Veil as a Noun

Definitions of "Veil" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “veil” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The inner membrane of embryos in higher vertebrates (especially when covering the head at birth.*
- *(in Jewish antiquity) the piece of precious cloth separating the sanctuary from the body of the Temple or the Tabernacle.*
- *A garment that covers the head and face.*
- *A piece of fine material worn by women to protect or conceal the face.*
- *A thing that serves to cover, conceal, or disguise.*
- *A vestment worn by a priest at High Mass in the Roman Catholic Church; a silk shawl.*
- *A piece of fabric forming part of a nun's headdress, resting on the head and shoulders.*

- A membrane that is attached to the immature fruiting body of some toadstools and ruptures in the course of development, either (universal veil) enclosing the whole fruiting body or (partial veil) joining the edges of the cap to the stalk.
- A membranous covering attached to the immature fruiting body of certain mushrooms.

A rubber surface used for transferring the image in ink from the plate to the paper in offset printing.

*A dense grey **blanket** of cloud.*

[blur](#)

A hazy or indistinct representation.

*It happened so fast it was just a **blur**.*

[canopy](#)

The uppermost branches of the trees in a forest, forming a more or less continuous layer of foliage.

*They mounted the station steps under the concrete **canopy**.*

caul	Part of the caul occasionally found on a child's head at birth thought to bring good luck.
cloak	A cloakroom. <i>He threw his cloak about him.</i>
cloud	Used to refer to a state or cause of gloom, suspicion, trouble, or worry. <i>There's a rich complex shared data store in the cloud.</i>
cover	The protective covering on the front back and spine of a book. <i>Your policy provides cover against damage by subsidence.</i>
covering	The act of protecting something by covering it. <i>Under a covering of dust.</i>
curtain	A raising or lowering of the curtain at the beginning or end of an act or scene. <i>Through the curtain of falling snow she could just make out gravestones.</i>
face covering	Impudent aggressiveness.
film	Material in the form of a very thin flexible sheet. <i>The table was covered with a film of dust.</i>
haze	A very fine cloud of something such as vapour or smoke in the air. <i>The gathering haze of cigarette smoke.</i>
head covering	A line of text serving to indicate what the passage below it is about.
humeral veil	A vestment worn by a priest at High Mass in the Roman Catholic Church; a silk shawl.
layer	A shoot fastened down to take root while attached to the parent plant. <i>A simile has at least two layers of meaning.</i>
mantle	The part of another planetary body corresponding to the earth's mantle. <i>The houses were covered with a thick mantle of snow.</i>
mask	A party of guests wearing costumes and masks. <i>This exfoliating mask helps clear your pores and leaves your skin feeling soft and healthy.</i>
mist	A condensed vapour settling in fine droplets on a surface. <i>A mist rose out of the river.</i>
pall	An ecclesiastical pallium. <i>A pall of black smoke hung over the quarry.</i>
screen	A windscreen of a motor vehicle. <i>Services offered by the centre include a health screen for people who have just joined the company.</i>
shield	A stylized representation of a shield used for displaying a coat of arms. <i>Water is a relatively good shield against cosmic rays.</i>

shroud A line that suspends the harness from the canopy of a parachute.
*He was buried in a linen **shroud**.*

veiling A light gauzy fabric used for veils.
*The **veiling** that trimmed her hat.*

velum A membrane, typically bordering a cavity, especially in certain molluscs, medusae, and other invertebrates.



Usage Examples of "Veil" as a noun

- *A white bridal veil.*
- *A veil of mist and snow lay over the landscape.*
- *The venture is shrouded in a veil of secrecy.*

Synonyms of "Veil" as a verb (28 Words)

blanket

Form a blanket like cover over.
*The double glazing **blankets** the noise a bit.*

blot out	Dry (ink) with blotting paper.
camouflage	Hide or disguise the presence of a person animal or object by means of camouflage. <i>Grievances should be discussed not camouflaged.</i>
camouflaged	Disguise by camouflaging; exploit the natural surroundings to disguise something.
canopy	Cover with a canopy. <i>The river was canopied by overhanging trees.</i>
cloak	Cover with or as if with a cloak. <i>Cloaked monks.</i>
conceal	Prevent from being seen or discovered. <i>She conceals her anger well.</i>
cover	Provide with a covering or cause to be covered. <i>Cover the child with a blanket.</i>
cover up	Hold within range of an aimed firearm.
disguise	Conceal the nature or existence of (a feeling or situation). <i>Brian was disguised as a priest.</i>
enfold	Enclose or enfold completely with or as if with a covering. <i>He shut off the engine and silence enfolded them.</i>
envelop	Enclose or enfold completely with or as if with a covering. <i>A feeling of despair enveloped him.</i>
enwrap	Engross or absorb (someone). <i>They were enwrapped in conversation.</i>
hide	Make undecipherable or imperceptible by obscuring or concealing. <i>Herbert could hardly hide his dislike.</i>
hinted at	Drop a hint; intimate by a hint.
implied	Have as a necessary feature.
mask	Put a mask on or cover with a mask. <i>He had been masked bound and abducted.</i>
masked	Shield from light.
obliterate	Cancel (something, especially a postage stamp) to prevent further use. <i>The memory was so painful that he obliterated it from his mind.</i>
obscure	Make obscure or unclear. <i>The big elm tree obscures our view of the valley.</i>
overlay	Kill by lying on. <i>A third screen which will overlay the others.</i>

