smooth the path of</b>	Make (a surface) shine.
<b><u>steer</u></b>	Direct (oneself) somewhere. <i>The ship <b>steered</b> into port.</i>
<b>take</b>	Take into one's possession. <i>Black <b>takes</b> the rook with his bishop.</i>

<b>guard</b>	The person who plays the position of guard on a basketball team. <i>We let our <b>guard</b> down.</i>
<b>guide</b>	Use as a guide. <i>He <b>guided</b> her to the front row and sat beside her.</i>
<b>impresario</b>	A person who organizes and often finances concerts, plays, or operas.
<b>movie</b>	Films generally or the film industry. <i>A <b>movie</b> star.</i>
<b>nickelodeon</b>	A cabinet containing an automatic record player; records are played by inserting a coin.
<b>offstage</b>	Behind the scenes; not on stage. <i><b>Offstage</b> political meetings.</i>
<b>premiere</b>	Perform a work for the first time. <i>The <b>premiere</b> showing.</i>
<b>preview</b>	An opportunity to view something before it is acquired or becomes generally available. <i>There was a small reception after the <b>preview</b>.</i>
<b>projector</b>	A device that is used to project rays of light, especially an apparatus with a system of lenses for projecting slides or film on to a screen. <i>He was a tobacco grower and <b>projector</b>.</i>
<b>proscenium</b>	The wall that separates the stage from the auditorium in a modern theater.

<b>safeguard</b>	A document or escort providing safe passage through a region especially in time of war. <i>The charity called for tougher <b>safeguards</b> to protect Britain's remaining natural forests.</i>
<b>screening</b>	A showing of a film, video, or television programme. <i>Prenatal <b>screening</b> for Down's syndrome.</i>
<b>sentry</b>	A person employed to keep watch for some anticipated event. <i>Two men stood <b>sentry</b> on the door every evening.</i>
<b>stunt</b>	Perform a stunt or stunts. <i>Some weeds produce chemicals that <b>stunt</b> the plant's growth.</i>
<b>theater</b>	The art of writing and producing plays. <i>He served in the Vietnam <b>theater</b> for three years.</i>
<b>tutelar</b>	Providing protective supervision; watching over or safeguarding. <i><b>Tutelary</b> gods.</i>
<b>vaudeville</b>	A light or comic stage play with interspersed songs. <i>His comedic roots are in <b>vaudeville</b>.</i>
<b>video</b>	A recording of moving visual images made digitally or on videotape. <i>A site on which people can post their own <b>video</b> clips.</i>
<b>ward</b>	Admit to or care for in a hospital ward. <i>For the last three years the boy has been my <b>ward</b>.</i>
<b>watch</b>	A watchman or group of watchmen who patrolled and guarded the streets of a town before the introduction of the police force. <i>A <b>watch</b> of nightingales began flying south.</i>
<b>watchman</b>	A member of a body of people employed to keep watch in a town at night. <i>A night <b>watchman</b>.</i>
