### Synonyms of "Veracity" as a noun (12 Words)

<b>accuracy</b>	The quality or state of being correct or precise. <i>He was beginning to doubt the <b>accuracy</b> of his compass.</i>
<b>accurateness</b>	The state or quality of being accurate; accuracy; †carefulness (obsolete).
<b>authenticity</b>	Undisputed credibility. <i>The paper should have established the <b>authenticity</b> of the documents before publishing them.</i>
<b><u>correctness</u></b>	Conformity to accepted social standards. <i>There was evidence to support the <b>correctness</b> of the identification.</i>

<b>exactness</b>	The quality of being exact. <i>It is impossible to calculate with mathematical <b>exactness</b>.</i>
<b>faithfulness</b>	The quality of being faithful; fidelity. <i><b>Faithfulness</b> in marriage.</i>
<b>fidelity</b>	The degree of exactness with which something is copied or reproduced. <i>His <b>fidelity</b> to liberal ideals.</i>
<b>preciseness</b>	The quality of being reproducible in amount or performance. <i>He handled it with the <b>preciseness</b> of an automaton.</i>
<b><u>precision</u></b>	Refinement in a measurement, calculation, or specification, especially as represented by the number of digits given. <i>A <b>precision</b> instrument.</i>
<b><u>realism</u></b>	The doctrine that universals or abstract concepts have an objective or absolute existence The theory that universals have their own reality is sometimes called Platonic realism because it was first outlined by Plato's doctrine of forms or ideas. <i>British soaps will stay because of their gritty <b>realism</b>.</i>
<b>truth</b>	A fact that has been verified. <i>They debated the <b>truth</b> of the proposition.</i>
<b><u>truthfulness</u></b>	The fact of being true; truth. <i>The <b>truthfulness</b> of her playing of an ageing American spinster.</i>

## Associations of "Veracity" (30 Words)

<b>accuracy</b>	The quality or state of being correct or precise. <i>The <b>accuracy</b> of radiocarbon dating.</i>
<b><u>actual</u></b>	Being or existing at the present moment. <i>The book could be condensed into half the space but what of the <b>actual</b> content.</i>
<b>authenticity</b>	Undisputed credibility. <i>The paper should have established the <b>authenticity</b> of the documents before publishing them.</i>

<b><u>candid</u></b>	Truthful and straightforward; frank. <i>It is better to let the photographer mingle among the guests and take <b>candid</b> shots.</i>
<b><u>candor</u></b>	The quality of being honest and straightforward in attitude and speech.
<b>candour</b>	Ability to make judgments free from discrimination or dishonesty. <i>A man of refreshing <b>candour</b>.</i>
<b>fact</b>	A piece of information about circumstances that exist or events that have occurred. <i>There was a question of <b>fact</b> as to whether they had received the letter.</i>
<b>forthrightness</b>	The quality of being honest and straightforward in attitude and speech.
<b>frank</b>	Unmistakable; obvious. <i>Kate looked at Sam with <b>frank</b> admiration.</i>
<b><u>frankly</u></b>	Used to emphasize the truth of a statement, however unpalatable this may be. <i>She talks very <b>frankly</b> about herself.</i>
<b><u>genuine</u></b>	Being or reflecting the essential or genuine character of something. <i>A <b>genuine</b> dilemma.</i>
<b>guileless</b>	Free of deceit. <i>His face once so open and <b>guileless</b>.</i>
<b><u>honest</u></b>	Free of deceit; truthful and sincere. <i>An <b>honest</b> wage.</i>
<b><u>honesty</u></b>	A European plant with purple or white flowers and round, flat, translucent seed pods which are used for indoor flower arrangements. <i>There s a well stocked <b>honesty</b> bar which includes local wine.</i>
<b>integrity</b>	The condition of being unified or sound in construction. <i>They admired his scrupulous professional <b>integrity</b>.</i>
<b>naivete</b>	Innocence or unsophistication. <i>His greatest fault was his political naïvet.</i>
<b><u>openness</u></b>	Lack of secrecy or concealment; frankness. <i>Total <b>openness</b> to all points of view.</i>
<b>probity</b>	Complete and confirmed integrity; having strong moral principles. <i>He enjoys an exaggerated reputation for <b>probity</b>.</i>
<b>real</b>	Really very. <i>The <b>real</b> reason.</i>
<b>rectitude</b>	Righteousness as a consequence of being honorable and honest. <i>Mattie is a model of <b>rectitude</b>.</i>

<b><u>sincere</u></b>	(of a person) saying what they genuinely feel or believe; not dishonest or hypocritical. <i>They offer their <b>sincere</b> thanks to Paul.</i>
<b><u>sincerity</u></b>	The absence of pretence, deceit, or hypocrisy. <i>They demanded some proof of my <b>sincerity</b>.</i>
<b>transparency</b>	The quality of being clear and transparent. <i>The <b>transparency</b> of ice.</i>
<b>truth</b>	A fact or belief that is accepted as true. <i>They debated the <b>truth</b> of the proposition.</i>
<b>truthful</b>	Telling or expressing the truth; honest. <i>Gave <b>truthful</b> testimony.</i>
<b><u>truthfulness</u></b>	The fact of being true; truth. <i>The <b>truthfulness</b> of her playing of an ageing American spinster.</i>
<b>unflinching</b>	Not showing fear or hesitation in the face of danger or difficulty. <i>He has shown <b>unflinching</b> determination throughout the campaign.</i>
<b>uprightness</b>	The condition or quality of being honourable or honest; rectitude. <i>Steadying himself he slowly managed to achieve a state of relative <b>uprightness</b>.</i>
<b>veracious</b>	Habitually speaking the truth. <i>A <b>veracious</b> witness.</i>
<b>verification</b>	The process of ensuring that procedures laid down in weapons limitation agreements are followed. <i>The <b>verification</b> of official documents.</i>
