Utterly as an Adverb

Definitions of "Utterly" as an adverb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “utterly” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *Completely and without qualification; used informally as intensifiers.*
- *Completely and without qualification; absolutely.*

Synonyms of "Utterly" as an adverb (3 Words)

absolutely	Not viewed in relation to other things. <i>She had absolutely no idea what he was talking about.</i>
dead	Quickly and without warning. <i>You re dead right.</i>
perfectly	Completely and without qualification; used informally as intensifiers. <i>You re perfectly right.</i>

Usage Examples of "Utterly" as an adverb

- *Utterly miserable.*
- *He looked utterly ridiculous.*

Associations of "Utterly" (30 Words)

absolutely	Used to express and emphasize one's assent or agreement. <i>She had absolutely no idea what he was talking about.</i>
all	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly. <i>She s been all round the world.</i>
<u>altogether</u>	Including everything or everyone; in total. <i>An altogether new approach.</i>
<u>collectively</u>	As a group; as a whole. <i>The audience collectively winced.</i>
completely	So as to be complete; with everything necessary. <i>You must be completely mad.</i>
conclusively	In a decisive way that has the effect of proving a case. <i>We settled the problem conclusively.</i>
decisively	In a way that shows the ability to make decisions quickly and effectively. <i>I will come along she said decisively.</i>
dominated	Controlled or ruled by superior authority or power.
drastically	In a drastic manner. <i>The ending was drastically different from what I d expected.</i>
encase	Enclose or cover in a case or close-fitting surround. <i>My feet were encased in mud.</i>
entirely	Solely. <i>Eight coaches entirely for passenger transport.</i>
fully	Completely or entirely; to the fullest extent. <i>Fully grown.</i>
generic	Lacking imagination or individuality; predictable and unoriginal. <i>Substituting generics for brand name drugs.</i>
<u>outright</u>	Open and direct. <i>He was killed outright.</i>
perfectly	Completely and without qualification; used informally as intensifiers. <i>You know perfectly well I can t stay.</i>
redesign	The action or process of redesigning something. <i>It was achieved by the redesign of the product.</i>
<u>rely</u>	Have confidence or faith in. <i>I know I can rely on your discretion.</i>

securely	Without risk of error; with certainty. <i>The data remains securely protected.</i>
<u>solely</u>	Not involving anyone or anything else; only. <i>People are appointed solely on the basis of merit.</i>
<u>stark</u>	Completely. <i>Stark poverty.</i>
<u>thoroughly</u>	Completely and absolutely good is sometimes used informally for thoroughly. <i>He searched the house thoroughly.</i>
<u>totally</u>	Used to emphasize a clause or statement. <i>Some of the lyrics are totally brilliant.</i>
ultimately	At the most basic level. <i>Ultimately he has only himself to blame.</i>
undeniably	To an undeniable degree or in an undeniable manner. <i>The results were undeniably impressive.</i>
unexceptionable	Not open to objection, but not particularly new or exciting. <i>A judge's ethics should be unexceptionable.</i>
<u>unmitigated</u>	Not diminished or moderated in intensity or severity; sometimes used as an intensifier. <i>An unmitigated horror.</i>
<u>unrelated</u>	Lacking a logical or causal relation. <i>Households containing two or more unrelated people.</i>
unsuited	Not right or appropriate. <i>He was totally unsuited for the job.</i>
<u>whole</u>	Acting together as a single undiversified whole. <i>People should be whole in body mind and spirit.</i>
<u>wholly</u>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly. <i>He was wholly convinced.</i>
