<b>audacity</b>	Aggressive boldness or unmitigated effrontery. <i>She had the <b>audacity</b> to suggest I'd been carrying on with him.</i>
<b>bold</b>	A bold typeface or letter. <i>A coat with <b>bold</b> polka dots.</i>
<b>boldly</b>	In a confident and courageous way; showing a willingness to take risks. <i>I grabbed a couple of <b>boldly</b> patterned fabric samples.</i>
<b>boldness</b>	Impudent aggressiveness. <i>The proposal required great <b>boldness</b>.</i>

<b>chutzpah</b>	Extreme self-confidence or audacity. <i>Love him or hate him you have to admire Cohen s <b>chutzpah</b>.</i>
<b>coolness</b>	The quality of lacking friendliness or enthusiasm. <i>The <b>coolness</b> of the breeze.</i>
<b>courage</b>	Strength in the face of pain or grief. <i>He fought his illness with great <b>courage</b>.</i>
<b>courageous</b>	Possessing or displaying courage; able to face and deal with danger or fear without flinching- Herman Melville- Willia. <i>Set a <b>courageous</b> example by leading them safely into and out of enemy held territory.</i>
<b>daring</b>	The trait of being willing to undertake things that involve risk or danger. <i>The most <b>daring</b> of contemporary fiction writers.</i>
<b>daringly</b>	In an original manner.
<b>fortitude</b>	Strength of mind that enables one to endure adversity with courage. <i>She endured her illness with great <b>fortitude</b>.</i>
<b>gallant</b>	A man who attends or escorts a woman. <i>They made a <b>gallant</b> array as they marched off.</i>
<b>gallantry</b>	Courageous behaviour, especially in battle. <i>A medal awarded for outstanding <b>gallantry</b> during the raid.</i>
<b>hero</b>	(classical mythology) a being of great strength and courage celebrated for bold exploits; often the offspring of a mortal and a god. <i>Jumpsuits are hands down our hottest <b>hero</b> piece right now.</i>
<b>heroic</b>	A verse form suited to the treatment of heroic or elevated themes dactylic hexameter or iambic pentameter. <i>They took <b>heroic</b> measures to save his life.</i>
<b>heroine</b>	The main good female character in a work of fiction. <i>Jane Austen s <b>heroines</b>.</i>
<b>heroism</b>	Great bravery. <i>He showed great <b>heroism</b> in battle.</i>
<b>impudence</b>	An impudent statement. <i>His arrogance and <b>impudence</b> had offended many.</i>
<b>indomitable</b>	Impossible to subdue or defeat. <i>A woman of <b>indomitable</b> spirit.</i>
<b>plucky</b>	Having or showing determined courage in the face of difficulties. <i>The <b>plucky</b> youngster has astounded medical staff.</i>



<b>resourcefulness</b>	The quality of being able to cope with a difficult situation. <i>A man of great <b>resourcefulness</b>.</i>
<b>stouthearted</b>	Used especially of persons. <i>A <b>stouthearted</b> fellow who had an active career in the army.</i>
<b>temerity</b>	Excessive confidence or boldness; audacity. <i>No one had the <b>temerity</b> to question his conclusions.</i>
<b>unflinching</b>	Not showing fear or hesitation in the face of danger or difficulty. <i>He has shown <b>unflinching</b> determination throughout the campaign.</i>
<b>valiant</b>	Having or showing valor. <i>A <b>valiant</b> attempt to prevent the hijack.</i>
<b>valorous</b>	Having or showing valor. <i><b>Valorous</b> deeds on the field of honour.</i>
<b>venturous</b>	Willing to take risks or embark on difficult or unusual courses of action. <i>A <b>venturous</b> spirit.</i>
