valour Great courage in the face of danger, especially in battle.
*The medals are awarded for acts of **valour**.*

audacity	Aggressive boldness or unmitigated effrontery. <i>She had the audacity to suggest I'd been carrying on with him.</i>
bold	A bold typeface or letter. <i>A coat with bold polka dots.</i>
boldly	In a confident and courageous way; showing a willingness to take risks. <i>I grabbed a couple of boldly patterned fabric samples.</i>
boldness	Impudent aggressiveness. <i>The proposal required great boldness.</i>
brave	People who are brave. <i>Girls decked out in brave new dresses.</i>
bravely	In a courageous manner. <i>He has been hailed a hero after he bravely tackled a thief at a hotel.</i>

bravery	Courageous behaviour or character. <i>Perhaps I ll get a medal for bravery.</i>
chutzpah	Extreme self-confidence or audacity. <i>Love him or hate him you have to admire Cohen s chutzpah.</i>
coolness	The quality of lacking friendliness or enthusiasm. <i>The coolness of the breeze.</i>
courage	Strength in the face of pain or grief. <i>He fought his illness with great courage.</i>
courageous	Possessing or displaying courage; able to face and deal with danger or fear without flinching- Herman Melville- Willia. <i>Set a courageous example by leading them safely into and out of enemy held territory.</i>
daring	The trait of being willing to undertake things that involve risk or danger. <i>The most daring of contemporary fiction writers.</i>
daringly	In an original manner.
fortitude	Strength of mind that enables one to endure adversity with courage. <i>She endured her illness with great fortitude.</i>
gallant	A man who attends or escorts a woman. <i>They made a gallant array as they marched off.</i>
gallantry	Courageous behaviour, especially in battle. <i>A medal awarded for outstanding gallantry during the raid.</i>
hero	(classical mythology) a being of great strength and courage celebrated for bold exploits; often the offspring of a mortal and a god. <i>Jumpsuits are hands down our hottest hero piece right now.</i>
heroic	A verse form suited to the treatment of heroic or elevated themes dactylic hexameter or iambic pentameter. <i>They took heroic measures to save his life.</i>
heroine	The main good female character in a work of fiction. <i>Jane Austen s heroines.</i>
heroism	Great bravery. <i>He showed great heroism in battle.</i>
impudence	An impudent statement. <i>His arrogance and impudence had offended many.</i>
indomitable	Impossible to subdue or defeat. <i>A woman of indomitable spirit.</i>
plucky	Having or showing determined courage in the face of difficulties. <i>The plucky youngster has astounded medical staff.</i>

- resourcefulness** The quality of being able to cope with a difficult situation.
*A man of great **resourcefulness**.*
- stouthearted** Used especially of persons.
*A **stouthearted** fellow who had an active career in the army.*
- temerity** Excessive confidence or boldness; audacity.
*No one had the **temerity** to question his conclusions.*
- unflinching** Not showing fear or hesitation in the face of danger or difficulty.
*He has shown **unflinching** determination throughout the campaign.*
- valiant** Having or showing valor.
*A **valiant** attempt to prevent the hijack.*
- valorous** Having or showing valor.
***Valorous** deeds on the field of honour.*
- venturous** Willing to take risks or embark on difficult or unusual courses of action.
*A **venturous** spirit.*
