<b>advance guard</b>	Increase in price or value.
<b>avant-garde</b>	Any creative group active in the innovation and application of new concepts and techniques in a given field (especially in the arts).
<b>cutting edge</b>	A part (sometimes a root or leaf or bud) removed from a plant to propagate a new plant through rooting or grafting.
<b>driving force</b>	The act of controlling and steering the movement of a vehicle or animal.
<b>fore</b>	The front part of something, especially a ship.
<b>forefront</b>	The part in the front or nearest the viewer. <i>The Cotswolds were once at the <b>forefront</b> of woollen manufacturing in England.</i>
<b>front</b>	The part of a garment covering a person's front. <i>He led the national liberation <b>front</b>.</i>

<b>front line</b>	The atmospheric phenomenon created at the boundary between two different air masses.
<b>front rank</b>	The immediate proximity of someone or something.
<b>lead</b>	A position of leadership especially in the phrase take the lead. <i>The newswire will be offering two different <b>leads</b> for certain stories so editors can pick and choose.</i>
<b>leading position</b>	Thin strip of metal used to separate lines of type in printing.
<b><u>spearhead</u></b>	Someone who leads or initiates an activity (attack or campaign etc). <i>She became the <b>spearhead</b> of a health education programme.</i>
<b>van</b>	A caravan. A <b>van</b> driver.

<u>armament</u>	A military force equipped for war. <i>National <b>armaments</b> could be kept to a minimum.</i>
<u>armed</u>	Having arms or arms as specified; used especially in combination. <i><b>Armed</b> robbery.</i>
<u>armored</u>	Protected by armor (used of persons or things military).
<u>army</u>	The army of the United States of America the agency that organizes and trains soldiers for land warfare. <i>He joined the <b>army</b> at 16.</i>
artillery	An army unit that uses big guns. <i>Tanks and heavy <b>artillery</b>.</i>
battalion	A large organized group of people pursuing a common aim. <i>A <b>battalion</b> of ants.</i>
<u>brigade</u>	Form or unite into a brigade. <i>He commanded a <b>brigade</b> of 3 000 men.</i>

cantonment	A military garrison or camp.
<u>commander</u>	A rank of naval officer above lieutenant commander and below captain. <i>The <b>commander</b> of a paratroop regiment.</i>
corps	A main subdivision of an army in the field, consisting of two or more divisions. <i>Diplomatic <b>corps</b>.</i>
demobilize	Take (troops) out of active service, typically at the end of a war. <i>He was <b>demobilized</b> in February 1946.</i>
<u>devoted</u>	Given over to the display, study, or discussion of. <i>He was a <b>devoted</b> husband.</i>
<u>disarm</u>	Allay the hostility or suspicions of. <i>Police yesterday <b>disarmed</b> a parcel bomb.</i>
disarmament	The reduction or withdrawal of military forces and weapons. <i><b>Disarmament</b> treaties between America and the former Soviet Union.</i>
<u>empire</u>	An extensive sphere of activity controlled by one person or group. <i>He encouraged the Greeks in their dream of <b>empire</b> in Asia Minor.</i>
<u>forefront</u>	The part in the front or nearest the viewer. <i>The idea of motion was always to the <b>forefront</b> of his mind and central to his philosophy.</i>

<b>gun</b>	Used as a nickname for a ship's gunnery officer. <i>Two runners started before the <b>gun</b>.</i>
<b>inroad</b>	An encroachment or intrusion. <i>They made <b>inroads</b> in the United States market.</i>
<b>jingo</b>	A vociferous supporter of policy favouring war, especially in the name of patriotism. <i>The feverish excitement of the <b>jingo</b> crowds.</i>
<b>legion</b>	A vast number of people or things. <i>Palomar's fans are <b>legion</b>.</i>
<b>legionary</b>	A soldier in a Roman legion. <i>The <b>legionary</b> fortress of Isca.</i>
<b>muster</b>	Gather or bring together. <i>The city council was unable to <b>muster</b> enough votes to pass the measure.</i>
<b>nationalist</b>	Relating to nationalists or nationalism. <i>A Basque <b>nationalist</b>.</i>
<b>naval</b>	Connected with or belonging to or used in a navy. <i>A <b>naval</b> officer.</i>
<b>patriot</b>	One who loves and defends his or her country. <i>A true <b>patriot</b>.</i>
<b>regiment</b>	Form military personnel into a regiment. <i>Every aspect of their life is strictly <b>regimented</b>.</i>
<b>statesman</b>	A man who is a respected leader in national or international affairs. <i>Guests included members of the European royal families, diplomats, and statesmen.</i>
<b>top</b>	Covering for a hole especially a hole in the top of a container. <i>Fill the cup almost to the <b>top</b>.</i>
<b>turret</b>	A rotating holder for tools, especially on a lathe. <i>A castle with fairy tale <b>turrets</b>.</i>