<u>screen</u>	Conceal protect or shelter someone or something with a screen or something forming a screen. <i>Anti spam software can screen out large amounts of unwanted email.</i>
<u>secrete</u>	(of a cell, gland, or organ) produce and discharge (a substance). <i>Insulin is secreted in response to rising levels of glucose in the blood.</i>
<u>shield</u>	Enclose or screen (a piece of machinery) to protect the user. <i>Uranium shutters shield the cobalt radioactive source.</i>
<u>shroud</u>	Wrap in a shroud. <i>Mountains shrouded by cloud.</i>
suppressed	Reduce the incidence or severity of or stop.
<u>surround</u>	Surround so as to force to give up. <i>The hotel is surrounded by its own gardens.</i>
swathe	Wrap in swaddling clothes.

bridal	Of or pertaining to a bride. <i>Bridal procession.</i>
<u>camouflage</u>	Clothing or materials used as camouflage. <i>Much of my apparent indifference was merely protective camouflage.</i>
caparison	Put a caparison on. <i>Caparison the horses for the festive occasion.</i>
<u>cape</u>	In bullfighting taunt the bull by flourishing a cape. <i>The robe was decorated with gold lace on the fronts cape and hem.</i>
<u>cloak</u>	A cloakroom. <i>Cloaked monks.</i>
cloth	A piece of cloth for cleaning or covering something e.g a dishcloth or a tablecloth. <i>A broad piece of pleated cloth.</i>
<u>conceal</u>	Prevent from being seen or discovered. <i>She conceals her anger well.</i>
cover	An area of the field consisting of cover point and extra cover. <i>An easy catch by Hick at cover.</i>
<u>disguise</u>	Make (something) unrecognizable by altering its appearance, sound, taste, or smell. <i>The theatrical notion of disguise is always associated with catastrophe in his stories.</i>
<u>drape</u>	Cover or dress loosely with cloth. <i>Katherine pulled back the heavy velvet drapes.</i>
fez	A city in north central Morocco; religious center.
glove	Of a wicketkeeper baseball catcher etc catch deflect or touch the ball with a gloved hand. <i>Rubber gloves.</i>
handkerchief	A square piece of cloth used for wiping the eyes or nose or as a costume accessory.
<u>hat</u>	Headdress that protects the head from bad weather has shaped crown and usually a brim. <i>Wearing her scientific hat she is director of a pharmacology research group.</i>

headdress	An ornamental covering or band for the head, especially one worn on ceremonial occasions. <i>A tall plumed headdress.</i>
honeymoon	Spend a honeymoon. <i>They flew to the West Indies on honeymoon.</i>
jacket	Cover with a jacket. <i>The men were jacketed.</i>
kerchief	A handkerchief.
<u>mask</u>	Cover the face with a mask. <i>Brandy did not completely mask the bitter taste.</i>
masquerade	A costume worn as a disguise at a masquerade party. <i>A beggar s masquerade of wealth.</i>
mitten	A glove with two sections, one for the thumb and the other for all four fingers.
monocle	Lens for correcting defective vision in one eye; held in place by facial muscles.
raincoat	A water-resistant coat.
<u>robe</u>	Clothe in a robe or long loose outer garment. <i>A baby in christening robes.</i>
<u>scarf</u>	Wrap in or adorn with a scarf. <i>A silk scarf.</i>
<u>shirt</u>	Put a shirt on. <i>A rugby shirt.</i>
skirt	An edge, border, or extreme part. <i>The treaty skirted around the question of political cooperation.</i>
<u>umbrella</u>	A screen of fighter aircraft or anti-aircraft artillery. <i>Under the umbrella of capitalism.</i>
wear	Have in one s aspect wear an expression of one s attitude or personality. <i>Wear one s hair in a certain way.</i>
wedding	A party of people at a wedding.
