<b>colourless</b>	Lacking in variety and interest. <i>The book is rather <b>colourless</b> like its author.</i>

<b>dull</b>	Not having a sharp edge or point. <i>A <b>dull</b> glow.</i>
<b>feeble</b>	Lacking strength- Nathaniel Hawthorne. <i>Her <b>feeble</b> cries of pain.</i>
<b>flat</b>	Of a key having a flat or flats in the signature. <i>A <b>flat</b> two dimensional painting.</i>
<b>flavorless</b>	Lacking taste or flavor or tang. <i><b>Flavorless</b> supermarket tomatoes.</i>
<b>flavourless</b>	Lacking taste or flavor or tang. <i>The stories are entirely <b>flavourless</b>.</i>
<b>insipid</b>	Lacking interest or significance or impact. <i><b>Inspid</b> hospital food.</i>
<b>jejune</b>	Lacking interest or significance or impact. <i>The <b>jejune</b> diets of the very poor.</i>
<b>lifeless</b>	Destitute or having been emptied of life or living beings. <i>His <b>lifeless</b> body was taken from the river.</i>
<b>pallid</b>	Abnormally deficient in color as suggesting physical or emotional distress. <i><b>Pallid</b> liberalism.</i>
<b>savorless</b>	Lacking taste or flavor or tang.
<b>savourless</b>	Lacking taste or flavor or tang.
<b>spiritless</b>	Evidencing little spirit or courage; overly submissive or compliant. <i>A <b>spiritless</b> reply to criticism.</i>
<b>stale</b>	No longer new and interesting or exciting. <i>Their marriage had gone <b>stale</b>.</i>
<b>sterile</b>	Lacking in imagination, creativity, or excitement; uninspiring or unproductive. <i>The peppermints are vigorous <b>sterile</b> hybrids.</i>
<b>tame</b>	(of a plant) produced by cultivation. <i>Every businessman needs a <b>tame</b> lawyer at his elbow.</i>
<b>tasteless</b>	Lacking aesthetic or social taste. <i>A <b>tasteless</b> joke.</i>

<b>tedious</b>	So lacking in interest as to cause mental weariness. <i><b>Tedious</b> days on the train.</i>
<b>tired</b>	Bored or impatient with. <i><b>Tired</b> clichés like the information revolution.</i>
<b>trite</b>	Repeated too often; overfamiliar through overuse. <i>This point may now seem obvious and <b>trite</b>.</i>
<b>unexciting</b>	Not exciting; dull. <i>Many school prospectuses are dull and <b>unexciting</b>.</i>
<b>unimaginative</b>	Dealing only with concrete facts. <i>The audience proved sluggish and <b>unimaginative</b>.</i>
<b>uninspired</b>	Deficient in originality or creativity; lacking powers of invention. <i>He writes repetitive and <b>uninspired</b> poetry.</i>
<b>uninspiring</b>	Not producing excitement or interest. <i>An <b>uninspiring</b> game that United scarcely deserved to win.</i>
<b>uninteresting</b>	Arousing no interest or attention or curiosity or excitement. <i>The scenery is dull and <b>uninteresting</b>.</i>
<b>vacuous</b>	Devoid of significance or force. <i>A <b>vacuous</b> space.</i>
<b>watery</b>	Filled with water. <i><b>Watery</b> sunshine.</i>
<b>wishy-washy</b>	Weak in willpower, courage or vitality.

<b>banality</b>	A trite or obvious remark. <i>There is an essential <b>banality</b> to the story he tells.</i>

<b><u>bland</u></b>	Showing no strong emotion. <i>A <b>bland</b> diet.</i>
<b>boring</b>	So lacking in interest as to cause mental weariness. <i>I ve got a <b>boring</b> job in an office.</i>
<b>bromide</b>	A reproduction or piece of typesetting on bromide paper. <i>Feel good <b>bromides</b> create the illusion of problem solving.</i>
<b><u>cliche</u></b>	A trite or obvious remark.
<b>commonplace</b>	A notable passage in a work copied into a commonplace book. <i>The usual <b>commonplace</b> remarks.</i>
<b><u>drab</u></b>	Clothes especially trousers made of drab. <i><b>Drab</b> faded curtains.</i>
<b>dull</b>	Make or become dull or less intense. <i>Albert s eyes <b>dulled</b> a little.</i>
<b><u>edible</u></b>	Fit or suitable to be eaten. <i>Nasturtium seeds are <b>edible</b>.</i>
<b>fatigue</b>	Lose interest or become bored with something or somebody. <i>Political <b>fatigue</b>.</i>
<b>featureless</b>	Lacking distinguishing characteristics or features. <i>A <b>featureless</b> landscape of snow and ice.</i>
<b>hackneyed</b>	(of a phrase or idea) having been overused; unoriginal and trite. <i><b>Hackneyed</b> phrases.</i>
<b>humdrum</b>	Not challenging; dull and lacking excitement. <i>He was sick of the <b>humdrum</b> of his fellow prisoners.</i>
<b>insipid</b>	Lacking taste or flavor or tang. <i><b>Inspid</b> hospital food.</i>
<b>irksome</b>	Irritating; annoying. <i>Petty regulations were becoming very <b>irksome</b>.</i>
<b><u>lackluster</u></b>	Lacking luster or shine. <i>A dull <b>lackluster</b> life.</i>
<b>mediocrity</b>	Ordinariness as a consequence of being average and not outstanding. <i>The team suddenly came good after years of <b>mediocrity</b>.</i>
<b><u>monotony</u></b>	Constancy of tone or pitch or inflection. <i>You can become resigned to the <b>monotony</b> of captivity.</i>
<b>nondescript</b>	A nondescript person or thing. <i>She lived in a <b>nondescript</b> suburban apartment block.</i>

<b>normal</b>	Conforming with or constituting a norm or standard or level or type or social norm not abnormal. <i>Normal working hours.</i>
<b>platitude</b>	A trite or obvious remark. <i>She began uttering liberal <b>platitudes</b>.</i>
<b>ponderous</b>	(especially of speech or writing) dull or laborious. <i>A <b>ponderous</b> yawn.</i>
<b>prosaic</b>	Having or using the style or diction of prose as opposed to poetry; lacking imaginativeness or originality. <i>A <b>prosaic</b> and unimaginative essay.</i>
<b>taste</b>	The sensation that results when taste buds in the tongue and throat convey information about the chemical composition of a soluble stimulus. <i>His cold deprived him of his sense of <b>taste</b>.</i>
<b>tiresome</b>	So lacking in interest as to cause mental weariness. <i>Weeding is a <b>tiresome</b> but essential job.</i>
<b>trite</b>	Repeated too often; overfamiliar through overuse. <i>The <b>trite</b> metaphor hard as nails.</i>
<b>uninteresting</b>	Characteristic or suggestive of an institution especially in being uniform or dull or unimaginative. <i>The scenery is dull and <b>uninteresting</b>.</i>
<b>usual</b>	Occurring or encountered or experienced or observed frequently or in accordance with regular practice or procedure. <i>The <b>usual</b> greeting.</i>
<b>wearisome</b>	So lacking in interest as to cause mental weariness. <i>They insisted on his presence at <b>wearisome</b> musical soir es.</i>
