- *Using exactly the same words.*

literally Used for emphasis while not being literally true.
*I was **literally** blown away by the response I got.*

precisely Used as a reply to confirm or agree with a previous statement.
*Kids will love it **precisely** because it will irritate their parents.*

religiously By religion.
*The **religiously** based school.*

rigorously In a rigorous manner.
*The court **rigorously** scrutinises the settlement.*

strictly With no exceptions; completely or absolutely.
***Strictly** speaking ham is a cured cooked leg of pork.*

Usage Examples of "Verbatim" as an adverb

- *He repeated her remarks verbatim.*
- *Subjects were instructed to recall the passage verbatim.*

***Accurate** measurements.*

accurately In a way that is correct in all details; exactly.
*We are simply unable to predict long term trends **accurately**.*

actually At the present moment.
*He had a thick Cockney accent he sounded like my grandad **actually**.*

copy Send a copy of a letter or an email to a third party.
*The problem is telling which is the original document and which the **copy**.*

correct Make right or correct.
*He had assumed she was married and she had not **corrected** him.*

correctly In a way that is true, factual or appropriate; accurately.
*The flower had been **correctly** depicted by his son.*

dah The longer of the two telegraphic signals used in Morse code.

detailed Developed or executed with care and in minute detail- John Buchan.
*More **detailed** information was needed.*

direct Direct the course determine the direction of travelling.
*I **directed** them towards the town hall.*

| factually | As a fact or based on fact. <i>His assertion is factually incorrect.</i> |
| justly | With honesty. <i>We can justly be proud of our achievements.</i> |
| justness | Conformity with some esthetic standard of correctness or propriety. <i>It was performed with justness and beauty.</i> |

| perusal | The action of reading or examining something. <i>I continued my perusal of the instructions.</i> |
| precise | (of ideas, images, representations, expressions) characterized by perfect conformity to fact or truth; strictly correct. <i>A precise mind.</i> |
| precisely | In a precise manner. <i>He was doing precisely or exactly what she had told him to do.</i> |
| punctuality | The quality or habit of adhering to an appointed time. <i>Improvements in the punctuality of trains.</i> |
| real | Used as intensifiers real is sometimes used informally for really rattling is informal. <i>An increase in real terms of 11.6 per cent.</i> |
