Excessive confidence or boldness; audacity. temerity No one had the **temerity** to question his conclusions.

Not showing fear or hesitation in the face of danger or difficulty.

unflinching He has shown **unflinching** determination throughout the campaign.

Having or showing valor. valiant

A valiant attempt to prevent the hijack.

Having or showing valor. valorous

Valorous deeds on the field of honour.

Willing to take risks or embark on difficult or unusual courses of action. venturous
