Verifiable as an Adjective

Definitions of "Verifiable" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “verifiable” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Able to be checked or demonstrated to be true, accurate, or justified.*
- *Capable of being verified.*
- *Capable of being tested (verified or falsified) by experiment or observation.*

authenticated	Established as genuine.
authorized	Having official permission or approval. <i>The authorized biography.</i>
behaviorism	An approach to psychology that emphasizes observable measurable behavior.
certified	Fit to be certified as insane and treated accordingly. <i>A certified public accountant.</i>
clinically	In a very efficient and detached way. <i>A clinically lit room.</i>
<u>credible</u>	Appearing to merit belief or acceptance. <i>A credible witness.</i>

dependable	Worthy of reliance or trust. <i>The most valuable and dependable of America's allies.</i>
documented	Established as genuine. <i>The first documented case of shark attack in those waters.</i>
duly	At the proper time. <i>I met the junior senator from Illinois and I was duly impressed.</i>
eligible	Qualified for or allowed or worthy of being chosen. <i>Customers who are eligible for discounts.</i>
empirical	Derived from experiment and observation rather than theory. <i>An empirical treatment of a disease about which little is known.</i>
empiricism	(philosophy) the doctrine that knowledge derives from experience.
experimental	Relying on observation or experiment. <i>An experimental drug.</i>
indefeasible	Not liable to being annulled or voided or undone. <i>An indefeasible claim to the title.</i>
logical	Marked by an orderly logical and aesthetically consistent relation of parts. <i>Rain was a logical expectation given the time of year.</i>
objectively	In a way that is not dependent on the mind for existence; actually. <i>The physical world we think of as objectively true.</i>
observable	Capable of being seen or noticed. <i>An observable change in behavior.</i>
observational	Relying on observation or experiment. <i>A master of observational comedy.</i>
perspective	The appearance of viewed objects with regard to their relative position, distance from the viewer, etc. <i>The theory and practice of perspective.</i>
proven	Established beyond doubt. <i>A system based on proven technologies.</i>
provenance	The beginning of something's existence; something's origin. <i>An orange rug of Iranian provenance.</i>
rationalism	The theological doctrine that human reason rather than divine revelation establishes religious truth. <i>Scientific rationalism.</i>
reasonable	(of a price or product) not too expensive. <i>A police officer may use reasonable force to gain entry.</i>

registered	Of a letter or parcel sent by registered post. <i>Record is made of registered mail at each point on its route to assure safe delivery.</i>
reliable	A reliable person or thing. <i>The supporting cast includes old reliables like Mitchell.</i>
scientifically	In a way that relates to or is used in science. <i>Everything is planned out scientifically.</i>
sensible	(of an object) practical and functional rather than decorative. <i>I am sensible that the mention of such a circumstance may appear trifling.</i>
tested	Tested and proved to be reliable. <i>A tested method.</i>
verified	Proved to be true. <i>A verified claim.</i>
