- *Become zero.*
- *Pass away rapidly.*
- *Decrease rapidly and disappear.*
- *Cease to exist.*
- *Get lost, as without warning or explanation.*
- *Disappear suddenly and completely.*
- *Gradually cease to exist.*



Synonyms of "Vanish" as a verb (31 Words)

be invisible	Have life, be alive.
be lost to sight	Represent, as of a character on stage.
be lost to view	Be identical to; be someone or something.
be no more	To remain unmolested, undisturbed, or uninterrupted — used only in infinitive form.
become extinct	Enter or assume a certain state or condition.
become invisible	Enhance the appearance of.
become obsolete	Undergo a change or development.
cease to be	Put an end to a state or an activity.
cease to exist	Have an end, in a temporal, spatial, or quantitative sense; either spatial or metaphorical.
come to an end	Have a certain priority.

depart	Leave (one's job). <i>The train departs at noon.</i>
die out	Languish as with love or desire. Become invisible or unnoticeable.
disappear	<i>It is estimated that some 7000 people have been disappeared by security forces.</i>
disperse	Move away from each other. <i>Caravan sites could be dispersed among trees so as to be out of sight.</i>
dissipate	To cause to separate and go in different directions. <i>The cloud of smoke dissipated.</i>
end	Have an end in a temporal spatial or quantitative sense either spatial or metaphorical. <i>When the war ended policy changed.</i>
evanesce	Disappear gradually. <i>Water moves among reeds evanesces shines.</i>
evaporate	Cause to change into a vapor. Evaporate milk.
fade	(of a racehorse, runner, etc.) lose strength and cease to perform well. <i>She faded near the finish.</i>
fade away	Lose freshness, vigor, or vitality.
fell	Cause to fall by or as if by delivering a blow.
fly	Hit a fly. <i>Man cannot fly.</i>
go away	Stop operating or functioning.
leave	Leave behind unintentionally. <i>This leaves no room for improvement.</i>
melt away	Become less clearly visible or distinguishable; disappear gradually or seemingly.
pass	Pass over across or through. <i>The Portuguese trade passed its peak in the 1760s.</i>
pass away	Transfer to another; of rights or property.
recede from view	Retreat.
vanish into thin air	Become invisible or unnoticeable.
vaporize	Convert or be converted into vapour. <i>There is a large current which is sufficient to vaporize carbon.</i>

withdraw

Withdraw from active participation.
*Both countries agreed to **withdraw** their troops.*



Usage Examples of "Vanish" as a verb

- *The effect vanished when day broke.*
- *An entire civilization vanished.*
- *The environment is under threat—hedgerows and woodlands are vanishing.*
- *Moira vanished without trace.*



Associations of "Vanish" (30 Words)

- ablate** Gradually remove material from or erode (a surface or object) by melting, evaporation, frictional action, etc., or erode (material) in this way.
*Therapeutic intervention to **ablate** existing cancer cells.*
- apoplectic** Relating to or denoting apoplexy (stroke).
*An **apoplectic** attack.*
- [decease](#) Pass from physical life and lose all bodily attributes and functions necessary to sustain life.
*He **deceased** at his palace of Croydon.*
- desiccant** A hygroscopic substance used as a drying agent.
*A small packet of **desiccant** to absorb any moisture.*
- desiccation** The removal of moisture from something.
*Stems were stored in plastic bags to prevent **desiccation**.*

die	Die one after another until few or none are left. <i>The original founders died off or retired.</i>
<u>disappear</u>	Get lost, as without warning or explanation. <i>The sun had disappeared.</i>
<u>disappearance</u>	The act of leaving secretly or without explanation. <i>He regretted the disappearance of Greek from school curricula.</i>
dissipate	Spend frivolously and unwisely. <i>The concern she d felt for him had wholly dissipated.</i>
dryness	The condition of not containing or being covered by a liquid (especially water). <i>There s a lovely dryness to this straw coloured wine.</i>
evaporate	(of something abstract) cease to exist. <i>The water evaporated in front of our eyes.</i>
evaporation	The process of turning from liquid into vapour. <i>Snow cover prevents evaporation of water from the soil.</i>
<u>extinct</u>	Permanently inactive. <i>The sort of girls school that is now extinct.</i>
<u>fade</u>	A golf shot that curves to the right for a right-handed golfer. <i>The light had faded and dusk was advancing.</i>
<u>forget</u>	Forget to do something. <i>Don t forget to call the chairman of the board to the meeting.</i>
<u>gone</u>	Having reached a specified time in a pregnancy. <i>Bygone days.</i>
hide	A camouflaged shelter used to observe wildlife at close quarters. <i>He used to hide out in a cave.</i>
<u>inconspicuous</u>	Not prominent or readily noticeable. <i>An inconspicuous red brick building.</i>
<u>invisible</u>	Invisible exports and imports. <i>This invisible gas is present to some extent in every home.</i>
lapse	(of a right, privilege, or agreement) become invalid because it is not used, claimed, or renewed; expire. <i>The country has lapsed into chaos.</i>
leave	Leave unchanged or undisturbed or refrain from taking. <i>Leave the room.</i>
<u>miss</u>	Be too late to catch (a passenger vehicle or the post). <i>She misses all her old friends.</i>

neglect	The trait of neglecting responsibilities and lacking concern. <i>He was reported for neglect of duty.</i>
obscurity	The state of being indistinct or indefinite for lack of adequate illumination. <i>He worked in obscurity for many years.</i>
perish	(of rubber, food, etc.) lose its normal qualities; rot or decay. <i>An abandoned tyre whose rubber had perished.</i>
transpiration	The emission of water vapor from the leaves of plants. <i>Plants lose more than 90 per cent of their water through transpiration.</i>
undeserved	Not warranted, merited, or earned. <i>Has an undeserved reputation as a coward.</i>
unseen	An unseen passage for translation. <i>It seemed she might escape unseen.</i>
vaporize	Decrease rapidly and disappear. <i>All my stock assets have vaporized.</i>
withdraw	Withdraw from active participation. <i>Both countries agreed to withdraw their troops.</i>
