
arguable	Able to be argued or asserted. A highly <b>arguable</b> assumption.
<u>authentic</u>	Conforming to fact and therefore worthy of belief. An <b>authentic</b> depiction of the situation.
bona fide	Undertaken in good faith.
correct	Socially right or correct. The government was <b>correct</b> to follow a course of defeating inflation.
defendable	Capable of being defended.
defensible	Justifiable by argument. A morally <b>defensible</b> penal system.
<u>genuine</u>	Being or reflecting the essential or genuine character of something. <i>Genuine leather.</i>



justifiable	Capable of being justified. Their <b>justifiable</b> fears.
<u>lawful</u>	Of a child born within a lawful marriage. <i>Lawful</i> methods of dissent.
legitimate	Constituting or relating to serious drama as distinct from musical comedy, revue, etc. <i>Legitimate</i> advertising practices.
licit	Authorized, sanctioned by, or in accordance with law. Usage patterns differ between <b>licit</b> and il <b>licit</b> drugs.
<u>logical</u>	Marked by an orderly logical and aesthetically consistent relation of parts. <i>Her <b>logical</b> mind.</i>
maintainable	Capable of being maintained.
official	Given official status as a national or state institution. Members would know when industrial action is <b>official</b> .
plausible	Given to or characterized by presenting specious arguments. It seems <b>plausible</b> that one of two things may happen.
proper	Denoting a subset or subgroup that does not constitute the entire set or group, especially one that has more than one element. <i>To judge with my proper eyes.</i>
rational	Of or associated with or requiring the use of the mind. A process of <b>rational</b> inference.
reasonable	Marked by sound judgment. A restaurant serving excellent food at <b>reasonable</b> prices.
signed and sealed	Used of the language of the deaf.
sound	Exercising or showing good judgment. A <b>sound</b> mind in a <b>sound</b> body.
supportable	Capable of being borne though unpleasant.
<u>sustainable</u>	Conserving an ecological balance by avoiding depletion of natural resources. <i>Sustainable</i> economic growth.
telling	Disclosing unintentionally. A <b>telling</b> presentation.
viable	(of a seed or spore) able to germinate. A <b>viable</b> fetus.
well founded well grounded	In good health especially after having suffered illness or injury. Resulting favorably.





authenticated Established as genuine.

availability	The state of being otherwise unoccupied; freedom to do something. If you call yourself Miss you re advertising your <b>availability</b> to any man who takes a fancy.
available	Able to be used or obtained; at someone's disposal. <i>He was not <b>available</b> for comment.</i>
binding	One of a pair of mechanical devices that are attached to a ski and that will grip a ski boot the bindings should release in case of a fall. <i>The book had a leather <b>binding</b>.</i>
cogent	Powerfully persuasive. They put forward <b>cogent</b> arguments for British membership.
demonstrably	In a way that is clearly apparent or capable of being logically proved. <i>The claim is <b>demonstrably</b> false.</i>



<u>dependability</u>	The quality of being trustworthy and reliable. The brand has built its reputation on rock solid <b>dependability</b> .
effective	Able to accomplish a purpose functioning effectively. When the battles broke out he had a total of 920 <b>effective</b> s.
effectively	In an effective manner. She is <b>effectively</b> his wife.
effectiveness	Capacity to produce strong physiological or chemical effects. <i>The effectiveness</i> of the treatment.
effectual	(of a legal document) valid or binding. <i>Tobacco smoke is the most <b>effectual</b> protection against the midge.</i>
<u>efficacious</u>	(of something inanimate or abstract) successful in producing a desired or intended result; effective. An <i>efficacious</i> law.
efficient	(of a system or machine) achieving maximum productivity with minimum wasted effort or expense. An energy <b>efficient</b> heating system.
expeditious	Marked by speed and efficiency. An <b>expeditious</b> investigation.
<u>expeditiously</u>	With speed and efficiency. <i>The directors will move <b>expeditiously</b> to reach a conclusion.</i>
feasible	Capable of being done with means at hand and circumstances as they are. <i>The most feasible explanation</i> .
indefeasible	Not liable to being annulled or voided or undone. An <b>indefeasible</b> claim to the title.
justifiable	Capable of being justified. Their <b>justifiable</b> fears.
justified	Having, done for, or marked by a good or legitimate reason. <i>The output is left <b>justified</b></i> .
<u>lawful</u>	Of a child born within a lawful marriage. <i>The true and <b>lawful</b> king.</i>
lawgiver	A maker of laws; someone who gives a code of laws. The monarch was supreme executive <b>lawgiver</b> judge and warrior.
legally	In a way that conforms to or is permitted or required by the law. <i>The weapons were purchased</i> <b>legally</b> .
legitimate	Make an illegitimate child legitimate declare the legitimacy of someone. <i>The legitimate theatre.</i>



licit	Not forbidden; lawful. Usage patterns differ between <b>licit</b> and il <b>licit</b> drugs.
passport	Any authorization to pass or go somewhere. <i>His wealth was not a <b>passport</b> into the exclusive circles of society.</i>
rational	An integer or a fraction. A process of <b>rational</b> inference.
reasonable	Not excessive or extreme. A restaurant serving excellent food at <b>reasonable</b> prices.
reasoned	Logically valid. A <b>reasoned</b> judgement.
telling	Powerfully persuasive. A <b>telling</b> gesture.
visa	Provide a passport with a visa. An exit <b>visa</b> .
