- *(biology) a group of organisms within a species that differ in trivial ways from similar groups.*

- *A variable quantity that is random.*
- *An event that departs from expectations.*



## Synonyms of "Variant" as a noun (18 Words)

<b><u>aberrant</u></b>	One whose behavior departs substantially from the norm of a group.
<b>alternative</b>	One of two or more available possibilities. <i>She had no <b>alternative</b> but to break the law.</i>
<b>chance variable</b>	An unknown and unpredictable phenomenon that causes an event to result one way rather than another.
<b>deviant</b>	A deviant person or thing. <i>Killers <b>deviants</b> and those whose actions are beyond most human comprehension.</i>
<b>discrepancy</b>	An illogical or surprising lack of compatibility or similarity between two or more facts. <i>There s a <b>discrepancy</b> between your account and his.</i>
<b><u>disparate</u></b>	Things so unlike that there is no basis for comparison.
<b>edition</b>	A particular form or version of a published text. <i>The first <b>edition</b> appeared in 1920.</i>

<b>form</b>	An ability to perform well. <i>An adjectival <b>form</b>.</i>
<b>mutant</b>	A mutant form. <i>Frequently only a small percentage of the offspring of <b>mutants</b> resemble their parents.</i>
<b>revised</b>	The act of rewriting something.
<b>rogue</b>	An elephant or other large wild animal living apart from the herd and having savage or destructive tendencies. <i>Centro you old <b>rogue</b>.</i>
<b>stochastic variable</b>	Something that is likely to vary; something that is subject to variation.
<b>strain</b>	The sound of a piece of music. <i>She endured the stresses and <b>strains</b> of life.</i>
<b>var.</b>	A group of organisms within a species that differ in trivial ways from similar groups.
<b>variance</b>	A quantity equal to the square of the standard deviation. <i>A zoning <b>variance</b>.</i>
<b>variate</b>	A quantity having a numerical value for each member of a group, especially one whose values occur according to a frequency distribution.
<b>variation</b>	A different or distinct form or version of something. <i>Regional <b>variations</b> in house prices.</i>
<b>version</b>	A particular form of something differing in certain respects from an earlier form or other forms of the same type of thing. <i>A film <b>version</b> of a wonderfully funny cult novel.</i>

<b>convert</b>	A person who has been converted to another religious or political belief. <i>Faulkner gave away a penalty corner which was <b>converted</b> by Saeed Anjum.</i>
<b>difference</b>	The quality of being unlike or dissimilar. <i>The insurance company will pay the <b>difference</b>.</i>
<b>fluctuation</b>	A wave motion. <i><b>Fluctuations</b> in the yearly values could be caused by a variety of factors.</i>
<b>flux</b>	Treat a metal object with a flux to promote melting. <i>The whole political system is in a state of <b>flux</b>.</i>
<b>invariant</b>	Unvarying in nature. <i>The pattern of cell divisions was found to be <b>invariant</b>.</i>
<b>metamorphose</b>	Change in outward structure or looks. <i>The salesman <b>metamorphosed</b> into an ugly beetle.</i>
<b>modification</b>	The action of modifying something. <i>The parts supplied should fit with little or no <b>modification</b>.</i>
<b>modified</b>	Changed in form or character. <i>The performance of the <b>modified</b> aircraft was much improved.</i>
<b>modify</b>	Make partial or minor changes to (something). <i>She may be prepared to <b>modify</b> her views.</i>
<b>mutant</b>	A mutant form. <i>A <b>mutant</b> gene.</i>
<b>proselyte</b>	A Gentile who has converted to Judaism.
<b>remold</b>	Cast again.
<b>revision</b>	The action of revising. <i>It would require a drastic <b>revision</b> of his opinion.</i>
<b>splice</b>	Joint made by overlapping two ends and joining them together. <i>The couple got <b>spliced</b> on Hawaii.</i>
<b>transfigure</b>	Transform into something more beautiful or elevated. <i>The treatment and diet <b>transfigured</b> her into a beautiful young woman.</i>
<b>transform</b>	The product of a transformation. <i>He <b>transformed</b> into a monster.</i>
<b>transformation</b>	The genetic alteration of a cell by introduction of extraneous DNA, especially by a plasmid. <i>British society underwent a radical <b>transformation</b>.</i>
<b>transformed</b>	Given a completely different form or appearance. <i>Shocked to see the <b>transformed</b> landscape.</i>

<b>transition</b>	Undergo or cause to undergo a process or period of transition. <i>The company had to <b>transition</b> the old practices to modern technology.</i>
<b>transmogrify</b>	Transform in a surprising or magical manner. <i>His home was transmogrified into a hippy crash pad.</i>
<u>variance</u>	An activity that varies from a norm or standard. <i>They were at <b>variance</b> with all their previous allies.</i>
<b>variation</b>	An activity that varies from a norm or standard. <i>Hurling is an Irish <b>variation</b> of hockey.</i>
<u>varied</u>	Broken away from sameness or identity or duplication. <i>Her quickly <b>varied</b> answers indicated uncertainty.</i>
<u>vary</u>	Differ in size, amount, degree, or nature from something else of the same general class. <i>He tried to <b>vary</b> his diet.</i>
