front	The part of a garment covering a person s front. <i>He led the national liberation <b>front</b>.</i>




front line	The atmospheric phenomenon created at the boundary between two different air masses.

leading position	${f n}$ Thin strip of metal used to separate lines of type in printing.
<u>spearhead</u>	Someone who leads or initiates an activity (attack or campaign etc. <i>She became the <b>spearhead</b> of a health education programme.</i>
van	A caravan. A <b>van</b> driver.

armed	Having arms or arms as specified; used especially in combination. <i>Armed</i> robbery.
<u>armored</u>	Protected by armor (used of persons or things military.
<u>army</u>	The army of the United States of America the agency that organizes and trains soldiers for land warfare. <i>He joined the army at 16.</i>
artillery	An army unit that uses big guns. Tanks and heavy <b>artillery</b> .

<u>devoted</u>	Given over to the display, study, or discussion of. <i>He was a <b>devoted</b> husband</i> .
<u>disarm</u>	Allay the hostility or suspicions of. Police yesterday <b>disarm</b> ed a parcel bomb.
disarmament	The reduction or withdrawal of military forces and weapons. <b>Disarmament</b> treaties between America and the former Soviet Union.
<u>empire</u>	An extensive sphere of activity controlled by one person or group. <i>He encouraged the Greeks in their dream of <b>empire</b> in Asia Minor.</i>
<u>forefront</u>	The part in the front or nearest the viewer. The idea of motion was always to the <b>forefront</b> of his mind and central to his philosophy.



<u>gun</u>	Used as a nickname for a ship s gunnery officer. <i>Two runners started before the <b>gun</b></i> .
inroad	An encroachment or intrusion. They made <b>inroad</b> s in the United States market.
jingo	A vociferous supporter of policy favouring war, especially in the name of patriotism. The feverish excitement of the <b>jingo</b> crowds.
<u>legion</u>	A vast number of people or things. Palomar s fans are <b>legion</b> .
legionary	A soldier in a Roman legion. The <b>legionary</b> fortress of Isca.
muster	Gather or bring together. The city council was unable to <b>muster</b> enough votes to pass the measure.
nationalist	Relating to nationalists or nationalism. A Basque <b>nationalist</b> .
naval	Connected with or belonging to or used in a navy. A <b>naval</b> officer.
<u>patriot</u>	One who loves and defends his or her country. A true <b>patriot</b> .
regiment	Form military personnel into a regiment. Every aspect of their life is strictly <b>regiment</b> ed.
statesman	A man who is a respected leader in national or international affairs. Guests included members of the European royal families, diplomats, and statesmen.
top	Covering for a hole especially a hole in the top of a container. <i>Fill the cup almost to the top.</i>
turret	A rotating holder for tools, especially on a lathe. A castle with fairy tale <b>turret</b> s.
