<b>audacious</b>	Disposed to venture or take risks. <i>An <b>audacious</b> interpretation of two Jacobean dramas.</i>
<b>bold</b>	Very steep; having a prominent and almost vertical front. <i>She tossed him a <b>bold</b> look.</i>
<u><b>brave</b></u>	Ready to face and endure danger or pain; showing courage. <i>Familiarity with danger makes a <b>brave</b> man <b>braver</b> but less daring.</i>
<b>confident</b>	Not liable to error in judgment or action- Walter Lippman- Michiko Kakutani. <i>Was <b>confident</b> he would win.</i>
<b>courageous</b>	Possessing or displaying courage; able to face and deal with danger or fear without flinching. <i>Her <b>courageous</b> human rights work.</i>
<b>daring</b>	Disposed to venture or take risks. <i>He rapidly discovered an audience hungry for his <b>daring</b> new works.</i>
<b>dauntless</b>	Invulnerable to fear or intimidation. <i><b>Dauntless</b> bravery.</i>
<b>doughty</b>	Brave and persistent. <i>His <b>doughty</b> spirit kept him going.</i>
<u><b>fearless</b></u>	Showing a lack of fear. <i><b>Fearless</b> reporters and photographers.</i>
<u><b>gallant</b></u>	(of a man) charmingly attentive and chivalrous to women. <i>A <b>gallant</b> gentleman came over and kissed my hand.</i>
<u><b>heroic</b></u>	Very imposing or impressive; surpassing the ordinary (especially in size or scale). <i>Of <b>heroic</b> proportions.</i>
<u><b>intrepid</b></u>	Fearless; adventurous (often used for rhetorical or humorous effect). <i>Our <b>intrepid</b> reporter.</i>
<b>lionhearted</b>	Brave and determined. <i>A brilliant <b>lionhearted</b> second half comeback.</i>
<b>manful</b>	Possessing qualities befitting a man. <i>A <b>manful</b> attempt to smile.</i>
<u><b>manly</b></u>	(of an activity) befitting a man. <i>Honest <b>manly</b> sports.</i>
<b>mettlesome</b>	Willing to face danger. <i>Their horses were beasts of burden not <b>mettlesome</b> chargers.</i>

<b>plucky</b>	Having or showing determined courage in the face of difficulties. <i>The <b>plucky</b> youngster has astounded medical staff.</i>
<b><u>spirited</u></b>	Made lively or spirited. <i>A warm hearted generous <b>spirited</b> man.</i>
<b><u>stout</u></b>	(of a person) rather fat or of heavy build. <i><b>Stout</b> hearts.</i>
<b><u>unabashed</u></b>	Not embarrassed- Jerome Stone. <i>A tinselled charm and <b>unabashed</b> sentimentality.</i>
<b>unalarmed</b>	Not fitted with an alarm. <i>An <b>unalarmed</b> fire exit door.</i>
<b>undaunted</b>	Not intimidated or discouraged by difficulty, danger, or disappointment. <i>They were <b>undaunted</b> by the huge amount of work needed.</i>
<b>undismayed</b>	Not dismayed or discouraged by a setback. <i><b>Undismayed</b> my mother sent me to a first class crammer for two terms.</i>
<b>unflinching</b>	Not shrinking from danger. <i>He has shown <b>unflinching</b> determination throughout the campaign.</i>
<b>unshrinking</b>	Not shrinking from danger.
<b>valorous</b>	Having or showing valor. <i><b>Valorous</b> deeds on the field of honour.</i>

- boldly** In a way that is characterized by having a strong, vivid, or clear appearance.  
*I grabbed a couple of **boldly** patterned fabric samples.*

<b>boldness</b>	The trait of being willing to undertake things that involve risk or danger. <i>You will overlook my <b>boldness</b> I hope.</i>
<b>brave</b>	People who are brave. <i>His medals made a <b>brave</b> show.</i>
<b>bravery</b>	Feeling no fear. <i>Perhaps I ll get a medal for <b>bravery</b>.</i>
<b>coolness</b>	The quality or condition of being at a fairly low temperature. <i>Her art has an icy <b>coolness</b>.</i>
<b>courage</b>	A quality of spirit that enables you to face danger or pain without showing fear. <i>She called on all her <b>courage</b> to face the ordeal.</i>
<b>courageous</b>	Possessing or displaying courage; able to face and deal with danger or fear without flinching. <i>A frank <b>courageous</b> heart triumphed over pain.</i>
<b>daring</b>	(of a person or action) adventurous or audaciously bold. <i>A <b>daring</b> crime.</i>
<b>daringly</b>	In an adventurous manner.
<b>fortitude</b>	Courage in pain or adversity. <i>She endured her illness with great <b>fortitude</b>.</i>
<b>gallant</b>	Grand or impressive. <i>A <b>gallant</b> gentleman came over and kissed my hand.</i>
<b>gallantry</b>	Polite attentiveness to women. <i>No young man offers to carry this burden for her such <b>gallantry</b> is out of fashion.</i>
<b>gutsy</b>	Greedy. <i>The <b>gutsy</b> intensity of her musical involvement.</i>
<b>hardy</b>	United States slapstick comedian who played the pompous and overbearing member of the Laurel and Hardy duo who made many films (1892-1957). <i>A favourite flowering shrub for early spring vigorous and <b>hardy</b>.</i>
<b>heroic</b>	A verse form suited to the treatment of heroic or elevated themes dactylic hexameter or iambic pentameter. <i><b>Heroic</b> undertakings.</i>
<b>intrepid</b>	Invulnerable to fear or intimidation. <i><b>Intrepid</b> pioneers.</i>
<b>manliness</b>	The traditional male quality of being brave and strong. <i>Men accustomed to proving their <b>manliness</b> on the streets.</i>

<b><u>manly</u></b>	(of an activity) befitting a man. <i>A <b>manly</b> torso of perfect proportions.</i>
<b><u>masculine</u></b>	A masculine word or form. <i>A <b>masculine</b> cadence.</i>
<b>plucky</b>	Showing courage. <i>The <b>plucky</b> youngster has astounded medical staff.</i>
<b>robust</b>	Strong enough to withstand or overcome intellectual challenges or adversity. <i>A <b>robust</b> body.</i>
<b>shameless</b>	(of a person or their conduct) characterized by or showing a lack of shame; barefaced or brazen. <i>A <b>shameless</b> imposter.</i>
<b><u>stalwart</u></b>	Having rugged physical strength; inured to fatigue or hardships. <i>A <b>stalwart</b> knight.</i>
<b>unflinching</b>	Not shrinking from danger. <i>He has shown <b>unflinching</b> determination throughout the campaign.</i>
<b><u>valor</u></b>	The qualities of a hero or heroine; exceptional or heroic courage when facing danger (especially in battle). <i>He received a medal for <b>valor</b>.</i>
<b>valorous</b>	Having or showing valor. <i><b>Valorous</b> deeds on the field of honour.</i>
<b>venturous</b>	Disposed to venture or take risks. <i>A <b>venturous</b> spirit.</i>
<b><u>virility</u></b>	The masculine property of being capable of copulation and procreation. <i>Great importance is placed on a man's <b>virility</b>.</i>
