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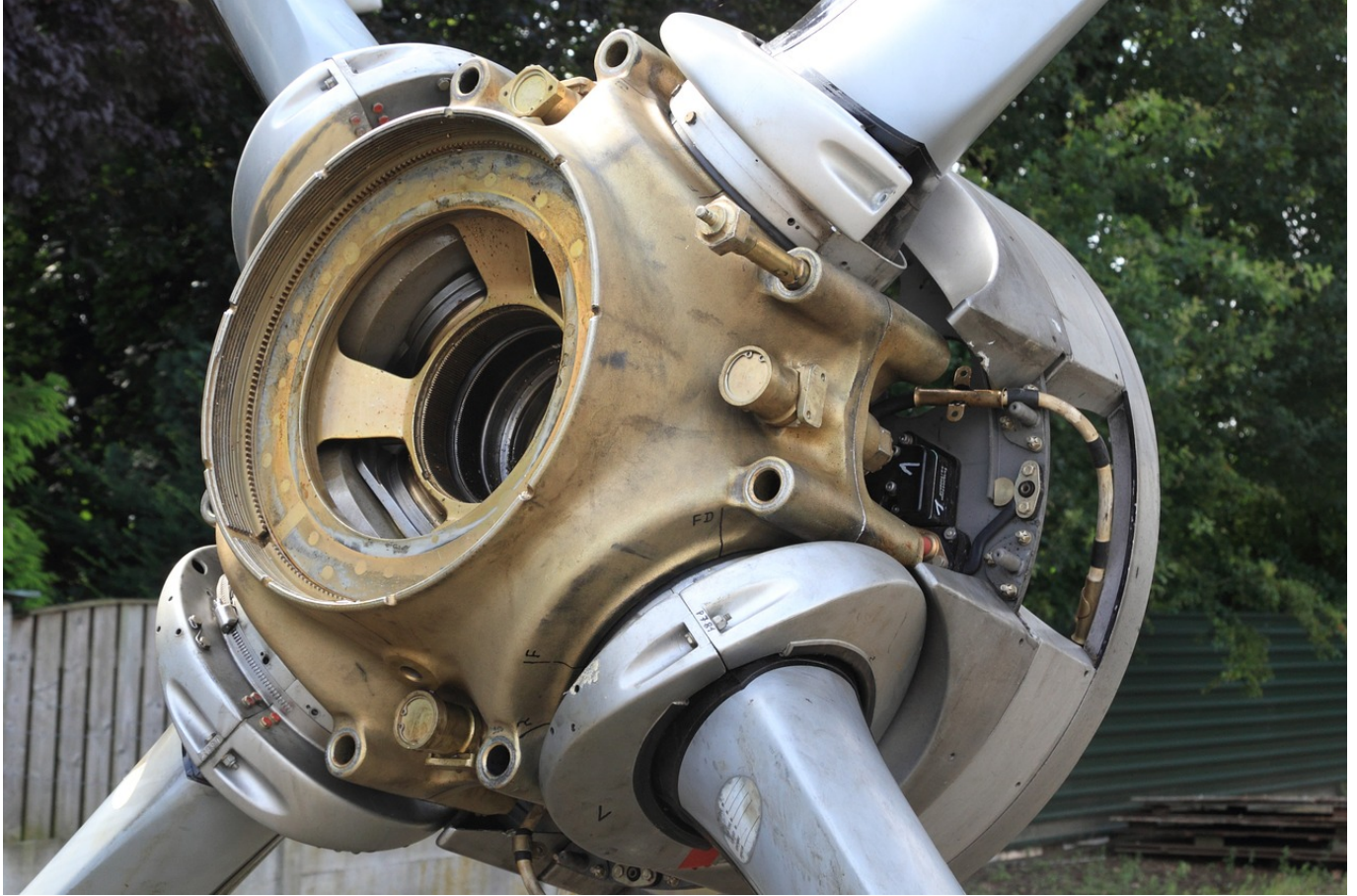

## Variability as a Noun

### Definitions of "Variability" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “variability” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The quality of being uneven and lacking uniformity.*
- *The quality of being subject to variation.*
- *Lack of consistency or fixed pattern; liability to vary or change.*

