- *A bird that has strayed or been blown from its usual range or migratory route.*
- *A wanderer who has no established residence or visible means of support.*
- *A person without a settled home or regular work who wanders from place to place and lives by begging.*

beachcomber	A vagrant living on a beach.
beggar	A pauper who lives by begging. <i>Poor little beggars.</i>
bird of passage	Badminton equipment consisting of a ball of cork or rubber with a crown of feathers.
clochard	A wanderer who has no established residence or visible means of support. <i>Clochards drinking in doorways.</i>

<u>derelict</u>	A ship abandoned on the high seas. <i>She had been a derelict recommissioned for this journey.</i>
down-and-out	A failure by a batter or runner to reach a base safely in baseball.
drifter	A fishing boat equipped with a drift net.
floater	A swimmer who floats in the water. <i>Floaters seem to drift through the field of vision.</i>
<u>gypsy</u>	A person who resembles a Gypsy in leading an unconventional, nomadic way of life. <i>Why should she choose to wander the world with a penniless gypsy like me.</i>
homeless person	Poor people who unfortunately do not have a home to live in.
itinerant	A person who travels from place to place. <i>Itinerant traders.</i>
knight of the road	Originally a person of noble birth trained to arms and chivalry; today in Great Britain a person honored by the sovereign for personal merit.
migrant	Traveler who moves from one region or country to another.
<u>nomad</u>	A person who does not stay long in the same place; a wanderer. <i>Dolly was a nomad who had finally taken root in Hawaii.</i>
person of no fixed abode	A human body (usually including the clothing).
person of no fixed address	A grammatical category used in the classification of pronouns, possessive determiners, and verb forms according to whether they indicate the speaker, the addressee, or a third party.
rolling stone	A deep prolonged sound (as of thunder or large bells).
rover	A player who has a rover ball. <i>A lunar rover.</i>
<u>transient</u>	A short-lived oscillation in a system caused by a sudden change of voltage or current or load. <i>Transient laborers.</i>
traveller	A member of a community traditionally having an itinerant way of life, in particular an Irish Traveller. <i>Business travellers.</i>
vagabond	Anything that resembles a vagabond in having no fixed place. <i>Pirate ships were vagabonds of the sea.</i>

wanderer

A computer program that prowls the internet looking for publicly accessible resources that can be added to a database; the database can then be searched with a search engine.

*He is a longtime seaman a rootless **wanderer**.*

wayfarer

A traveler going on a trip.

- *Moving or behaving unpredictably; inconstant.*
- *Continually changing especially as from one abode or occupation to another.*
- *Relating to or living the life of a vagrant.*
- *Moving from place to place; wandering.*

homeless	Physically or spiritually homeless or deprived of security James Stern. <i>Charities for the homeless.</i>
itinerant	Traveling from place to place to work. <i>Itinerant labor.</i>
migrant	Tending to migrate or having migrated. <i>Appalled by the social conditions of migrant life.</i>
migratory	Used of animals that move seasonally. <i>Migratory workers.</i>
mobile	Relating to mobile phones handheld computers and similar technology. <i>A highly mobile face.</i>
nomadic	Living the life of a nomad; wandering. <i>Nomadic herdsmen.</i>
rambling	(of a plant) putting out long shoots and growing over walls or other plants. <i>Rambling forest paths.</i>
roaming	Moving about aimlessly or unsystematically, especially over a wide area. <i>Roaming herds of reindeer.</i>
rootless	Wandering aimlessly without ties to a place or community. <i>A rootless nomad.</i>
roving	Migratory. <i>She became a roving ambassador for Unicef.</i>
transient	Lasting a very short time. <i>The transient nature of the labour force in catering.</i>
travelling	Going or being transported from place to place. <i>My travelling companion and I spent the next day exploring.</i>
unsettled	Worried and uneasy. <i>Unsettled territory.</i>
vagabond	Wandering aimlessly without ties to a place or community. <i>A vagabond poacher.</i>
wandering	Having no fixed course. <i>The river followed its wandering course.</i>

ramble	(of a plant) put out long shoots and grow over walls or other plants. <i>As a boy I rambled the fells around Dent.</i>
<u>rambling</u>	(of writing or speech) lengthy and confused or inconsequential. <i>A big old rambling house.</i>
ramshackle	In deplorable condition. <i>A ramshackle old pier.</i>
roam	Move about or travel aimlessly or unsystematically, especially over a wide area. <i>He let his eyes roam her face.</i>

rover	A player who has a rover ball. <i>They became rovers who departed further and further from civilization.</i>
roving	(of a person in relation to their job) travelling or required to travel to different locations. <i>He trained as a roving reporter.</i>
rudderless	Aimlessly drifting. <i>Today's leadership is rudderless.</i>
truant	Of a pupil being a truant. <i>Her truant husband.</i>
trudge	A difficult or laborious walk. <i>She trudged through blinding snow.</i>
undirected	Lacking direction; without a particular aim, purpose, or target. <i>She was full of ineffectual undirected anger.</i>
unsettled	Still in doubt. <i>An unsettled lifestyle.</i>
<u>vacant</u>	Having or showing no intelligence or interest. <i>The President resigned and the post was left vacant.</i>
vagabond	Wander about as or like a vagabond. <i>Pirate ships were vagabonds of the sea.</i>
<u>wander</u>	An act or instance of wandering. <i>The wandering Jew.</i>
wanderer	A person who travels aimlessly. <i>He is a longtime seaman a rootless wanderer.</i>
wandering	Of a path e.g. <i>Wandering tribes.</i>
