aberrant	One whose behavior departs substantially from the norm of a group.
alternative	One of two or more available possibilities. <i>She had no alternative but to break the law.</i>
chance variable	An unknown and unpredictable phenomenon that causes an event to result one way rather than another.
deviant	A deviant person or thing. <i>Killers deviants and those whose actions are beyond most human comprehension.</i>
discrepancy	An illogical or surprising lack of compatibility or similarity between two or more facts. <i>There s a discrepancy between your account and his.</i>
disparate	Things so unlike that there is no basis for comparison.
edition	A particular form or version of a published text. <i>The first edition appeared in 1920.</i>

form	An ability to perform well. <i>An adjectival form.</i>
mutant	A mutant form. <i>Frequently only a small percentage of the offspring of mutants resemble their parents.</i>
revised	The act of rewriting something.
rogue	An elephant or other large wild animal living apart from the herd and having savage or destructive tendencies. <i>Centro you old rogue.</i>
stochastic variable	Something that is likely to vary; something that is subject to variation.
strain	The sound of a piece of music. <i>She endured the stresses and strains of life.</i>
var.	A group of organisms within a species that differ in trivial ways from similar groups.
variance	A quantity equal to the square of the standard deviation. <i>A zoning variance.</i>
variate	A quantity having a numerical value for each member of a group, especially one whose values occur according to a frequency distribution.
variation	A different or distinct form or version of something. <i>Regional variations in house prices.</i>
version	A particular form of something differing in certain respects from an earlier form or other forms of the same type of thing. <i>A film version of a wonderfully funny cult novel.</i>

difference	The quality of being unlike or dissimilar. <i>The insurance company will pay the difference.</i>
fluctuation	A wave motion. <i>Fluctuations in the yearly values could be caused by a variety of factors.</i>
flux	Treat a metal object with a flux to promote melting. <i>The whole political system is in a state of flux.</i>
invariant	Unvarying in nature. <i>The pattern of cell divisions was found to be invariant.</i>
metamorphose	Change in outward structure or looks. <i>The salesman metamorphosed into an ugly beetle.</i>
modification	The action of modifying something. <i>The parts supplied should fit with little or no modification.</i>
modified	Changed in form or character. <i>The performance of the modified aircraft was much improved.</i>
modify	Make partial or minor changes to (something). <i>She may be prepared to modify her views.</i>
mutant	A mutant form. <i>A mutant gene.</i>
proselyte	A Gentile who has converted to Judaism.
remold	Cast again.
revision	The action of revising. <i>It would require a drastic revision of his opinion.</i>
splice	Joint made by overlapping two ends and joining them together. <i>The couple got spliced on Hawaii.</i>
transfigure	Transform into something more beautiful or elevated. <i>The treatment and diet transfigured her into a beautiful young woman.</i>
transform	The product of a transformation. <i>He transformed into a monster.</i>
transformation	The genetic alteration of a cell by introduction of extraneous DNA, especially by a plasmid. <i>British society underwent a radical transformation.</i>
transformed	Given a completely different form or appearance. <i>Shocked to see the transformed landscape.</i>

transition	Undergo or cause to undergo a process or period of transition. <i>The company had to transition the old practices to modern technology.</i>
transmogrify	Transform in a surprising or magical manner. <i>His home was transmogrified into a hippy crash pad.</i>
<u>variance</u>	An activity that varies from a norm or standard. <i>They were at variance with all their previous allies.</i>
variation	An activity that varies from a norm or standard. <i>Hurling is an Irish variation of hockey.</i>
<u>varied</u>	Broken away from sameness or identity or duplication. <i>Her quickly varied answers indicated uncertainty.</i>
<u>vary</u>	Differ in size, amount, degree, or nature from something else of the same general class. <i>He tried to vary his diet.</i>