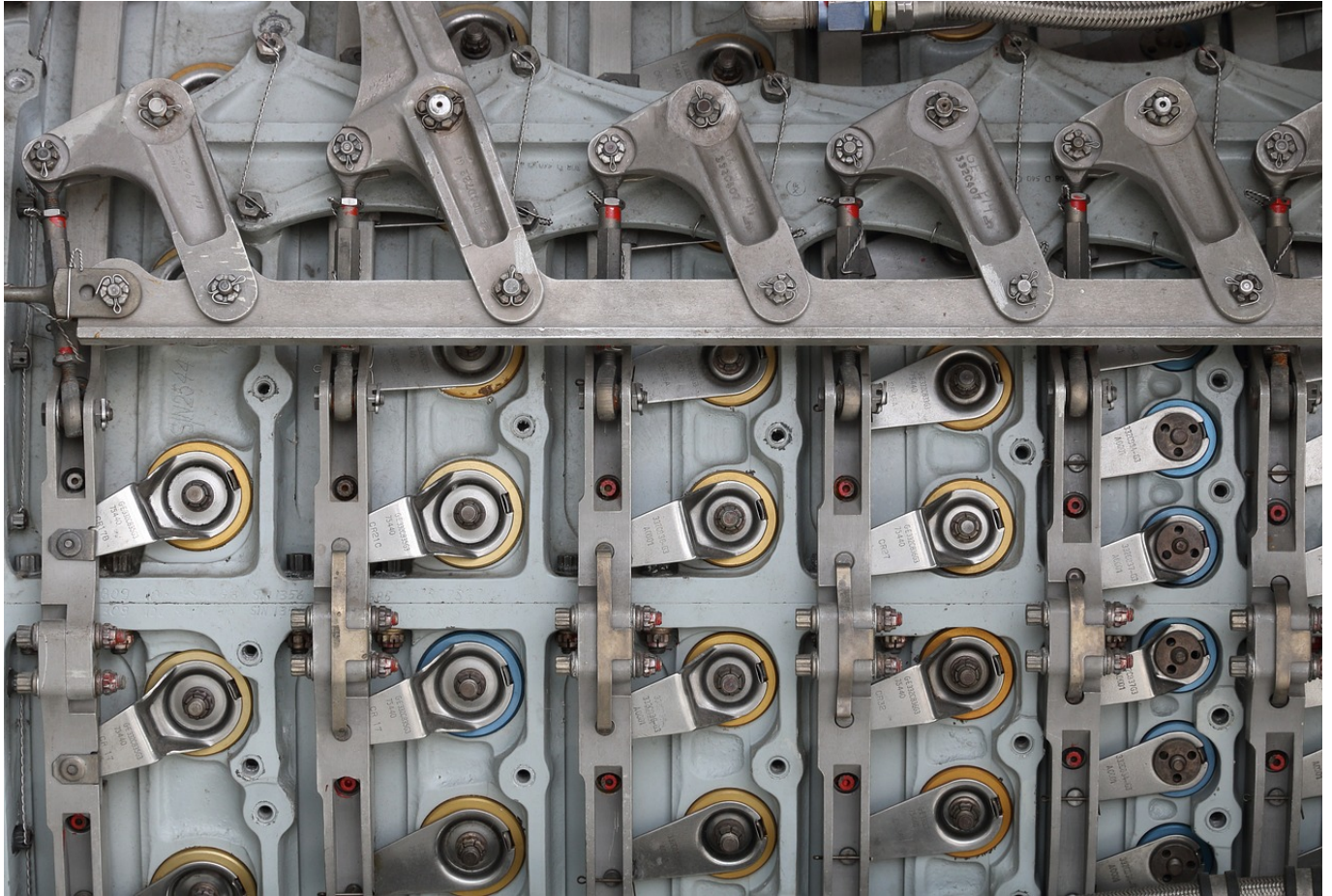


### Synonyms of "Variability" as a noun (3 Words)

**unevenness** The quality of being unbalanced.

**variableness** The quality of being subject to variation.

**variance** The state or fact of disagreeing or quarrelling.  
*They were at **variance** with all their previous allies.*



## Usage Examples of "Variability" as a noun

- *A great deal of variability in quality.*
- *Seasonal variability in water levels.*
- *Our results showed substantial variabilities in laboratory practices.*

