## **Uttered as an Adjective**

### Definitions of "Uttered" as an adjective

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "uttered" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- Without qualification; used informally as (often pejorative) intensifiers.
- Complete.
- Communicated in words.

#### Synonyms of "Uttered" as an adjective (3 Words)

**expressed** Precisely and clearly expressed or readily observable leaving nothing to implication.

verbalised Communicated in words.

verbalized Communicated in words.

# Associations of "Uttered" (30 Words)

<u>absolute</u>	(of a ruler) having unrestricted power. <i>Absolute loyalty.</i>
aloud	With relatively high volume. <i>He wept aloud</i> .
arrant	Without qualification; used informally as (often pejorative) intensifiers. <i>What arrant nonsense.</i>
articulate	Express (an idea or feeling) fluently and coherently. Delicate <b>articulate</b> plants with a slender central stem.
complete	Complete or carry out. <i>Quarry tiles and faded rugs <b>complete</b> the look.</i>
eloquently	In an articulate manner. Commentators have spoken <b>eloquently</b> on both sides of the issue.
enunciate	Express or state clearly. She <b>enunciate</b> d each word slowly.
incantation	A series of words said as a magic spell or charm. An <b>incantation</b> to raise the dead.
infertile	Incapable of reproducing. An <b>infertile</b> couple.
<u>intently</u>	With earnest and eager attention. <i>He gazed at her <b>intently</b>.</i>
<u>irrevocably</u>	In an irrevocable manner. <i>Our environment will be <b>irrevocably</b> damaged.</i>
knavery	Lack of honesty; acts of lying or cheating or stealing.
litany	A litany contained in the Book of Common Prayer. The patient recited a <b>litany</b> of complaints.
monologue	A long utterance by one person (especially one that prevents others from participating in the conversation. Fred carried on with his <b>monologue</b> as if I hadn t spoken.
perfectly	In a manner or way that could not be better. <b>Perfectly</b> clean glass bottles.
pronounce	Speak pronounce or utter in a certain way. Allow history to <b>pronounce</b> the verdict.
<u>recite</u>	Recite in elocution. <i>Recite</i> a poem.



<u>recount</u>	Count again. I <b>recount</b> ed the tale to Steve.
<u>soliloquy</u>	A part of a play involving a soliloquy. In the opening <b>soliloquy</b> he declares his true intent.
<u>spell</u>	Orally recite the letters of or give the spelling of. Journals have a house style about how to <b>spell</b> .
<u>staring</u>	Without qualification; used informally as (often pejorative) intensifiers. <i>Staring</i> eyes.
<u>stark</u>	Devoid of any qualifications or disguise or adornment. <i>Stark staring mad</i> .
tell	Count (the members of a group. <b>Tell</b> me what is bothering you.
thoroughgoing	Exemplifying a specified characteristic fully; absolute. A <b>thoroughgoing</b> chocoholic.
<u>totally</u>	Completely; absolutely. So then Julie like <b>totally</b> dumps her boyfriend Tommy.
<u>unadulterated</u>	Not mixed with impurities. <b>Unadulterated</b> whole milk yogurt.
<u>unconditional</u>	Not conditional. <i>Unconditional</i> surrender.
<u>unmitigated</u>	Absolute; unqualified. An <b>unmitigated</b> horror.
<u>verbalize</u>	Articulate; either verbally or with a cry, shout, or noise. Many English nouns have become <b>verbalize</b> d.
vocalize	Write (a language such as Hebrew) with vowel points. <i>The child vocalizes a number of distinct sounds.</i>
