## Utterly as an Adverb

### Definitions of "Utterly" as an adverb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “utterly” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *Completely and without qualification; used informally as intensifiers.*
- *Completely and without qualification; absolutely.*

### Synonyms of "Utterly" as an adverb (3 Words)

- absolutely** Not viewed in relation to other things.  
*She had **absolutely** no idea what he was talking about.*
- dead** Quickly and without warning.  
*You re **dead** right.*
- perfectly** Completely and without qualification; used informally as intensifiers.  
*You re **perfectly** right.*

<b>absolutely</b>	Used to express and emphasize one's assent or agreement. <i>She had <b>absolutely</b> no idea what he was talking about.</i>
<b>all</b>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly. <i>She s been <b>all</b> round the world.</i>
<b><u>altogether</u></b>	Including everything or everyone; in total. <i>An <b>altogether</b> new approach.</i>
<b><u>collectively</u></b>	As a group; as a whole. <i>The audience <b>collectively</b> winced.</i>
<b>completely</b>	So as to be complete; with everything necessary. <i>You must be <b>completely</b> mad.</i>
<b>conclusively</b>	In a decisive way that has the effect of proving a case. <i>We settled the problem <b>conclusively</b>.</i>
<b>decisively</b>	In a way that shows the ability to make decisions quickly and effectively. <i>I will come along she said <b>decisively</b>.</i>
<b>dominated</b>	Controlled or ruled by superior authority or power.
<b>drastically</b>	In a drastic manner. <i>The ending was <b>drastically</b> different from what I d expected.</i>
<b>encase</b>	Enclose or cover in a case or close-fitting surround. <i>My feet were <b>encased</b> in mud.</i>
<b>entirely</b>	Solely. <i>Eight coaches <b>entirely</b> for passenger transport.</i>
<b>fully</b>	Completely or entirely; to the fullest extent. <i><b>Fully</b> grown.</i>
<b>generic</b>	Lacking imagination or individuality; predictable and unoriginal. <i>Substituting <b>generics</b> for brand name drugs.</i>
<b><u>outright</u></b>	Open and direct. <i>He was killed <b>outright</b>.</i>
<b>perfectly</b>	Completely and without qualification; used informally as intensifiers. <i>You know <b>perfectly</b> well I can t stay.</i>
<b>redesign</b>	The action or process of redesigning something. <i>It was achieved by the <b>redesign</b> of the product.</i>
<b><u>rely</u></b>	Have confidence or faith in. <i>I know I can <b>rely</b> on your discretion.</i>

<b>securely</b>	Without risk of error; with certainty. <i>The data remains <b>securely</b> protected.</i>
<b>solely</b>	Not involving anyone or anything else; only. <i>People are appointed <b>solely</b> on the basis of merit.</i>
<b>stark</b>	Completely. <i><b>Stark</b> poverty.</i>
<b>thoroughly</b>	Completely and absolutely good is sometimes used informally for thoroughly. <i>He searched the house <b>thoroughly</b>.</i>
<b>totally</b>	Used to emphasize a clause or statement. <i>Some of the lyrics are <b>totally</b> brilliant.</i>
<b>ultimately</b>	At the most basic level. <i><b>Ultimately</b> he has only himself to blame.</i>
<b>undeniably</b>	To an undeniable degree or in an undeniable manner. <i>The results were <b>undeniably</b> impressive.</i>
<b>unexceptionable</b>	Not open to objection, but not particularly new or exciting. <i>A judge's ethics should be <b>unexceptionable</b>.</i>
<b>unmitigated</b>	Not diminished or moderated in intensity or severity; sometimes used as an intensifier. <i>An <b>unmitigated</b> horror.</i>
<b>unrelated</b>	Lacking a logical or causal relation. <i>Households containing two or more <b>unrelated</b> people.</i>
<b>unsuited</b>	Not right or appropriate. <i>He was totally <b>unsuited</b> for the job.</i>
<b>whole</b>	Acting together as a single undiversified whole. <i>People should be <b>whole</b> in body mind and spirit.</i>
<b>wholly</b>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly. <i>He was <b>wholly</b> convinced.</i>