<b><u>alter</u></b>	Make an alteration to. <i>The advent of the automobile may have <b>altered</b> the growth pattern of the city.</i>
<b>alternatively</b>	In place of, or as an alternative to. <i><b>Alternatively</b> you may telephone us direct if you wish.</i>
<b>cataclysmic</b>	Causing sudden and violent upheaval. <i>The concert was a <b>cataclysmic</b> failure.</i>
<b>change</b>	Exchange a sum of money for the same sum in a different currency or denomination. <i>His <b>change</b> on abortion cost him the election.</i>
<b>changed</b>	Changed in constitution or structure or composition by metamorphism. <i>A greatly <b>changed</b> country after the war.</i>

<b>chaos</b>	(Greek mythology) the most ancient of gods; the personification of the infinity of space preceding creation of the universe. <i>Snow caused <b>chaos</b> in the region.</i>
<b><u>climate</u></b>	A region with a particular climate. <i>The <b>climate</b> of opinion.</i>
<b>convert</b>	A person who has been converted to another religious or political belief. <i>The substance <b>converts</b> to an acid.</i>
<b>disabuse</b>	Free somebody (from an erroneous belief). <i>He quickly <b>disabused</b> me of my fanciful notions.</i>
<b><u>diversification</u></b>	The act of introducing variety (especially in investments or in the variety of goods and services offered). <i>He limited his losses by <b>diversification</b> of his product line.</i>
<b>diversity</b>	The condition or result of being changeable. <i>There was considerable <b>diversity</b> in the style of the reports.</i>
<b><u>fluctuate</u></b>	Cause to fluctuate or move in a wavelike pattern. <i>The stock market <b>fluctuates</b>.</i>
<b>fluctuation</b>	An instance of change; the rate or magnitude of change. <i><b>Fluctuations</b> in the yearly values could be caused by a variety of factors.</i>
<b>function</b>	Mathematics a mathematical relation such that each element of a given set the domain of the function is associated with an element of another set the range of the function. <i>Bodily <b>functions</b>.</i>
<b><u>instability</u></b>	Tendency to unpredictable behaviour or erratic changes of mood. <i>She showed increasing signs of mental <b>instability</b>.</i>
<b>metamorphose</b>	Change or cause to change completely in form or nature. <i>Feed the larvae to your fish before they <b>metamorphose</b> into adults.</i>
<b>modify</b>	Make partial or minor changes to (something). <i>Please <b>modify</b> this letter to make it more polite.</i>
<b><u>mutant</u></b>	A mutant form. <i>Frequently only a small percentage of the offspring of <b>mutants</b> resemble their parents.</i>
<b>remold</b>	Shape again or shape differently.
<b>seasonal</b>	Fluctuating or restricted according to the season or time of year. <i><b>Seasonal</b> rainfall.</i>
<b>shifting</b>	Changing position or direction. <i>Diverse districts with <b>shifting</b> demographics.</i>

<b>transfigure</b>	Change completely the nature or appearance of. <i>The world is made luminous and is <b>transfigured</b>.</i>
<b><u>transform</u></b>	Subject to a mathematical transformation. <i>He wanted to <b>transform</b> himself into a successful businessman.</i>
<b>transformation</b>	A function that changes the position or direction of the axes of a coordinate system. <i>British society underwent a radical <b>transformation</b>.</i>
<b>transmogrify</b>	Transform in a surprising or magical manner. <i>His home was transmogrified into a hippy crash pad.</i>
<b><u>transmute</u></b>	Alter the nature of (elements). <i>The raw material of his experience was <b>transmuted</b> into stories.</i>
<b><u>turbulence</u></b>	A state of conflict or confusion. <i>The industrial revolution was a period of great <b>turbulence</b>.</i>
<b><u>variance</u></b>	The fact or quality of being different, divergent, or inconsistent. <i>They were at <b>variance</b> with all their previous allies.</i>
<b>variation</b>	The process of varying or being varied. <i>Who is responsible for these <b>variations</b> in taxation.</i>
<b><u>vary</u></b>	Introduce modifications or changes into (something) so as to make it different or less uniform. <i>Prices <b>vary</b>.</i>
