## Verbalize as a Verb

### Definitions of "Verbalize" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “verbalize” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Articulate; either verbally or with a cry, shout, or noise.*
- *Express (ideas or feelings) in words, especially by speaking out loud.*
- *Make (a word, especially a noun) into a verb.*
- *Express in speech.*
- *Convert into a verb.*
- *Be verbose.*
- *Speak, especially at length and with little real content.*



## Synonyms of "Verbalize" as a verb (13 Words)

<b>articulated</b>	Speak, pronounce, or utter in a certain way.
<b>express</b>	Give expression to. <i>Many of the laboratory animals <b>express</b> the trait.</i>
<b>expressed</b>	Indicate through a symbol, formula, etc.
<b>give tongue to</b>	Propose.
<b><u>mouth</u></b>	Touch with the mouth. <i>She would carefully <b>mouth</b> the right pronunciation.</i>
<b>said</b>	Give instructions to or direct somebody to do something with authority.
<b>speak</b>	Exchange thoughts; talk with. <i>I ll <b>speak</b> to him if he calls.</i>
<b>talk</b>	Persuade or cause someone to do something by talking. <i>She <b>talks</b> a lot of nonsense.</i>
<b><u>utter</u></b>	Express audibly utter sounds not necessarily words. <i><b>Utter</b> counterfeit currency.</i>

**uttered** Put into circulation.

**verbalise** Convert into a verb.

**verbalized** Express in speech.

**word-of-mouth** Touch with the mouth.



### Usage Examples of "Verbalize" as a verb

- *Many English nouns have become verbalized.*
- *This lawyer verbalizes and is rather tedious.*
- *This depressed patient does not verbalize.*
- *They are unable to verbalize their real feelings.*
- *The dangers of verbalizing about art.*





## Associations of "Verbalize" (30 Words)

- aforementioned** Denoting a thing or person previously mentioned.  
*Songs from the **aforementioned** album.*
- aforesaid** Being the one previously mentioned or spoken of.
- aloud** With relatively high volume.  
*He read the letter **aloud**.*
- articulate** Unite by forming a joint or joints.  
*The ankle bone **articulates** with the leg bones to form the ankle bones.*
- aver** To declare or affirm solemnly and formally as true.  
*The defendant does not **aver** any performance by himself.*
- candidly** In an honest and straightforward way; frankly.  
*He **candidly** discussed his efforts to find employment.*
- declaim** Speak against in an impassioned manner.  
*She **declaimed** her views.*

<b>dialog</b>	The lines spoken by characters in drama or fiction.
<b>eloquence</b>	Powerful and effective language. <i>His <b>eloquence</b> attracted a large congregation.</i>
<b>eloquently</b>	In an articulate manner. <i>He expressed his ideas <b>eloquently</b>.</i>
<b>enunciate</b>	Express or state clearly. <i>She <b>enunciated</b> each word slowly.</i>
<b><u>expansive</u></b>	Tending towards economic or political expansion. <i>An <b>expansive</b> lifestyle.</i>
<b><u>interact</u></b>	Act together or towards others or with others. <i>All the stages in the process <b>interact</b>.</i>
<b>monologue</b>	A long speech by one actor in a play or film, or as part of a theatrical or broadcast programme. <i>Fred carried on with his <b>monologue</b> as if I hadn't spoken.</i>
<b>monosyllable</b>	Brief words, used when reluctant to engage in conversation. <i>If she spoke at all it was in <b>monosyllables</b>.</i>
<b><u>narrate</u></b>	Narrate or give a detailed account of. <i>The series is <b>narrated</b> by Richard Baker.</i>
<b><u>narration</u></b>	The second section of an oration in which the facts are set forth. <i>Moore's <b>narration</b> is often sarcastic.</i>
<b>oh</b>	A midwestern state in north central United States in the Great Lakes region.
<b>orate</b>	Make a speech, especially pompously or at length. <i>Hamlet thinks <b>orates</b> and acts.</i>
<b>pronounce</b>	Speak pronounce or utter in a certain way. <i>She was <b>pronounced</b> dead at the scene.</i>
<b>recitation</b>	The repetition of a list of facts. <i>The history of an organization is more important than the <b>recitation</b> of details like this.</i>
<b><u>recite</u></b>	Recite in elocution. <i><b>Recite</b> a poem.</i>
<b><u>recount</u></b>	Count again. <i>I <b>recounted</b> the tale to Steve.</i>
<b>reportedly</b>	According to reports or other information. <i>He was in El Salvador <b>reportedly</b> on his way to Texas.</i>
<b>rhapsodize</b>	Recite a rhapsody. <i>He began to <b>rhapsodize</b> about Gaby's beauty and charm.</i>



- soliloquy** A part of a play involving a soliloquy.  
*Edmund ends the scene as he had begun it with a **soliloquy**.*
- spell** Orally recite the letters of or give the spelling of.  
*A **spell** of good weather.*
- utter** Express audibly utter sounds not necessarily words.  
*He **uttered** strange sounds that nobody could understand.*
- verbosity** The fact or quality of using more words than needed; wordiness.  
*A critic with a reputation for **verbosity**.*
- vocalize** Pronounce as a vowel.  
*Gillie could scarcely **vocalize** her responses.*
