| supportable | Capable of being borne though unpleasant. |
| sustainable | Conserving an ecological balance by avoiding depletion of natural resources. <i>Sustainable economic growth.</i> |
| telling | Disclosing unintentionally. <i>A telling presentation.</i> |
| viable | (of a seed or spore) able to germinate. <i>A viable fetus.</i> |
| well founded | In good health especially after having suffered illness or injury. |

available Able to be used or obtained; at someone's disposal.
*He was not **available** for comment.*

binding One of a pair of mechanical devices that are attached to a ski and that will grip a ski boot the bindings should release in case of a fall.
*The book had a leather **binding**.*

cogent Powerfully persuasive.
*They put forward **cogent** arguments for British membership.*

demonstrably In a way that is clearly apparent or capable of being logically proved.
*The claim is **demonstrably** false.*
