- variable** (used of a device) designed so that a property (as e.g. light) can be varied.
*The drill has **variable** speed.*
- varied** Characterized by variety.
*A long and **varied** career.*

Make an alteration to.
*This dress needs to be **altered**.*

another

Any of various alternatives; some other.
*Put it off to **another** or some other day.*

border

A district near the border between two areas.
*The unknown regions at the **borders** of physics and electronics.*

change

Undergo a change become different in essence losing one s or its original nature.
*There were marked **changes** in the lining of the lungs.*

changed

Changed in constitution or structure or composition by metamorphism.
*A greatly **changed** country after the war.*

compatibility

The ability of one computer, piece of software, etc. to work with another.
*He argues for the **compatibility** of science and religion.*

degree

Social or official rank.
*A second **degree** burn.*

difference	The state or condition of being dissimilar. <i>The insurance company will pay the difference.</i>
<u>disjointed</u>	Separated at the joint. <i>A disjointed fowl.</i>
<u>disparate</u>	Including markedly dissimilar elements. <i>Disparate ideas.</i>
dispersed	Distributed or spread over a considerable extent. <i>Has ties with many widely dispersed friends.</i>
distributed	(of a computer system) spread over several machines, especially over a network. <i>The distributed supplies are meticulously monitored to make sure everyone gets their share.</i>
each	(used of count nouns) every one considered individually. <i>Each person is mortal.</i>
<u>fluctuate</u>	Cause to fluctuate or move in a wavelike pattern. <i>The stock market fluctuates.</i>
fluctuation	A wave motion. <i>He kept a record of price fluctuations.</i>
<u>flux</u>	Treat a metal object with a flux to promote melting. <i>The newness and flux of the computer industry.</i>
interscholastic	Used of competition or cooperation between secondary schools.
limit	Set or serve as a limit to. <i>There are limits on the amount you can bet.</i>
<u>modification</u>	The grammatical relation that exists when a word qualifies the meaning of the phrase. <i>A modification of last year's model.</i>
overestimate	Make too high an estimate of. <i>He overestimated his own powers.</i>
overrate	Have a higher opinion of (someone or something) than is deserved. <i>It is easy to overrate what Frederick achieved.</i>
<u>parameter</u>	A limit or boundary which defines the scope of a particular process or activity. <i>The parameters within which the media work.</i>
<u>transform</u>	Subject to a mathematical transformation. <i>He wanted to transform himself into a successful businessman.</i>
transformation	A marked change in form, nature, or appearance. <i>British society underwent a radical transformation.</i>

unlike

Marked by dissimilarity.

*He was very **unlike** to any other man.*

variance

The state or fact of disagreeing or quarrelling.

*They were at **variance** with all their previous allies.*

variant

Exhibiting variation and change.

*Letters **variant** in size.*

variation

A deviation of a celestial body from its mean orbit or motion.

*The figures showed marked **variation** from year to year.*

vary

Be at variance with; be out of line with.

*Prices **vary**.*

widely

To a large degree in nature or character (used to describe considerable variation or difference.

*People in **widely** different circumstances.*
